When the etar planist was about to sail recent-ly from Australia with his family the little girl became ill and her mother had to remain behind with her. "I expect my wife and child to re-join me soon." said Moisewitsch. Moisewitsch was born in Odessa, Eussia, and sent when quite young to get his musical education at the im-perial school.
