

CLUB FORMALLY OPENS

OLD COLONY MEMBERS MOVE
* INTO NEW QUARTERS.Royal Suite at Multnomah Hotel
Becomes Home of Local
Organization.

The formal opening of the Portland Old Colony club, international business men's organization, held at the Multnomah hotel yesterday, was attended by 150 business and professional men of the city who are included in the membership of 375 already signed up here.

The club quarters are in the royal suite at the Multnomah hotel and will include three conference rooms, lounge, dining room and other accommodations for members. The local club will be under the management of Charles Hoon Jr., resident manager, and two assistants, Harold Olson and Charles R. Jones.

The Old Colony club, which maintains branches in 19 cities in the United States, two in Canada and owns its own hotels in London and Paris, is an organization maintaining unrivaled service for its members both as a club home and as guide and assistant in making and planning trips in the United States and abroad. Not only does the club, through its managers and their assistants, attend to all details of travel as tickets and reservations by railway and passenger and other means incident to foreign travel, but it provides private conference rooms at the club available for members who wish to transact business with freedom from all outside interruption, private dressing rooms and baths, and put for the comfort and convenience of its members in every way possible. The Portland branch in the second floor of the Multnomah hotel is to be established on the Pacific coast. The board of governors which manages the local affairs of each branch has not yet been selected from the Portland membership. E. C. Batten, executive secretary of the national advisory board, is arranging the installation of the Portland branch, will leave as soon as his work is completed to install another branch in Seattle. San Francisco already has an Old Colony club in operation, and one will be installed in Los Angeles soon.

EDUCATION TO BE TOPIC

Commissioner Claxton to Attend
Citizens Regional Conference.

A citizens' conference on education will be held at the Multnomah hotel, Saturday, December 4, under the direction of the bureau of education of the United States. The conference will be a regional one for Oregon and Washington and will conform in purpose to other conferences which are being held throughout the country.

P. P. Claxton, commissioner of education, will come here from Washington, D. C., to be present at the meeting. He is conducting these conferences in 12 parts of the United States.

The sessions here will be held in the morning, afternoon and evening. The meetings will be open to all interested in the cause of education and special invitations will be extended to civic organizations and clubs, members of the legislature, county and city school superintendents and representatives from colleges, universities and schools of the two states. The programme is being arranged by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction.

AUTOS PLUNGE OVER BANK

Drivers Lose Control Trying to
Avoid Collision.

K. T. Yamada, 269½ Everett street, and W. H. Hewis, 1440 Williams boulevard, were slightly injured yesterday morning when their automobiles plunged over the embankment along the Williams boulevard near St. Johns. Both men were taken home after their cuts and bruises were dressed.

Yamada, who was driving a closed car, lost control when he attempted to pass an auto-truck driven by Hewis. Yamada's car plunged over the bank, falling a distance of 300 feet. It is almost a total wreck. At about the same moment, Hewis lost control of his truck and it plunged a distance of 150 feet down the bank, but was not badly damaged.

FAILING ESTATE \$300,000

Widow Receives Bulk of Property;
College Gets \$30,000.

An estate approximating \$300,000 in value was left to James F. Failing, who passed away October 11. His will, filed for probate yesterday, leaves the greater part of it to his widow, Jane C. Failing. All of his children and several grand children are provided for. Mr. Failing left a bequest of \$30,000 to McMinnville college for a girls' dormitory and gave an equal sum to the Oregon Expositor state convention.

Each of his children receive \$5000 and his widow is to have \$100,000 and her home. The remaining property, after bequests have been made, is to be divided in half, of which one portion goes to the widow and the rest equally among the children.

Two granddaughters, Mary and Jean Failing, each will receive \$2000 to be held in trust. A niece, Katharine Frederick Failing Ritz, gets \$3000 and a nephew, James Ellison Failing, a similar sum. Mr. Failing's direct heirs are his children, Edward J. John C. Frederick E. and Henrietta Failing of Portland and Kate W. Failing of Oregonia, South India.

ARTISTRY and comedy combine to make a well-balanced bill at the Pantages theater this week. Fletcher Norton and Violet Horner present an unusual act which they call "Inspiration," a number which gives them plenty of opportunity to display their varied talents.

Unlike most acts of this character, it has a unity of arrangement and a beauty of setting that alone makes it worthy of attention. Norton and his partners have splendid voices and they know well how to use them. Violet's solo, a pretty little aria, is especially well done and won her much applause. She is a petite maiden who wears beautiful gowns and is a graceful dancer.

Norton plays cleverly on the piano and sings several original songs. His dancing is a type all his own. The act closes with symphonies of classical music.

Hughie Clark, billed as the "commander-in-chief of the army of fun," is a constant delight with his seemingly endless patter and fund of stories. He makes the most of every funny situation and sings entertainingly a number of nonsensical ditties. His method of "stepping" is novel and he was called back yesterday several times to demonstrate some of his latest stunts.

The three Moran sisters appear in a diverting number, "The Musical Melange." They all play the violin remarkably well and delight with solos and ensemble numbers. One sister plays the piano and trombone as well, and all three can sing. They play a variety of numbers, classical and popular, and some with plenty of jazz.

Giddy and Giddy present a different sort of tumbling act which starts out as if it were to be a fancy dance number and ends by showing many feats of strength.

Will Morris, in "Tattered Talent," provokes many laughs just by falling about the stage and getting mixed up in most amazing ways with the furniture. He does some new bicycle stunts.

Boris Bridkins company closes the programme with some interesting dances and songs.

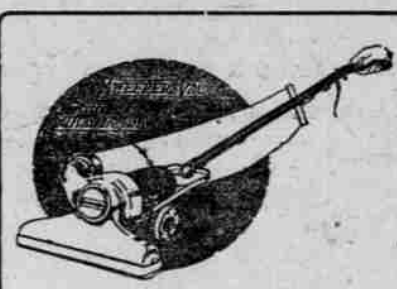
