

MCCORMICK WANTS BOO WITH O'DOWD

Report of Probable Fight
Pleases Boy.

MEEHAN FIGHT IS NEXT

Hard Training Being Done in
Preparation for Clash at Mil-
waukee Next Wednesday.

Billy Gibson, the astute New York manager of boxers, boxing promoter and cafe owner, who looks after Benny Leonard, lightweight champion of the world, Joe Benjamin and Boy McCormick, expects to have a real match lined up for the latter, when Boy returns to New York.

McCormick has received a letter from Gibson to the effect that Billy is angling for a match with Mike O'Dowd, either at Tex Rickard's Madison square garden club or at the newly opened Commonwealth Athletic club of New York.

McCormick weighed in yesterday at the Olympic gymnasium and shivered the scales at 150 pounds, just one pound over the middleweight limit, and Boy is not making weight. Furthermore, the modern middleweights are not making better than 150 pounds.

Johnny Wilson weighed 152 when he received a 12-round decision over the thin champion Mike O'Dowd in Boston. One of O'Dowd's big complaints was that Wilson had not made the championship weight limit of 158 pounds. This was disregarded and, although the world knows that Mike is the real champ, Wilson sure enough has the title and is getting away with it by not fighting.

McCormick, who is training hard for his ten-round match against Willie Meehan at the Milwaukee arena next Wednesday night, took time enough yesterday to tell about the O'Dowd proposition and that he would be tickled to death to battle another fighting Irishman. Portland boxing followers can imagine what a battle a bout between McCormick and O'Dowd would be. Two pure and simple fighters with just enough boxing ability to carry them through, both hard punchers and game to the core. The New York currier dish if Billy Gibson manages to clinch a 15-round set-to between Boy and Mike O'Dowd.

Joe Benjamin, the best lightweight that Portland has ever been able to brag about, arrived here yesterday from Milwaukee, Wis. Joe is all broken up over his defeat at the hands of Ritchie Mitchell, but the fact that he had the better of the going up to the ninth round of the battle does not make him feel quite so bad. Joe only hopes that he can get Mitchell in the squared circle with him again.

All of the Milwaukee papers were outspoken in that Benjamin would have been clearly entitled to the newspaper decision had the bout gone the ten-round distance. Benjamin said he was given a raw deal all around in Milwaukee.

After working for three weeks Benjamin arrived here, yesterday, days before the match, planning on resting up so as not to be stale the night of the go. The boxing commission of that city told him and forced him to work out both days before the bout. The night of the fight somebody stole Benjamin's \$15 overcoat which he bought in New York only two weeks ago.

The worst of all was a fast count turned in by the referee. Mitchell caught Joe off his balance with a right cross in the fifth round. Benjamin decided to take advantage of the count and had hardly hit the floor when he heard the referee tolling off seven. He jumped up and slammed Mitchell with a right and then stepped into a clinch. The referee broke them and in the next away Mitchell slipped in another right-hand wallop that sent Joe over. He took the count of nine this time so as to recuperate, and upon arising to his feet went into a clinch against the ropes. Mitchell gave him a wallop in the break, upsetting Joe, and the fight was stopped. The bell was about to ring and Joe would have probably come out strong in the tenth and at least struck the ten had the battle gone on.

Following is an account of part of the battle as written by the boxing critic of the Milwaukee Sentinel:

"Benjamin's showing was that of a master for eight rounds. He worked in and out with machine-like motion and scored wickedly with his right time and again. In the second round the followers of Mitchell were given a rude jolting when Benjamin, forcing the fighting, scored with a heavy right to the local star. The blow shook up the local star and when Benjamin kept swinging at him from every direction it appeared as though he would spring a big surprise on the boxing public by stopping the marvelous brawler. Mitchell wanted to remain on his feet throughout the session, but he was mighty weary when he returned to his corner.

"Those who attended the show with the hope of seeing Benjamin hang one on Richie's chin were up on their feet and shouting wildly when the bell rang at the end of the second inning. It was a hectic session for them. Following this contest the pair battled like a couple of gamecocks for six stanzas and at the end of the eighth both fighters appeared to be just as strong as at the start. Benjamin came out in the ninth and continued to hook with his left. He found difficulty in reaching Mitchell with his right hand. Joe feinted with a right and scored with a left jab to the head."

WESTERN RACE IS CLOSE

ILLINOIS AND OHIO STATE TO
CLASH FOR TITLE.

Hard-Fought and Dogged Games
Expected as Conference Bat-
tle Is Brought to Close.

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—The western conference will close its 1920 football season tomorrow with every team in action and six eleven fighting for the first four places in the team standing.

The final day is expected to bring forth doggedly fought games, perhaps settled in the final minutes of play, which have characterized the "Big Ten" contests this year and made it one of the tightest on record. All eleven were reported in tip-top shape and in most cases there was little choice between the opposing teams. Illinois and Ohio State, champion

and runner-up, respectively, in 1919, again will meet in a game which will decide the championship. Ohio State with an undefeated record, was expected to be a slight favorite over the Illinois, who lost to Wisconsin, but the fact that the game would be played on Illinois' home field was looked upon by some to offset this slight advantage.

Ohio State by winning tomorrow would have a clean slate, while Illinois, if victorious, would possess a record of five victories and one defeat against a mark of 4½ for the Buckeyes.

The next three positions in the standing present such a complicated mix-up that Wisconsin, Indiana, Iowa and Chicago are fighting for them, with the outcome resting on tomorrow's contests. Wisconsin meets Chicago here and is given the advantage of previous scores. Victory for Wisconsin and Ohio State would place the Badgers in second place.

Michigan battles with the last place Minnesota eleven.

WHITE SOX PRIZE HELD UP

Money for Finishing Second Not
Awarded, Pending Probe.

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—The share of the 1920 world series prize money, amounting to almost \$15,000, which belongs to the Chicago American league club for finishing second, has not been awarded, it was announced today.

The old National commission is awaiting the outcome of the trials of eight White Sox players charged with "throwing" the 1919 championship to the Cincinnati Reds.

The "honest" White Sox voted to cut up the prize money into 16½ shares, excluding players charged with crookedness. This would make each full share about \$900.

It was reported today that the commission thinks the money should be divided into 23½ shares, which number would include the seven members of last year's team under indictment.

It is unusual and refreshing when one
reads of a professional athlete willing to
concede that his success was due en-
tirely to his own efforts and giving credit
to others. Walter Mails, pitcher for the
Seattle Seahawks baseball team, is unusually
generous in this connection, for he ascribes
one-half his pitching success to the man
at the receiving end.

This recalls a number of instances where
men who do the spectacular part of the
team play get practically all the credit,
much of which should go to the men who
pave the way for this individual brilliancy.

Take the case of a halfback in football.
He gets away for a run of 40 or 50 yards
down the field and the stands roar aloft
in a roar of sound and a confusion of
color. In the meantime the tackle or
guard in his line who made the hole he
went through probably is lying tangled up
in an incoherent mass totally unobserved
by the crowd, which has its eye on the
fellow who made the spectacular run.
