

ASSASSINATION ORGY SUBSIDES IN DUBLIN

26 Dead, 70 in Hospital After
Sunday Outbreak.

POLICE UPHOLD KILLINGS

Football Crowd Fired on to Avenge
Military, Defense of
Authorities.

DUBLIN, Nov. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—Twenty-six persons are dead and 70 others are in hospitals as a result of Sunday's orgy of assassinations and the wholesale shooting in Crooke Park, where soldiers fired on the crowd which gathered to witness a football game.

Aside from military activities and shootings, including the Mansion house, it appeared that yesterday's outbreak, following the lines of other Irish disturbances, was not being sustained.

The shooting in Crooke park is defended by the authorities on the ground that the men who participated in yesterday's murders were present at the football match. The defense of the military, it was said, was to prevent their exit and search each individual as he passed out through the turnstiles.

The plan failed because of the general stampede, people scaling the walls of the park and many going into the houses across the road, from which they were dragged by the military.

No trains were running and no motoring was allowed today in the belief that the men wanted were still in the city and that their capture might be effected by an exhaustive search.

The houses of two Sinn Fein leaders at Swords, six miles from Dublin, were burned this morning. At Skerries, Patrick Matthews, a Sinn Fein laborer, was seriously wounded. At Rush, a neighboring village, armed forces entered the house of a Sinn Fein leader named McCann, dragged him to the road and shot him dead.

American Slain in Dublin.

MORRISTOWN, N. J., Nov. 22.—Lieutenant Peter A. Ames of this city was killed during yesterday's rioting in Dublin, according to a cable message received here today by his brother, J. M. Ames. A previous message had announced his engagement to Miss Millicent Ewing, daughter of the late Mayor and Lady Alexander Ewing of London.

More Troops to Quell Irish.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—The sending of additional troops to Ireland is being seriously considered, it was stated today from the war office this afternoon. London was waiting anxiously and fearfully for further news from Dublin following the reports of yesterday's horrors, but so far only meager dispatches had been received.

Dead Man Challenged; Killed.

NAPAN, County Meath, Ireland, Nov. 22.—Austin Cowley, a journalist, while going through the Napan workhouse gate today, was challenged by a military sentry. Cowley, who was deaf, did not hear the challenge and was shot dead.

Constable Shot; House Fired.

NEWRY, Ireland, Nov. 22.—Head Constable Kearney was shot, and probably mortally wounded here last evening by unknown persons. Subsequently the house of former Sergeant Curran of the constabulary was set afire.

Slain Military Officer Found.

CORK, Ireland, Nov. 22.—The body of an unidentified military officer, dressed in civilian clothing, was discovered this morning in a field two miles outside Cork. It was reported to have been due to bullet wounds.

Black and Tans Ambushed.

LEAP, County Cork, Ireland, Nov. 22.—Two "black and tan" constables were ambushed here last night. One was killed and the other dangerously wounded.

INJURIES PROVE FATAL

Woman Dies After Being Run
Down by Automobile.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Mrs. Minnie Z. Notelme, 58 years old, died at 1 o'clock today from injuries received when hit by an automobile near her home at Orchard as she was returning from church last night.

Dr. A. W. Stoen, who was driving the car, said he passed another car and dimmed his lights and as soon as he had passed the other car put his lights on full again. Just as he did so he saw the woman in front of his car and though he made a strenuous effort to avoid hitting her and stopped his machine, he could not prevent the accident. He brought the woman to St. Joseph's hospital, where she died.

Mrs. Notelme was born in Kalamazoo, Mich., but had been a resident at Orchard for many years.

under the treaty terms if the American officials kept their part of the pact, the president concluded:

"The Haitian government is under humiliating guardianship for lack of co-operation. Its effort to collaborate with good will is in vain, disdained and repulsed. It seems that there does not exist between the two governments an amicable contract that the two parties are obligated to respect. The civil administration is more oppressive than the military administration."

EXAGGERATION IS CHARGED

Major Turner Defends Marines on
Return From Haiti.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Stories of atrocities by United States marines in Haiti have been "grossly exaggerated," declared Major Thomas Turner, for the last 14 months chief of staff to Colonel Wheeler in Haiti, on his arrival here today. His opinion was shared by Lieutenant Walter Farrell, who came back on the same boat after 15 months' service.

The marines "never killed without cause and only to save their own lives," said Major Turner. "While the people are talking of indiscriminate killings in Haiti, they might ask as to the number of decapitated

bodies of marines sent back to the United States," added Lieutenant Farrell.

"Although there were times when rumors would seem to have been justified, I do not know of one case in which the situation was taken advantage of," Lieutenant Farrell said.

FAREWELL VISITS PAID

German ex-Empress Seen by Family; Condition Critical.

DOORN, Holland, Nov. 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—All the Hohenzollerns are making what may be their last visit to the German ex-Empress Augusta Victoria. Prince Oscar and his wife arrived at Doorn today and Prince Eitel, Frederick is expected tomorrow.

In order not to over-excite the ex-empress with an entire family reunion, her children are making visits in turn. Prince Adalbert and Prince Furstenberg, the first to arrive, went back to Germany just after Prince Oscar's arrival this morning. The crown prince, Frederick William, will see his mother later.

The condition of the ex-empress was considered most serious. She passed a good night, but her temperature this morning reached 102.2.

WOMEN ATTACK SPEECH

Belgian Delegate Urged to Work
for World Disarmament.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—The Women's Peace society, with its members in many countries, today cabled Senator Henri la Fontaine of Belgium, member of the league of nations council, notice of its dissent from his statement before the council of Geneva last week that the time is not yet ripe for world disarmament.

The society said it "urges immediately and unreservedly that the only hope of the salvation of the human race."

"Women," the greatest sufferers from war, have no voice in the council," said the cablegram. "Against this manifest injustice we earnestly protest."

FINANCE PLAN IS SOUGHT

Revival of Corporation Urged by
Bankers, Says Director.

CHICAGO, Nov. 22.—Eugene Meyer Jr., former managing director of the war finance corporation, announced today that hundreds of bankers who met in a conference at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel in New York, agreed to support a plan to revive the finance corporation.

Reputed Thief Is Arrested.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—William Williams, alias "Wild" Chiakas, wanted here for grand larceny, was arrested in Portland today and returned to this city. Chiakas admits that he is the man who stole \$204.70 from a bowl in the California restaurant. When the police got on his trail he gave the money a friend to put back in the bowl, he says.

Publication Manager Named.

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY, Salem, Or., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Truman Collins, sophomore from Portland, has been elected to manage the 1923 Willamette, the official publication of the junior class. Collins at present is circulation manager of the Willamette Collegian, Rodney Alden of Salem was named to edit the yearbook. He is associate editor of the Collegian.

League to Check Massacres.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—(Jewish Telegraphic Agency.)—The Jewish board of deputies at its meeting here yesterday was informed by Lucien Wolf, secretary of the joint foreign committee of organized Anglo-Jewry, that the league of nations had accepted the committee's proposal with regard to massacres and would in future take effective measures against them.

Clatsop Gains 99 Children.

ASTORIA, Or., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—The census just completed shows there are 6588 children of school age in Clatsop county, 99 more than last year. The number in the Astoria district is 4439, an increase of 89 in the past year.

ENDURANCE NEARING END, SAYS DE VALERA

Reprisal for Shooting Into
Crowd Is Hinted.

REGIME IS ATTACKED

Action of Military in Ireland Is
Characterized as Repetition
of Amritsar Massacre.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Eamonn de Valera, "president of the Irish republic," in a statement here today declared that when the British officer who commanded the troops that fired yesterday in a Dublin football crowd "is made to feel" by Irish republicans "that he may not commit these crimes with impunity," his death will be "classified by the British-controlled press as another murder by the Sinn Feiners."

The conduct of the British troops in swooping down and firing their machine guns on an unarmed people is simply a repetition of the Amritsar massacre in India, and whatever British officer was in charge in Dublin will be commended for it and rewarded as Dyer was," he said.

Civilians Declared Attacked.

"And later, when that officer is made to feel by Irish republicans that, although he may commit these crimes with impunity so far as his own government is concerned, he may not do it with impunity so far as Irishmen can secure it, his death will be claimed by the British-controlled press as 'another murder by the Sinn Feiners.'"

"English policemen in Ireland, long before one of their number was killed, shot down unoffending civilians, and verdicts of willful murder were returned by coroners' juries against them," continued Mr. de Valera. "Instead of being punished, they were commended and promoted by the British government."

Endurance Held Limited.

"It is not in human nature—or at least in the nature of spirited people—to go on enduring forever."

"The Irish people have learned again the old lesson that as long as the patient will suffer the cruel will kick and having no other avenue of redress, they naturally pursue the individual of those forces who are responsible for outrages and are as enemy spies amongst them, richly deserving death if any human beings deserve death, for they provide the alien government with knowledge and the strength to persecute and inflict endless misery on a whole nation."

"There is no comparison between the guilt of the British soldiers, who from tanks and armored cars in full war outfit, with machine guns and rifles, mow down unoffending civilians as they walk the streets intent on their ordinary business or to attend a football match, or murder prominent Irishmen in the bosoms of their families, and the Irishmen who kill these soldiers engaged in an armed campaign of violent aggression against the Irish people's rights."

"No British soldier has a right to be in Ireland. Those who are there are guilty of making war—on civilians, but a barbarous war—on people who are guilty of no act of aggression against England."

ACCUSED WANTS TO TALK

Ex-Shipping Board Secretary Asks
Chance to Answer Charges.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Lester Slater tonight addressed a communication to Chairman Walsh requesting an opportunity to testify before the house committee investigating the shipping board of the United States.

Slater, ex-secretary of the board, was accused by T. K. Sands, a committee witness, of collusion in obtaining contracts from the Wallace Downey Shipbuilding company of New York.

The charges are denied by Slater.

FISTS FLY IN IRISH TILT

For John Molson, coalition unionist, who was Mr. Devlin's opponent, arose and apologized to Mr. Devlin, to the speaker and to the house, saying he was afraid he had allowed himself to be provoked and had forgotten himself.

Mr. Devlin accepted the apology and assured Major Molson that he had no personal feeling.

"The authorities have reason to believe that Sinn Fein gunmen went to Dublin Saturday under the guise of attending the football game in order to carry out the murders. Consequently, a mixed force surrounded the grounds. This force was fired on, and in firing back, killed 19 and wounded others."

Revellers Declared Found.

Sir Hamar also gave details of the finding of revellers and the crushing to death of a man and a woman, which latter he regretted.

At present conditions in Dublin, he stated, he had received at 1 o'clock a telegram saying everything was apparently normal in that city, no Irish disturbances having developed.

Three of the assassins of British officers in Dublin were captured red-handed with their arms, he announced. One of the assassins had been wounded, he added.

After Mr. Devlin had concluded his statement, there was a passage at arms between Jeremiah MacVeagh, nationalist member for South Down, and Sir Edward Carson, the Ulster leader. Sir Edward called the nationalist member a "liar" for saying Sir Edward had accepted the use of rifles in Ireland."

Mr. Bonar Law, the government leader, brought about peace by announcing that Wednesday will be given over for a discussion of the Irish question in the house of commons.

RENT BILLS TO BE CUT

GOVERNMENT BEGINS SURVEY

TO REDUCE EXPENDITURES.

Many Millions of Dollars Are Paid
Annually by Uncle Sam for
Additional Office Space.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—A nationwide survey to determine government expenditures for office rental in the larger cities, in progress by the treasury with a view to laying plans for cutting down this outlay.

Figures so far tabulated, according to officials, indicate a total rent bill of many millions a year. Reports from four of the largest cities alone show a total of more than \$2,800,000 a year, and as the survey includes about 150 cities of more than 100,000 population, officials expected the other reports to be in proportion.

New York, with \$1,596,726 a year, has the highest rent bill. Boston pays \$246,882 annually for additional office space. Chicago \$173,604 and Philadelphia \$103,862.

When more detailed figures are available, officials said, the facts will be set forth in a letter to congress.

WOMEN UNITE FOR LAWS

Six Feminine Organizations Get
Together for Legislation.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 22.—Six national organizations of women, through representatives meeting here today, agreed to organize the women's joint congressional committee to forward legislative measures in which they are interested.

Wood Park of the National League of Women Voters was elected chairman.

The General Federation of Women's Clubs, the National Council of Women, the Women's Trade Union league, the Woman's Christian Temperance union, the Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher associations and the National Consumers' league agreed to the association.

War Medical Men to Meet.

BOSTON, Nov. 22.—An international congress of medicine and pharmacy, to which will be invited all physicians and pharmacists who served in the armies of the allied or neutral countries during the world war, will be held at Brussels in June, 1921, under the auspices of the medical corps of the Belgian army, according to an announcement made today.
