SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 8.—Cancellation of the 1921 Pacific coast conference football schedule was announced today by Professor Leath, chairman of the University of Washington faculty athletic committee and secretary of the conference.

After a week of heated debate and wrangling over the weight, Joe Gorman, Portland's most popular boxer, has consented to box Al Grunan of Los Angeles at 133 pounds over the ten-round route in the main event of next Wednesday night's card at the Heilig theater.

Several weeks ago Gorman called on the statement, which was published in the afternoon edition, that he was ready to battle the lightweight first come first served. It seems that by lightweight Joe meant someone weighing 130 pounds, who might be classed as a cross between a featherweight and the next class up the fistic ladder.

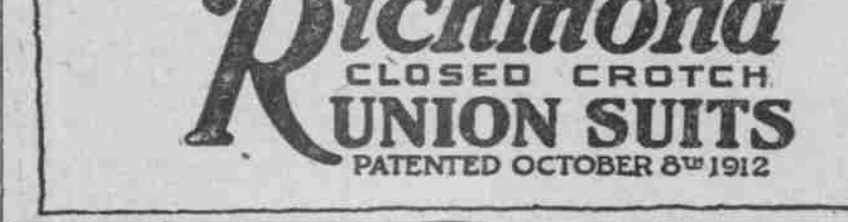


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100 OUT IN AGGIE SQUAD. COACH RUTHERFORD TRYING TO GET STRONG TEAM.
