

TO RAISE FIVE MILLIONS FOR FAIR

Steps Taken to Incorporate Electrical Exposition Co.

OCK IS FOR PUBLIC

res May Sell for \$25 or \$10; Vancouver, Wash., Also Will Celebrate in 1925.

Five million dollars will be raised for the financing of the proposed 1925 exposition, according to a decision reached at a meeting of the city with committee members, who have been outlining plans for a fair, at the Portland hotel yesterday.

It was taken for incorporation of the Atlantic-Pacific Highway and Electrical Exposition company for amount, and P. E. Beach, chairman of the gathering, was authorized to appoint a committee of 15, including himself, to sign articles of incorporation so that could be immediately filed and actual work of financing started. In motion of Emory Olmstead the appointment of a committee of ten to outline plans for the carrying out of a systematic campaign of subscription to the corporation was authorized.

New Name Suggested. Charles F. Berg suggested that the name of the exposition might more properly have been made Pacific Electric rather than the reverse. Question was also raised as to whether it would not be more advisable to make the stock \$10 each rather than \$25, as had been originally planned. Both these matters were left to the hands of the committee, which to sign the articles of incorporation.

Mr. Beach in opening the meeting said that the gathering was primarily for the purpose of taking the city into confidence with reference to plans for the exposition and to the amount of the capital of the company that the movement might be made. He then read articles of incorporation giving proposed name and purpose of the exposition were read by George L. W. Secretary of the Columbia Electric League, the organization which was the originator of the plan for the exposition.

Riley Invites In Empire. Mr. Frank Branch Riley, who is in charge of the exposition, announced in a letter to the people of Spokane, Wash., in which Mr. Riley announced he was presenting to the people of Spokane the plan for the holding of an exposition here and inviting the Empire to participate.

Mr. Riley said that the company \$5,000,000 was made by Senator Joseph, who explained the purpose of the progress which had been made in the exposition. In accordance with the motion of Mr. Gratzke said that there were reasons why Portland should be in carrying out the plan for the exposition.

CITY TO BE ASKED TO VACATE STREETS

Thoroughfares Are Said to Bisect School Sites.

PETITION TO BE FILED

Director Woodward Is Scheduled to Take Matter Up With Council Today.

Discovery that dedicated streets traverse the center of three school sites will bring William F. Woodward, school director, before the city council this morning to petition for vacation of the streets in order that the school board may be in a position to construct the school buildings when funds are available.

Mr. Woodward will request that a portion of Wygant street be vacated for the Beech street school, a portion of Kellogg street be vacated for the Williams school in the St. Johns district, and a portion of Murray street be vacated in the new Hosford school site.

Private Tract Surrounded. Discovery of the dedicated streets running through the various school sites is supplemented by some interesting angles in the purchase of the Hosford school site, 2 1/2 acres on East Thirtieth and East Harrison streets, in Malone Heights, according to Mr. Woodward.

From the minutes of the school board proceedings of 1914 show that the board purchased this tract from Mrs. M. O. Lott, Brenner, and the groom was Charles R. Irvin. Mrs. Irvin is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Brenner, Clark street, and a deputy in the office of County Auditor W. R. Cox, which position she will retain for a time. Mr. Irvin is dispatcher for the Northern Pacific at this point.

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CRUELTY IS DIVORCE PLEA

WIFE OF ASTORIA PHYSICIAN FILES SUIT HERE.

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Former Miss Lillian Morgan Declares Husband Struck Her and Threatened to Kill Her.

Suit for a divorce was filed yesterday by Lillian M. Kinney against Dr. August Marshall Kinney of Astoria, charging cruelty. The plaintiff says her husband frequently struck her and has made threats to kill her, likewise has pulled her hair. She says the physician is well fixed financially and therefore asks \$250 per month alimony. \$2000 attorney's fees and one-third of the property interests.

Mrs. Kinney was formerly Miss Lillian Morgan, daughter of William G. Morgan of this city. She was married in 1917 in Astoria and has until very recently lived there with her doctor. She is now planning to make her home in Portland. Previous to the present marriage Dr. Kinney had been divorced from his first wife.

Annulment of his second marriage to the same woman is asked by Richard Grant Rodda, who is wedded to Marie Rodda. The complaint sets forth that the couple were divorced January 15, 1919, and remarried in Vancouver on May 25, the same year. Six months had not elapsed between the two actions.
