STORM THAT WRECKED TENT CAUSES CHANGE IN PLANS - Sale May Be Continued Into Night.

PLANS FOR THE big auction of Laurelhurst lots, which is scheduled for today, were changed late yesterday and the auction will be held in the ballroom of the Multnomah hotel instead of the tent which had been erected for the purpose at East Thirty-ninth and East Gilliam streets.
The storm which swept Portland yesterday caused the change in plans. The tent was blown down and as the weather bureau did not promise relief today the Laurelhurst company concluded that it was better to secure the hotel quarters than to repair the tent. The sale of the lots will be conducted by the firm of Barry & Austin of Chicago for the Laurelhurst company, owner of the property.
