

THREE ARE INDICTED FOR BANK'S FAILURE

Woman County Treasurer Ac-
cused of Malfeasance.

PRESIDENT ALSO HELD

Vice-President Hines, Also Half-
Brother of Institution Head,
Held by Grand Jury.

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—Thirteen indictments were returned by the grand jury late last night as a result of the failure of the Bank of Jacksonville and were made public yesterday.

Myrtle Blakely, county treasurer, in two indictments was charged with malfeasance in office and aiding and abetting the cashier to make a false statement to the bank examiner. H. D. Hines, half-brother of W. H. Johnson and vice-president of the defunct institution, was the subject of eight indictments, four charging knowingly falsifying statements to the bank examiner, three charging receiving deposits in a known insolvent bank and one alleging certifying a check when known drawer did not have the money to his credit.

Bank President Indicted. W. H. Johnson, president and cashier of the bank, in three indictments was charged with receiving money when the bank was known to be insolvent. Johnson and Hines were arraigned this morning and will plead Saturday morning at 9:30.

Hines' bail was fixed at \$10,000 and efforts were begun by his attorney and friends to obtain the sum. County Treasurer Blakely was arraigned, entered a plea of not guilty and released on her own recognizance. The indictments against the county treasurer came as a surprise and her friends maintained that she is "the goat." None believe her guilty of any criminal intent, but all declare that she is the victim of a chain of circumstances. She is one of the best known women in Jackson county, with a wide circle of friends and one of the first women in Oregon to hold office.

Grand Jury Adjourns. The grand jury adjourned until November 5, when it will resume its probe of the bank's affairs and other indictments will be returned. The scope of the investigation covers a wide field and it is tedious work to untangle the maze that surrounded the operation of the bank.

Hines was formerly a member of the firm of Hines & Snyder of this city, automobile dealers. He is well known and was in charge of the bank, it was said, when President Johnson went east on a church movement campaign a month before its failure. Surprise was expressed that Johnson had been indicted on only three counts. This was accounted for by the statement that the grand jury has not completed its work. Conviction on any one of the three counts would call for a prison term of from one to ten years.

Owing to the fact that the grand jury will resume its sessions November 5, no statement was forthcoming on the investigation, except that new indictments would probably result. Hines, tonight was unable to raise his bond of \$10,000. The bail of Johnson, who has been in jail since the bank failed, was placed at \$5,000, which he has never tried to raise.

ACCIDENT SHOCK FATAL

H. Guest Dies of Heart Disease
After Auto Hits Child.

ROSEBURG, Or., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—H. Guest, a retired business man of this city, died at his home here early this morning as a result of heart disease brought about by an automobile accident last night. Guest was driving his automobile on one of the main streets of the city when Richard Young, 6-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Young, ran in front of the machine and was knocked down, but not seriously injured.

The shock of the accident brought on an attack of heart disease. He is survived by a widow and two daughters, Mrs. Helen Nelson of Corvallis, Or., and the other a resident of Klamath Falls, Or.

8-INCH LOGS UTILIZED

Oregon Lumber Company Cutting
From National Forest.

Close utilization of timber by the Oregon Lumber company was an interesting feature of a recent inspection trip to the scene of the company's operations on the head of the west fork of Hood river, according to Thornton T. Munger of the forestry service.

Logs down to eight inches top diameter are being made into lumber at the company's mill near Dee where timber is cut from the Oregon national forest under a 12-year government contract. The company has contracted 330,000,000 feet of government timber and has operated two years. Mr. Munger accompanied Department Superintendent Carl Neal on the trip.

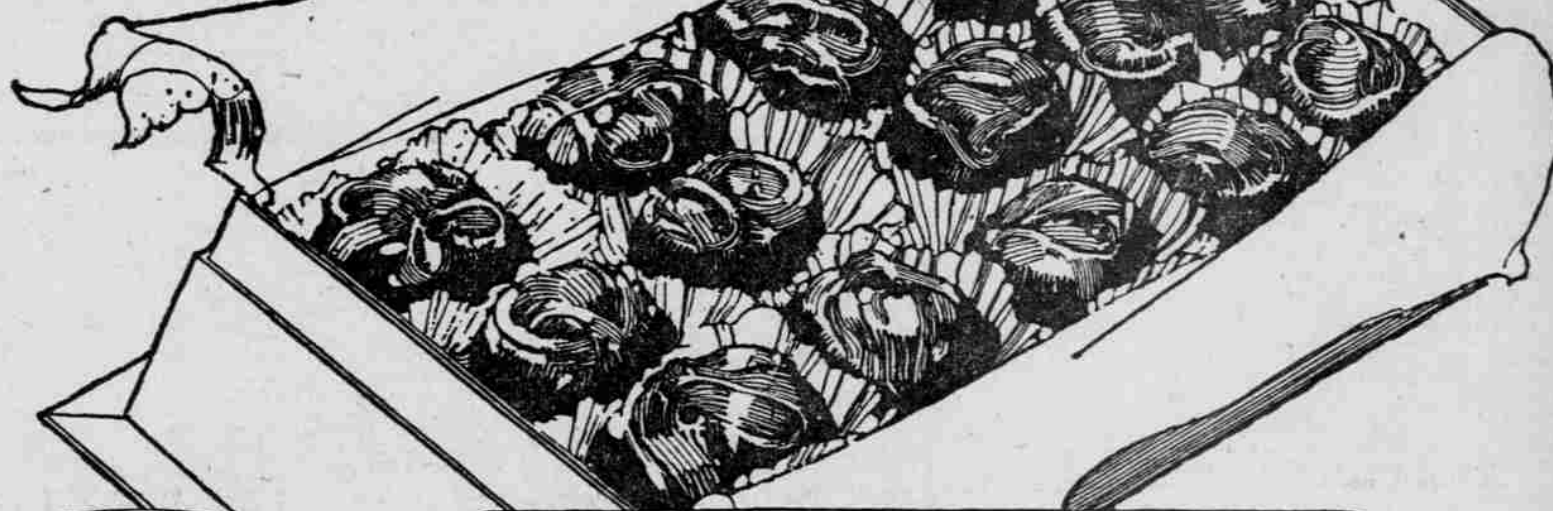
