MOONSHINE GETS LIMIT SENTENCE—Six months in the county jail the maximum sentence under the new federal prohibition amendment, coupled with a \$500 fine was the punishment meted out to Russell Haynes of Portland who pleaded guilty in the United States district court to violating the revenue laws in making moonshine. Haynes started serving his sentence yesterday. During the war he served a sentence for falsification of his questionnaires. Haynes was associated with Joe Sagala in the manufacture of moonshine in an east side residence. Victor Anderson and H. W. Linn have started serving 60 days received from Judge Wolverton when they pleaded guilty to making moonshine in their homes.

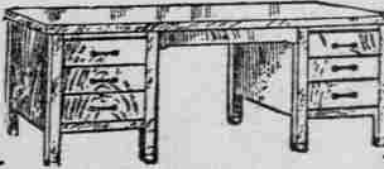
