

HARDING CAMPAIGN COSTS \$3,442,892

Treasurer of Republican
Party Files Report.

50,000 GIVEN TO CHEST

Smallest Contribution Is 25 Cents.
Thousands of 50c, 75c and
\$1 Donations.

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 28.—The republican national committee's campaign to elect Senator Warren G. Harding president will cost \$3,442,892, Fred W. Upham, national treasurer of the party, notified the senate committee appointed to investigate campaign expenditures in a report filed here today.

Of this sum, \$3,042,892.32 had been spent up to the close of business Sunday, October 24, and Mr. Upham estimated the expenditures in the closing week of the campaign at \$400,000 additional.

San Franciscans Liberal.
In several instances members of the same family have given contributions of \$1000 each. Mr. and Mrs. Charles T. Crocker, San Francisco, and four other members of the Crocker family, and four members of the Spreckels family, also of San Francisco, are in this class.

Senator Warren G. Harding and Governor Calvin Coolidge, his running mate, each gave \$1000, as did Fred W. Upham, the republican national treasurer, and Charles P. Taft of Cincinnati, brother of ex-President Taft. There are several hundred \$1000 contributions.

Mr. Upham's office estimated there were approximately 50,000 contributors to the campaign chest. The smallest contributions listed are of 25 cents. There are thousands of 50c, 75c, and \$1 donations. Eleven Chicago women gave 50 cents each—why, no one in Mr. Upham's office knew.

Committee Makes Report.
Reports of the republican congressional and senatorial committees, filed with the senate committee appointed to investigate campaign expenditures, showed that the former has spent \$488,525.41 and the latter approximately \$147,500 in conducting their campaigns so far this year. Reports of the two democratic committees were embodied in the national committee's report, which, along with the republican national committee's statement, also was filed.

The republican congressional statement showed that its total receipts were \$488,525.41 on October 26, leaving a balance of \$77,730.51. A large number of contributions were listed, among which were the following: Joseph E. Widener, \$750 and \$5000; George A. Dropper, Hopkinton, Mass., \$5000; Henry Hornblower, Boston, \$5000; Anderson Gratz, St. Louis, \$5000; James Dobson, Philadelphia, \$2700; N. Ernst, Philadelphia, \$2500; T. E. Walker, Minneapolis, \$2500; William H. Childs, New York, \$5000; H. M. Hanna, Thomasville, Ga., \$5000; E. Grundy, Joseph H. Bromley and John E. Bromley, all of Philadelphia, \$2000 each.

\$3700 Is Balance.
Miles Poindexter, chairman of the republican senatorial committee, in his report said that up to October 23 orders had been drawn on Guy T. Stone, treasurer, for a sum totaling approximately \$147,500, the report giving no total, but itemizing each order. Senator Poindexter reported the balance on hand October 19 as \$3700.

The democratic report said that in addition to other funds received, J. F. Guffey of Pittsburgh had guaranteed \$25,000 toward the expenses of an advertisement entitled "From a Gold Star Mother," to be inserted in "certain newspapers in certain states," and that Allan A. Ryan had guaranteed \$25,000 for the expenses of another advertisement entitled "The Voice of France."

The democratic committee's report gave an itemized statement of expenses, among which was approximately \$90,000 paid various railway companies for train service. The republican expense report was not itemized.

\$878,831 DEMOCRAT RECEIPTS
5 Cents to \$12,500 Is Range of Individual Gifts.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Total receipts by the democratic national committee to October 26 for the conduct of the present campaign amount to \$878,831.24. Wilbur W. Marsh, the party's national treasurer, announced today. Individual contributions including that of President Wilson for \$500 and Mrs. Wilson for \$100, ranged from \$12.50 by Thomas L. Chadbourne of New York to 5 cents by John Dugan of Woodville, N. H. Thousands of contributors are listed in the democratic statement and include persons in all states of the Union.

Governor Cox, the democratic candidate for president, contributed \$5000, while his running mate, Franklin D. Roosevelt, gave \$3000. Other contributors included: William G. McAdoo, \$1000; August Belmont, New York, \$500; James W. Gerard, former ambassador to Germany, \$2000; John W. Davis, ambassador to Great Britain, \$1000; Bernard M. Baruch, \$500; Alton B. Parker, once democratic candidate for president, \$100; Vance C. McCormick, former chairman of the democratic national committee, \$3000; Homer S. Cummings, another former chairman, \$552.50; Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska, \$1000; Ralph Pulitzer, publisher of the New York World, \$1000; W. L. Douglas, shoe manufacturer of Brookline, Mass., \$500; Rembrandt Peale, Carrolltown, Pa., \$10,000; Charles E. 3 PARTIES FAIL TO REPORT
Law Requires Statement Ten Days Before Election.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—The American Federation of Labor's non-partisan campaign committee, the Non-partisan league and the Farmer-Labor party have not filed statements covering expenditures in the present political campaign, it was stated today at the office of William T. Fager, clerk of the house of representatives. Under the corrupt practices act reports on campaign expenditures must be filed "not less than ten days" before the election. Mr. Fager said no communication had been received from either organization explaining its failure to file.

THIRD PARTY TO FILE SOON
No Estimate to Be Made Until All States Report.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—It was announced at national headquarters of the Farmer-Labor party here today that a statement of campaign receipts and expenditures would be filed at Washington soon.

No estimate of the total fund of the party could be made until information was received from all states, it was stated.
