CORK, Oct. 29 .- (By the Associated Press.)-The body of Terence Mac-Swiney, late lord mayor of this city. arrived here on board an admiralty tug at 4 o'clock this afternoon. The tug, the flag of which was flown at half mast, docked at the customs house quay. Enormous crowds lined the opposite quays and the nearby

immediately notified Deputy Lord Mayor O'Callaghan and the bishop of Cork that no military display would be permitted at the funeral of Mac-Swiney and that neither drilling, uniforms nor republican army badget would be allowed.
