

TURKEY AND RUSSIA ONE AGAINST ALLIES

India, Algeria, Morocco and
Egypt to Be Freed.

BARS DOWN TO RADICALS

Soviet to Finance Moslems and Aid
With Two Army Corps, More
if Needed.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 24.—An agreement entered into by the Russian bolsheviks and the Turkish nationalist forces of Mustafa Kemal Pasha, according to private information received here today includes the following points:

Turkish control to be established in the new states of Arabia and Syria. Facilities to be accorded Russian delegates with a view to the development of communism in Turkey. Russia and Turkey agree to "liberate Moslem countries, such as India, Algeria, Egypt, Tunisia, Persia, from foreign yoke," and grant them independence.

Russia recognizes the independence of the Moslem states in her territory and guarantees their integrity. Russia agrees to grant financial and material aid to Turkey, including two army corps, followed by more if necessary.

Hostilities may be continued against the entente without previous reference to the national councils of both countries.

U. S. SOVIETS TO BE FORMED

Russia Expects 5,000,000 to Be
Idle by January 1.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—Russian soviet authorities estimate that the unemployed in this country will number 5,000,000 by the end of the year and two representatives of the third international have been sent to organize soviets here, according to information from Moscow.

The representatives of the international plan to arrive in the United States in December, it was said, and propose to form committees of the unemployed in connection with the communist party, establishing soviets of each trade. Their mission, the advice stated, is to unite the revolutionary movement in America into one fighting body to bring about armed revolution.

While the government officials discounted the international's estimate of unemployment every precaution is being taken to keep the soviet organizers from entering the United States.

POLES VANQUISH UKRAINIANS

Petlura's Troops Disarmed at
Frontier; 14 Guns Taken.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—The last remnants of the troops of General Petlura, the Ukrainian leader, who crossed the Ukrainian frontier into Poland and have been disarmed by Polish troops, according to Tuesday's official statement from Moscow.

"Previously," added the statement, "our troops decisively attacked Petlura's rear guard and captured, among other things, 14 guns and many prisoners."

Armenian Capital Reported Taken

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 24.—It is reported from a Turkish source that Brivan, capital of Armenia, has been entered by Turkish nationalist forces.

Semenoff Going to Japan.

TOKIO, Nov. 24.—General Semenov, leader of anti-bolshevik forces east of Lake Balkal, Siberia, is coming to Japan, it is said in press reports. Assertions are made that his forces are disbanding.

HIGHER SALARIES URGED

TEACHERS OF MARION COUNTY
APPEAL TO LEGISLATURE.

Better Pay for State and Other Superintendents, as Well as School Staffs, Is Favored.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 24.—(Special.)—Marion county teachers' association here today, adopted resolutions recommending that the legislature at its next session increase the salary of the state superintendent of public instruction to at least \$5000 a year; also that the minimum salary for all county superintendents be fixed at \$2400 a year and for teachers at \$1200 a year.

O. V. White, state superintendent, was elected president of the Principals' club, while the vice-presidents included B. T. Youel of Silverton, Mr. Mitchell of Woodburn and Florence Bardsley of Salem Heights.

J. E. Coleman of Woodburn was named secretary and treasurer. U. S. Dotson, retiring president of the club, was elected as delegate to represent the club at the next annual meeting of the Oregon State Teachers' association in Portland.

Addresses were delivered by P. L. Campbell, president of the University of Oregon; J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction; E. J. Klemme of the Washington Normal school and Dr. L. L. Wirt, who recently returned to the United States after several years spent in central Europe.

BRIDGES ACCUSED OF MORE EXTORTION

Three Additional Indictments
Returned in Trust Probe.

CHIEF OF STAFF IS HELD

Price Fixing and Control of All
Wrought Steel Business Is
Charged at Hearing.

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—New York's warfare against the alleged building trust today brought forth three new indictments charging extortion, as well as testimony tending to show that the long list of other producers of construction materials which are alleged unlawfully to hold prices uniform throughout the country.

While the allied forces of an extraordinary grand jury and the joint legislative committee made this progress in their major offensives, legal skirmishes occurred in two courts and the city's independent inquiry into its millions of dollars in contracts was postponed until Monday.

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Started to America When Ob-
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German manufacturers declared the contracts for the airplanes were drawn since July 19, when, in their opinion, the prohibition against the manufacture and sale of airplanes under article 192 of the Versailles treaty expired.

STUTTGART, Germany, Nov. 23.—If completion of Zeppelin airships at Lake Constance and Nordstern should be permitted by Germany, the allies will undoubtedly claim the right to new building plans and inventions through which the Zeppelin concern has intended to promote the use of airships for "commercial purposes." This statement was made in an article printed in the Schwabische Kurier by Dr. Eckener, one of the engineering engineers employed by the Zeppelin company.

Eckener vaguely attacked the action of the allies in seizing Zeppelin machines, characterizing the taking of these vessels as "naked robbery."

The only purpose of such procedure, he added, "is the entente's desire to keep the soviet road to Germany economically."

FARMER CRAZED BY LOSS

TRAGEDY INSTEAD OF THANKS-
GIVING DINNER RESULT.

Wife and Three Children Slain
With Hatchet With Which Wield-
er Intended Killing Goose.

FENDER, Neb., Nov. 24.—George H. Binklage, a farmer living near here, reputed to be wealthy, today killed his wife and three children with a hatchet, and wounded his baby, then hanged himself to a rafter in the barn today.

Neighbors of Binklage said they believe he was dependent because of the decline in the value of his land and because of the reduction in the price of farm products. Binklage committed the deed with a hatchet, with which he presumably had intended killing a goose for the family's Thanksgiving dinner tomorrow.

According to a hired girl, who discovered the bodies a short time afterward, Binklage had been discussing the Thanksgiving dinner at the house, the girl said, and left shortly afterward for the barn. Here he seized the hatchet and killed his wife, later killing his son. After slaying the latter he returned to the house, where he killed the two other children and wounded the baby.

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W. E. Crumb Falls Into Saws at
Morton and Dies Instantly.

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One witness Crumb appeared to have slipped just after the last cuts were dumped off the carriage onto the rolls and as the carriage descended on him he apparently fell into the saws.

Crumb was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Morton of Morton, pioneers of this section, and married Miss Chamberlain of Tacoma two months ago.

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WORKINGS OF CANAL STUDIED BY HARDING

Keen Interest in Future of
Waterway Shown.

PUBLIC RECEPTION HELD

President-Elect Is Entertained at
Dinner by Governor of Zone.
Welcome Big One.

CRISTOBAL, Canal zone, Nov. 24.—(By the Associated Press.)—Senator Warren G. Harding, United States president-elect, gave up golf and motoring today to make a personal study of the canal, the chief working of the Panama canal. He planned to leave here some time soon on a government mine sweeper and looked forward to a leisurely journey through the waterway.

Mr. Harding has taken a keen interest in the future of the canal and was known to believe it to be one of the outstanding national assets as regards foreign commerce.

During the last campaign, Colonel Chester Harding, governor of the canal zone, accompanied him on the trip and tonight was his host at a dinner at the Pacific terminal of the canal. The dinner was followed by a public reception. The party will remain on the Pacific coast until Friday. President-elect Harding will attend a dinner given by President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt at the palace tomorrow.

The steamer Parismina was welcomed into the harbor yesterday by a swarm of army airplanes and several submarines, which met her three miles out and conveyed her to her dock. A large crowd cheered the president-elect and his wife and a formal greeting was extended by Governor Harding, Brigadier-General Kennedy and Rear-Admiral Johnson, commanders, respectively, of military and naval forces in the canal zone.

CIVILIAN IS MADE MAJOR

Ex-Guardsman Wins Commission
in Regular Army.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 24.—(Special.)—William M. Inglis, for seven years colonel of the second Washington infantry national guard, today telegraphed his acceptance of a commission as major in the regular army, infantry branch, and will report within four days to Colonel John L. Hayden at Fort Worden, the officer under whom Major Inglis received his first military training back in the early 90s, when Colonel Hayden was commandant of cadets at the University of Washington.

Major Inglis took his military examinations at Camp Lewis last month and was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the regular army. His commission will date from last July 1st.

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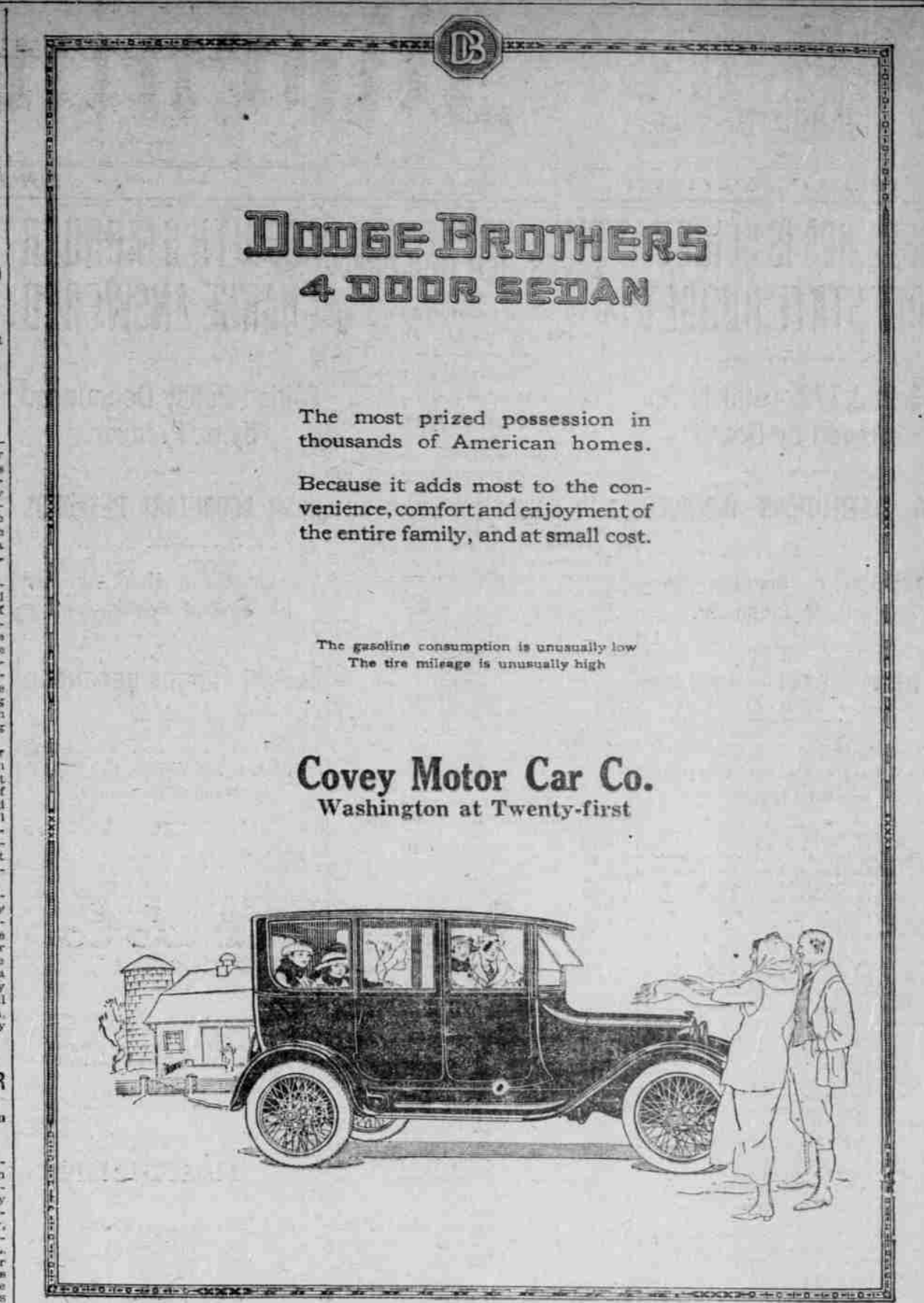
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
