

**VANCOUVER ELECTS  
J. P. KIGGINS MAYOR**

Ralph E. Percival, Son of Late Executive, Treasurer.

**COUNCIL ALSO IS CHOSEN**

G. H. Wilde, A. G. Enright, Chris Engleman and E. V. Coats Are Chosen—R. E. Brady Attorney.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Dec. 7.—(Special.)—J. P. Kiggins was elected mayor of Vancouver at the election today in which only a medium sized vote was cast.

Ralph E. Percival, son of the late mayor of Vancouver who committed suicide as the result of despondency over ill health, was elected to the office of city treasurer.

Another noticeable feature of the voting was the defeat of William Kerr, candidate endorsed by the Vancouver Trades and Labor Council, by Robert E. Brady in the race for city clerk.

The only woman who sought office at the hands of the people was defeated when Chris Engleman was elected to the city council over Mrs. Nellie Booth to represent the city at large.

William C. Bates was chosen for city attorney practically without opposition.

The filling of the three other vacancies in the council resulted in the choice of the following: G. H. Wilde, A. G. Enright and E. V. Coats.

**WALLA WALLA SHAKEUP DUE**

Ben F. Hill, Elected Mayor, Promises Police Department Change.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Dec. 7.—(Special.)—Ben F. Hill, elected mayor yesterday over Mayor D. F. Powell, will take office with the new commission December 20. He has announced there will be numerous changes in the police department, but none in the fire department unless Fire Chief Metz requests it.

Mr. Hill said he is attempting to get some new men for the police department, "capable and competent, who, if they accept the positions offered them, will do so at personal sacrifice in the way of salary."

"I will do the very best I can to increase the efficiency of the men in the department considering the financial phase of the situation," he declared, "and I believe I am in a fair way to succeed."

The police department has been the cause of defeat of every man who has held the office of mayor in Walla Walla under the commission form of government. No mayor has ever been re-elected.

Mr. Hill is being swamped with applications for jobs at his disposal.

**HOQUIAM WOMAN ELECTED**

Board of Education Place Won for First Time in History.

HOQUIAM, Wash., Dec. 7.—(Special.)—For the first time in the history of Hoquiam schools, the board of education will have as one of its members a woman, Mrs. F. A. Peterson, having won that honor at the election today. Ralph D. Emerson, local banker, was the other winner. W. E. Campbell and James Slack, who were candidates for re-election, were left far behind in the 537 votes cast.

The city registration was 2600. The new board will begin functioning in January. Mrs. Peterson is an ex-teacher and has raised a large family.

**CROSON, SHORROCK LEADING**

Little Interest Is Shown in Seattle School Election.

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 7.—Early returns from the school election here today showed Carl E. Croson and E. Shorrocks leading Judge Richard Winsor and E. J. Brown for the two vacancies on the school board.

Only a relatively light vote was cast and little interest was shown in the election in any of the precincts.

**Chehalis Elects T. J. Long Mayor.**

CHEHALIS, Wash., Dec. 7.—(Special.)—Thomas J. Long, city commissioner the last three years, was elected mayor of Chehalis for the coming three years at the city election held yesterday, receiving 486 votes to 413 for Edward Deggeleher. There were three candidates for city commissioner, John Denhof receiving 735 votes, and John L. Maroon 611, these being elected. Thomas Long, the third candidate, received a total of 403 votes.

**Light Vote in Tillamook.**

TILLAMOOK, Or., Dec. 7.—(Special.)—With less than 700 votes cast out of a total registered vote of 4000 in the county, indications tonight were that the question of the county purchasing fair grounds and making improvements had carried by 120 votes. The question was submitted to the voters at a special election yesterday. Stormy weather is declared to account for the small vote.

**LIQUOR VIOLATION CHARGE**

Four La Grande Residents on Trial in Federal Court Here.

Trial of four La Grande citizens accused of illegal possession and transportation of liquor opened yesterday before Federal Judge Ben. The accused men are J. F. McDonald, Bert Hughes, Guy Duffington and Frank Heins.

It is asserted by the prosecution in the case, as outlined by Deputy Federal Attorney Fitzgerald, that Duffington was the intellectual force behind the alleged conspiracy, though it is not claimed that he handled any of the illicit liquor.

Among witnesses who testified yesterday were Roy Flexner, chief of police of La Grande, and Lee Warnick, sheriff.

**Check Raiser Admits Guilt.**

Lee Roy Nelson pleaded guilty yesterday of having altered the name on a pay-roll check and raising the amount to over \$90. He was sentenced by Presiding Judge Taxwell to two years in the penitentiary and paroled to the district attorney.

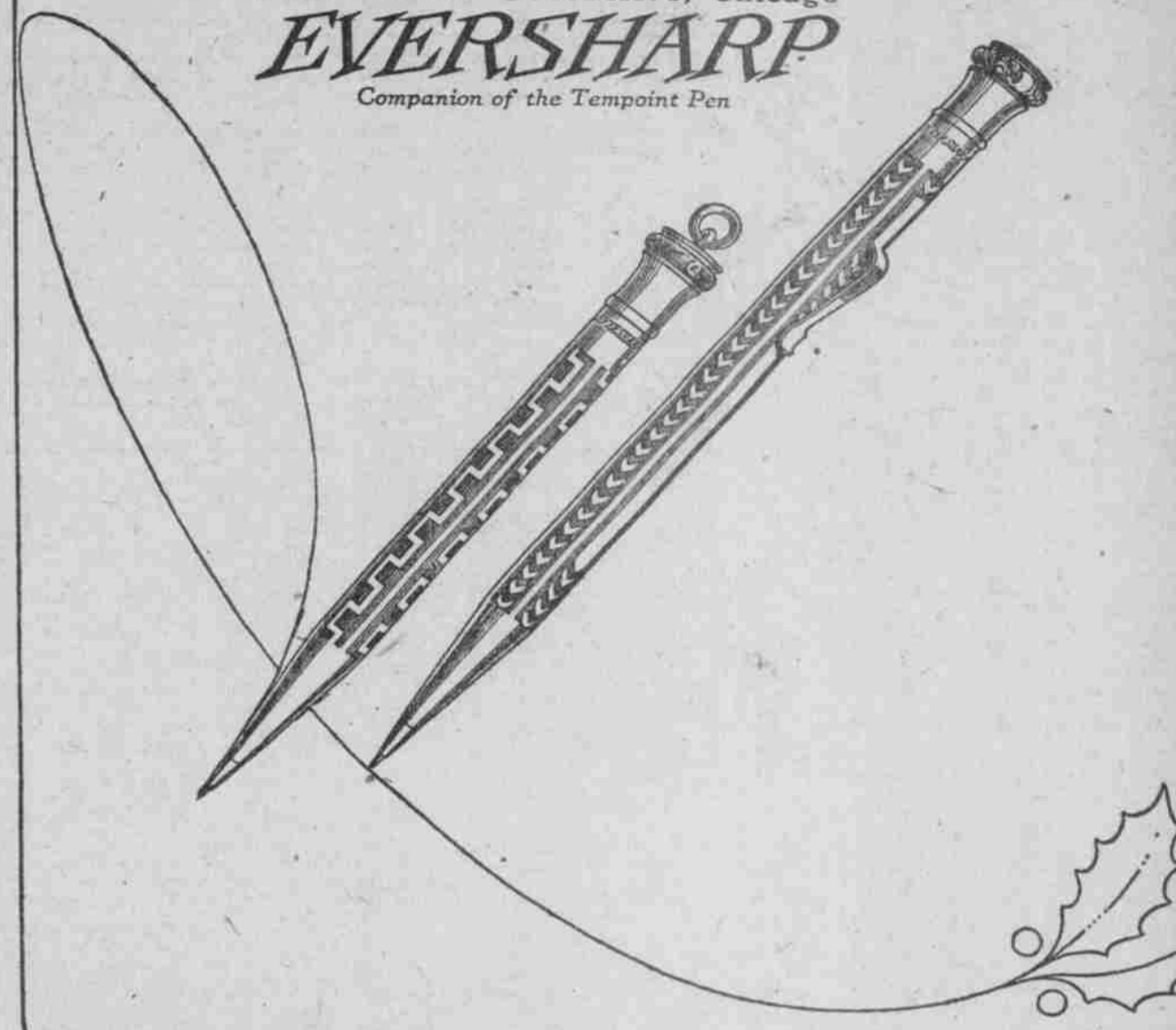
