

TWO MORE ARRESTED FOR MAIL ROBBERY

Additional Caches Found
Totaling \$8000.

FOUR SACKS ARE MISSING

Nation-Wide Search Is Begun for
Kenneth Collins, Who Is Thought
to Have Obtained Part of Loot.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, Nov. 21.—Two new arrests, reported early today, and the recovery of approximately \$8000 were the latest developments in the Burlington mail-car robbery of a week ago last Saturday night, when property estimated worth \$3,500,000 was stolen.

Admission to have been made late last night by Fred E. Poffenberger, detained recently, led to the arrest of Poffenberger's father, Fred A. Poffenberger, and another son of the latter, Clyde H. Poffenberger, and other relatives of the money, federal officers said.

Seven thousand dollars in currency which Clyde Poffenberger was alleged to have admitted he received from his brother Fred was found in a small building at the home of Clyde's mother-in-law, Mrs. Willie Jacobson, federal officers declared. Another thousand was found buried in a cornfield near the home of the elder Poffenberger. The latter confessed, federal officials said, that the \$1000 had been given to him by his son Fred last Monday. A nation-wide search for Kenneth Collins, who is believed to have escaped with four sacks of loot, has been started.

Ten sacks of property were stolen. Four, it was reported, have not been recovered. Eight persons, one of them the wife of one of the accused, have been detained.

ABOUT \$600,000 IS MISSING

Fred Collins Believed to Have
\$100,000 Cash, Rest Bonds.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 21.—(Special.)—Three big shipments of treasure totaling more than \$600,000 have been identified in the loot taken from the treasure car of the transcontinental fast mail in the robbery of a week ago. A half-million dollars of this amount has not previously figured in the story of the robbery. These shipments were sent from San Francisco and Portland, Or., banks to Chicago banks. The \$500,000 was in liberty bonds and was in one of the pouches which has not yet been recovered.

As announced here today, the shipments were as follows: Fifty packages of \$1000 each, all \$200 bills, shipped by the Anglo-London-Paris National bank of San Francisco to the Continental and Commercial National bank of Chicago, totaling \$50,000.

Fifty \$10,000 temporary fourth liberty loan bonds consigned by the same western bank to the same Chicago bank, totaling \$50,000.

A consignment of \$61,000 in bank notes sent by the Ladd and Tilton bank, Portland, Or., to the First National bank of Chicago.

The \$60,000 cash shipment is believed to be the \$50,000 which the robbers divided among themselves and \$10,000 of which was recovered in the T. A. Daly chicken house.

Keith Collins, for whom the authorities are searching, is believed to have fled with the other \$25,000 and the \$300,000 in liberty bonds. These bonds had no connection with the \$500,000 in bonds which Poffenberger and Orville Phillips, two of the robbers, confessed to having turned.

A representative of the San Francisco bank or insurance company will reach Omaha at midnight tonight or tomorrow and will attempt to establish ownership of the \$20,000 in \$10 bills which were recovered.

The San Francisco representative is bringing with him identical wrappings of that used on the stolen money packages. The robbers will be asked to identify these wrappings as similar to the wrappings, together with the rubber stamp used to stamp the nominations in San Francisco, which will be compared with the stamp and wrappings on the packages yet intact recovered from the Daly residence. Only by proving the bills recovered to be the actual bills shipped by the western banks can those banks claim the money as their own.

Federal officers today believe that Collins, reported to have \$100,000 in cash and the \$300,000 San Francisco bonds, to be in hiding in Omaha. Yesterday it was believed he was making for Europe.

Both the shipments of bonds and cash were fully insured and the loss will fall on the insurance companies and not upon the banks. The shipments were insured in some San Francisco company whose name has not been made public.

A chronological history of the big events in the Council Bluffs mail robbery has been given by Chief Inspector Noah who has charge of the investigation.

Here it is: Robbery of mail car planned October 24 by two Phillips boys and Fred Poffenberger. They and others met at home of T. A. Daly frequently and rehearsed events of Saturday night. Confessions to be made if arrested. Planned to throw blame on "mysterious Omaha man."

A week ago yesterday the chauffeur of bandit car, believed to be Keith Collins, ex-captain in the automobile service, took Phillips boys and Poffenberger to Union Pacific transfer in Council Bluffs. Merle Phillips got into the engine, telling the engineer he wanted to ride to the station.

Orville Phillips and Poffenberger got on the step of the mail car. The automobile followed the slowly-moving train along the road.

Poffenberger smashed the window of the mail car door with a gun and unfettered the door. He and Orville got in. As the train slowed down by the Rock Island crossing, they threw out the first ten sacks they could get. The chauffeur of the automobile picked up the sacks. The boys jumped out of the car and were joined by Merle Phillips. The chauffeur placed five of the sacks in the automobile and drove away, leaving the boys with the other five. The Phillips boys hurried away from the wreckage. Poffenberger grabbed one sack, leaving the fifth. The robbery was done in only four minutes.

Merle Phillips, arrested Monday, confessed after 12 hours of grilling. Others then arrested, including H. A. Reed, lodger at home of Daly, who helped him hide the money.

Ellis Peterson gave the police the information involving Collins, her fiancé.

PORTLAND BANK DENIES LOSS

President of Ladd & Tilton Says
No Bank Notes Shipped.

According to E. Cookingham, president of the Ladd & Tilton bank, that

institution has not shipped any bank notes to Chicago, but it sends daily to that point large transactions in the form of checks or drafts.

"We have no knowledge of any of our consignments having been taken in the robbery mentioned in the Omaha dispatch," said Mr. Cookingham, "but it is entirely possible. I had heard nothing of it until now. We may receive word officially tomorrow."

SOVIET MARRIAGE EASY

No Formalities Needed and Divorce
Always Possible, Says Speaker.

The principal difference in getting married in Russia under the soviet regime and in getting married in the United States is that the former does away with all chance for the ministers, judges and officials to "graft" a little fee, according to Paul Turner, socialist lecturer, who spoke last night at Alamy hall on marriage and domestic relations in Russia.

All you have to do to get married under the bolshevik regime is to go to the office of the recorder of documents and have him register you as married to the woman of your choice. As a matter of fact, you don't even have to do that if you don't want to. Mr. Turner explained, for the soviet regime recognizes you as married if you are merely living together in a married state.

Divorce, Mr. Turner explained, was also given out by the same office and according to the law, must be given immediately on application of the parties to the marriage.

Mr. Turner cited the fact that the bolshevik regime had issued a manifesto that all children up to the age of 16 should be taken care of by the government and the feeding of the people by community kitchens as two great steps in freeing men and women from the yoke of the "capitalist" marriage.

5 KELSO VETERANS MARRY

Friday Benjamin Horton and Miss Hazel Wade were married. Horton was severely wounded and killed in action in the casualty lists for some time.

AGED PAUPER DIES ALONE

Body of Joshua Judd, 73, Found
in Canyon Near Roseburg.

ROSEBURG, Or., Nov. 21.—(Special.)—The body of Joshua Judd, 73, and an inmate of the county hospital, was found late last night in Dodson canyon, three miles east of this city, by a trapper and hunter. The old man strayed away from the hospital November 13. Since that time nothing has been heard of his whereabouts. It was thought he had gone to Kiddle, Or., where he had relatives.

He had probably been dead several days and when found was without shoes or hat. This was the fourth time Judd had wandered away from the home. The body was brought to this city.

SUGAR EMBARGO LIKELY

Further Exports of Havana Crops
May Be Stopped.

HAVANA, Nov. 21.—President Menocal has virtually decided to issue a decree placing an embargo on the exportation of all sugar held over from last year's crop, according to information from a reliable source.

This step, it was said, was due to the demoralized condition of the world's sugar market and the claim of Cuban sugar producers that they cannot produce sugar at present prices, and would be a temporary measure pending action by congress to authorize the government to contract loans for handling of the 1920-21 crop.

The names given were Thomas Smith, who with his wife and children occupied the house, and Donald MacLean and John Caldwell who were staying there.

Another sensational affair occurred in Lower Mount street. A party of armed men arrived in lorries and entered No. 22. Immediately the sound of firing was heard and after some time the party retreated from the house under heavy firing from the occupants who were alleged to be Sinn Feiners. There was a further exchange of shots in the street in which one man was killed and two were wounded.

Father O'Meehan, Father Griffin's colleague and senior curate, with whom Father Griffin lived, said in his church today that he had received five written threats of death since last May and that he did not dare sleep in his own home. He said Father Griffin had never received any threats.

BUILDING SCANDAL NOW NATION-WIDE

New York's Roar Heard From
Coast to Coast.

MILLIONS ARE INVOLVED

Robert P. Brindell, President of
Building Trades Council, Indicted
on Charges of Extortion.

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—Starting with a slight rumble in 1919, investigation of New York's "building trust" has gained such momentum in the last few weeks that its roar has been heard from coast to coast.

Here are a few of the results to date:

1. The city of New York already has rescinded several contracts for public work reaching into the millions, and now has considered the advisability of canceling all contracts for public buildings, lest the "trust" has a hand in the bidding.

2. Robert P. Brindell, president of the New York Building Trades council, has been indicted by a grand jury on charges of extortion from one building contractor and of attempted extortion from another.

3. An indictment charging perjury has been returned by the grand jury and threats of more indictments are in the air.

4. Testimony already entered in the record of the joint legislative committee investigating the "trust" has given hints of combinations in restraint of trade, charged by committee counsel to be nation wide in scope.

United States Takes Notice

5. Sensational disclosures have attracted the attention of the department of justice, which assigned a special official to watch developments and the senate committee on production and reconstruction, which, with subpoena power, has itself studied the housing situation throughout the country.

Samuel Untermyer, who is conducting the investigation for the joint legislative committee after claiming a year ago that he had "established a clear case of criminal conspiracy in the building trades, in confidence that the inquiry soon will assume wider scope. He has openly charged that the most important of these criminal combinations and secret agreements in the building trades are nationwide in their scope and cannot be effectively be reached by local prosecutions."

All types are to be found in the all-American chamber of commerce, where grimy laborers while watching an array of millionaire builders, labor leaders and lawyers pass in and out of the witness stand under the merciless fire of committee counsel.

Witnesses Plead for Mercy

Many of these witnesses are seen to squirm under the volley of questions. Once in a while one pleads for mercy as Mr. Untermyer pins him down.

"For God's sake, Mr. Untermyer, don't sacrifice me on this altar," implored one contractor who had testified to the domination of certain interests. "You don't want me to have my doors closed with a million dollars worth of business on hand, by answering you here."

But, day after day, the investigation goes on before the crowds of witnesses and in secret grand jury goes over testimony from the hearing selected for its attention.

Continually there occurs mention of a "code of practice." This cryptic term crops out ever and again among charges from a reliable source among building men to restrict outputs, control prices and choke competition. One witness admitted that trade secrets were controlled by a nation over by a national association.

Embedded in this testimony is "the code of practice," alleged to have been operated by John T. Hettrick, a lawyer, with several hundred subscribers including cut stone, plumbing, heating and ventilating contractors. It was charged that these building men submitted their bids through a central clearing house and the work was apportioned.

Thousands Paid to Hettrick

Through the "code" clients were numbered and colored cards were mailed them notifying them of the status of their bids. Production of the key sheets to the mysterious card system was one of the sensations of the investigation. Mr. Hettrick charged that the cards and other data had been stolen from his mail.

Witnesses testified that thousands of dollars were paid by clients to Hettrick under the "code," and that a large "insurance fund" was maintained by the various building groups, the purpose of which has not been explained.

Running along with the charges that under the "code" competitive bidding was throttled, was testimony by various witnesses of payments involving thousands of dollars to Robert P. Brindell, president of the building trades council and his walking delegates.

Brindell, who testified that he had been employed as a bricklayer, is a Providence, R. I., eight years ago, is one of the highest paid labor leaders in the United States and has been described by witnesses as a "kink" riding contractors with a high hand. He has publicly denied the charges, but has declined to return to the witness stand after one appearance, at which time he objected to being questioned as to his "personal life."

Brindell "No Piker."

According to witnesses, Brindell had absolute control over the 115,000 union men in the Building Trades council and could "strike" a job at any time if the contractor did not meet his demands. One witness declared that the labor leader figured \$1000 a floor for himself on a construction job. On several occasions, it was testified that Brindell had declined to take \$500 or smaller amounts offered him with the statement that he was "no piker."

One housewrecking contractor declared that his "million dollar business" had been ruined when he refused to pay tribute.

Throughout the hearings have been marked by sharp clashes between Mr. Untermyer and certain witnesses, including Hettrick, who was declared in contempt and his officers raided for documents which he had declined to produce.

Mr. Untermyer, in a statement, declared that he is not warring on the American Federation of Labor, adding that in driving out the "vulture" he was rendering the labor cause "the greatest assistance."

EXPLOSIVES HID IN COAL

French Charge Germans With Attempts at Vengeance.

PARIS, Nov. 21.—(Special Cable.)—German miners of the Ruhr valley are believed to be hiding explosives in the coal delivered to France by the ministry of public works. Several serious explosions have occurred recently in coal from the Ruhr mines. The last happened in a factory at Petit Marden, near Lille.

The ministry of public works has ordered that Ruhr coal be sifted and analyzed, for its officials believe the explosions result from a deliberate attempt to revenge Germany's defeat.

The dead include two courtmartial officers.

Captain Is Shot in Bed

Early today Captain Fitzgerald, military officer, was shot in bed in Earlfort terrace, a quiet street in London. Two other officers were shot in their beds in Pembroke street, a quarter of a mile away, and another in Hampden street.

Three men, suspected of being secret service agents, were attacked and shot, while asleep, in a house named Smyth, owner of a house, and another named Caldwell, were shot in a house in Donnybrook.

Captain MacLean was killed instantly and Smyth died in a few minutes.

At a house in Baginbott street Captain Newbury was shot by five men. In the Gresham hotel two former officers were shot during a fight which occurred with men believed to have been "black and tans" who entered the house. In Mount street two men are reported killed and a civilian wounded.

During the excitement in Mount street "black and tans" in a lorry heard cries for help and answered them. A fierce encounter ensued between Irish volunteers and "black and tans" in which two "black and tans" were killed and several volunteers wounded.

The official list of those killed in the raids follows: Major Dowling, Captains D. L. MacLean, Newbury, Baginbott, Fitzgerald and Price; ex-Captain P. McCormick and Messrs. Bennett, Aimes, Mahon, T. H. Smith and L. A. Wilde.

Two Cadets Found Dead

Cadets Garin and Morris of the Royal Irish Constabulary were found dead in a garden after they had failed in an attempt to reach the garrison to spread the alarm of the massacre.

The wounded are: Colonel Goldie, Captain Kinnelly and Messrs. Murray and Caldwell and one other. Caldwell was first reported killed.

Captain MacLean and Messrs. Smith and Caldwell were attacked by 12 men in a house in Northampton road. They were taken from their bedrooms to the top story of the house where they were shot.

Most of the civilian victims were ex-service men who held positions in administrative departments closely connected with the administration of justice. The officers in some cases were marked men because of their prominence in courtmartial proceedings.

3000 AT GAME SEARCHED

Many Revolvers Declared Found After Dublin Clash.

LONDON, Nov. 21.—A dispatch received in London from official sources in Dublin said that when mixed forces of British and Irish troops surrounded Croke Park they were fired upon by Sinn Fein pickets when they were entering the stadium. A fire, killing and wounding a number. About 3000 persons were then searched and many revolvers were found.

In addition to other casualties a man and a woman were killed in the crowd owing to the crowd stampeding. A number of women participated in the morning attacks in Dublin, according to a correspondent of the London Times. In one case 40 raiders arrived at a house on bicycles.

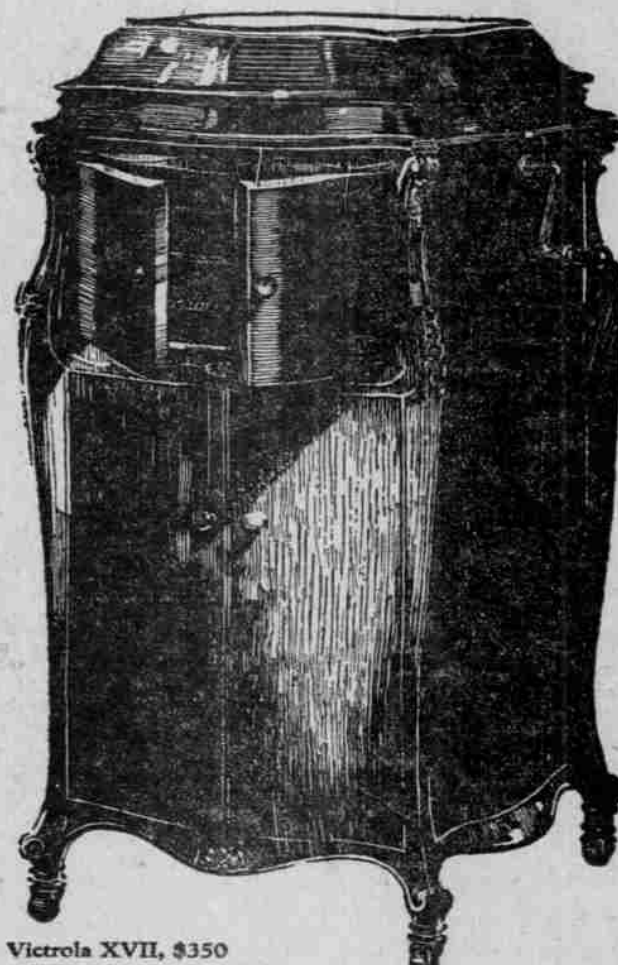

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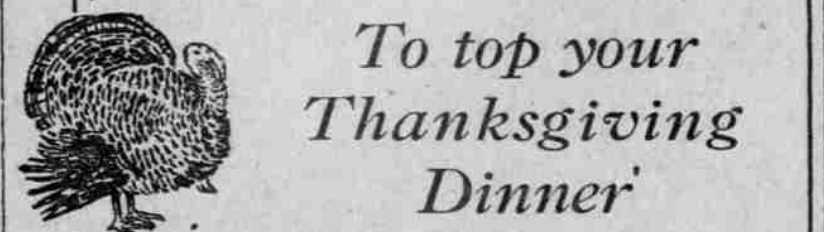
