

ROOSEVELT STATUE TO DEPICT VIRTUITY

Dr. Coe Has Photographs
Showing Final Model.

LIFE AND SPIRIT SHOWN

Horse Reflects Strength and Action
While Colonel Sits Astride
Mount in Characteristic Pose.

Photographs of the final model for the Theodore Roosevelt statue have been received by Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, who will give the statue to the city of Portland. This model is the 13th of a series and has been selected by Dr. Coe as the one from which the large equestrian statue will be made.

"There have been many changes from the first to the last model," said Dr. Coe yesterday. "A. Phimister Proctor, the sculptor, changed his conception several times. He has been working on this model more than eight months."

The 13th model was approved by Dr. Coe recently when he visited the sculptor's studio in Palo Alto, Mr. Proctor will now begin on the working model, which will be about four feet high and will take about four months to complete.

Strength and Life Shown.
Mr. Proctor has been working the eight months to get the life and spirit which he desired into the horse on which Colonel Roosevelt will be seated. In his first model the horse is prancing and the rider is holding him in check. In the last model the spirit which Dr. Coe and the sculptor wanted is shown in the lifted head of the horse and the general attitude of strength and life.

"The more I see of it the more I think it is the right pose," wrote Mr. Proctor in a recent letter to Dr. Coe. "After all, that is the real test," said Dr. Coe. "When a statue 'grows' on the observer, then it is almost certain that it is good."

President Wilbur and his wife of Stanford university visited Mr. Proctor's studio and said that the horse was inspired with the idea which dominated the life of the colonel. "The pose of horse and man, the proportions and attitude and action have been the things the sculptor has been working on. The features of the face and other detailed work will be left until later on."

The former president, who was a close friend of Dr. Coe, will be shown as a rough rider. The sculptor has visited the Roosevelt family and has received from them many suggestions as to facial expression. The family has given him many pictures to be used in his work.

American Horse Is Model.
General Leonard Wood also has sent suggestions to Mr. Proctor about acrobatic and about the type of horse to be used.

"Following General Wood's suggestion, the horse chosen for the model was a real American horse with a small element of crossed thoroughbred," stated Dr. Coe. "I am very fond of horses and I want the statue to show my friend, the horse, as well as my friend, Theodore Roosevelt."

This will be the first equestrian statue in Portland and in Oregon. Dr. Coe hopes that it may suggest to other citizens the idea of giving statuary as a gift to the city.

"I believe that in time Portland may become a city which will be visited for its bronzes," he said. "The setting for statues here are splendid. I hope that Portland may have many statues to add to the beauty of the city."

Statue Will Cost \$35,000.
The completed statue will be 13½ feet high and together with the base will stand about 25 feet high. It will cost when completed at least \$35,000. Mr. Proctor may complete the statue in California without taking it to his studio in New York, as he had intended at first. John G. Hoover, who is a member of the board of regents of Stanford university, has made arrangements to provide a studio on the Stanford campus for the sculptor. Mr. Proctor probably will finish the statue there and then send it east to be cast in bronze.

The statue will not be ready to be unveiled here until about the end of 1921, Dr. Coe said. He had hoped to first to present it to the city during the 1921 Rose Festival. There is a possibility that it may be ready by Roosevelt's birthday, October 27.

Site Should Be Central.
The location has not been decided and probably will not be for some time. Dr. Coe has decided not to place it in the park at Montlake hospital because it would not be seen by as many persons there.

"I want it to be placed where everyone can see it," he said. "I am giving it to the city because the people of Portland have been so good to me and I want them to like it."

The park block in front of the Arlington club, a site at Sixth and Ankeny, Nineteenth and Washington and Laurelhurst park are among the places which have been suggested to the donor. Dr. Coe will make no decision until he has conferred with Mayor Baker, the council and others.

Dr. Coe will leave with his wife for Washington, D. C., Friday for a belated Christmas with two of his sons, George and Earl. He had hoped to stay about a month and while in the east will look for a suitable base for the statue.

NEW INDUSTRY IN VIEW

Eugene Creamery Association to
Discuss Proposed Project.

EUGENE, Or., Dec. 28.—(Special).—The question of erecting a large plant for the manufacture of milk powder in connection with the creamery and ice cream factory in this city will come up for decision at the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Eugene Farmers' Creamery association January 12.

Mr. Ohlsen and M. M. Boney, manager of the creamery, recently made a trip to the middle west to visit a number of such plants and were much impressed with the future of the industry. Milk powder is made from the whole milk and contains all the properties of the milk in its original form. A combination plant for the manufacture of powder, ice cream and butter would enable the association to take care of all the milk as well as butterfat that is produced in this section, is their report to the directors.

Bend Bank May Increase Capital.
SALEM, Or., Dec. 28.—(Special).—Permission today was granted the directors of the Central Oregon bank, with headquarters at Bend, to increase its capital stock from \$25,000 to \$50,000. The order authorizing the increase was issued by Will H. Bennett, state superintendent of banks.

LEGION DEMANDS ACTION

TELEGRAM ASKING PASSAGE
OF BILLS SENT.

91 Posts in Oregon, Officers and
Members Bombard Solons
With Requests to Act.

From the 91 posts of the American Legion in Oregon and from individual members, post and state officers of the veterans' organization, a flood of telegrams began to pour into congressional quarters in Washington yesterday, expressing the urgent desire for early passage of national legislation benefiting disabled soldiers of the late war, and compensating the unwounded in some measure for financial losses sustained by reason of their service.

"Members of the American Legion in Oregon," reads a telegram of Edward J. Elvers, state adjutant, to Oregon senators and representatives, "urge you to get behind and push through the five bills presented to the short session by the Legion national legislative committee."

These bills are the Watson bill, relieving wounded veterans from payment of war risk insurance premiums; the Stevenson bill, providing for retirement of disabled emergency officers on the same basis granted regular army officers; the France bill, appropriating money for the erection of new hospitals to care for war wounded; the Rogers bill, which would consolidate war risk insurance, vocational education and public health service departments under one head; and the Fordney bill, presenting the Legion's four-fold adjusted compensation measures permitting an option of land settlement, vocational training aid, farm or home loan or cash bonus to world-war veterans.

Success of the national legislative campaign of the Legion probably would mean abandonment of the movement for a state bonus. The co-operation of civic organizations of the state is sought by the Legion in this campaign.

DEATH ENDS PROSECUTION

Man Accused of Salmon Trolling
Drowns in Yaquina Bay.

The state fish and game commission has canceled its case against Fred Rosier of Newport, arrested October 8 for salmon trolling in Yaquina bay without a license, and the reason therefor is the tragic death of the fisherman, drowned in the same waters when his boat capsized Christmas day.

"The case which has been pending against him is consequently disposed of," runs the report of Deputy Game Warden Emery of the Newport district. Four residents of Toledo, arrested last Sunday by Warden Emery, on the charge of having hunted ducks from a motorboat, will be tried in justice court at Newport. The defendants are S. E. Newkirk, merchant; Gale Kimes, ticket agent; Joe Booth, cashier of the Lincoln County bank; and Bert Howe, formerly a deputy game warden.

G. Smart of Pendleton was recently fined \$25 and costs for killing of two swan at Baker pond, near Hermiston.

Lumberman Becomes Teacher.

NYSSA, Or., Dec. 28.—(Special).—F. A. Gallegly, manager of the Boise-Payette lumber yards in this city, has accepted the position of principal of the school at Arcadia, Or., and will assume his new duties January 2. Mr. Gallegly was elected city recorder at the recent election, and married Miss Harriet Matthews of this city November 26. H. T. Francis, ex-mayor of Nyssa, formerly manager of the yards, will resume his old position.

County Bounty Law Valid.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 28.—(Special).—The scalp bounty law relating to jackrabbits passed by the voters of Harney county at a recent election is operative within itself and not subject to the influence of state laws bearing on the same subject, according to a legal opinion given today by I. H. Van Winkle, attorney-general. The opinion was asked by George S. Sizemore, district attorney of Harney county.

NEW TRIAL IS SOUGHT

HAZELWOOD COMPANY FILES
BILL OF EXCEPTIONS.

Firm Convicted of Manufacturing
Adulterated Butter Says Judge
Made Errors.

Motion for a new trial was filed yesterday by the Hazelwood company, recently convicted in federal court

on charges of having manufactured adulterated butter without paying the government tax, and will probably be heard early the coming week before Federal Judge Bean.

The company, which is not identified with the Hazelwood restaurants or the Hazelwood Ice Cream company, alleged through its attorneys that rulings by Judge Bean forbidding the admission of certain testimony concerning butter experiments were such as constitute grounds for exception, and on this premise sought a retrial. Portland newspapers also were declared by its counsel to have circulated prejudiced reports of the case. More than usual interest centered upon the trial, by reason of testi-

mony to the effect that the original butter product, as it entered the company's vats, was often rancid and possessed of a distressful stench. Appearing for the company were Maurice A. Seitz and Roscoe Nelson, who conducted the recent defense.

Arrest Made on Felony Charge.

PASCO, Wash., Dec. 28.—(Special).—On telegraphic instructions from the sheriff at Sandpoint, Idaho, L. Gibson, representing the Universal Collection company, with headquarters in Spokane, was arrested here Saturday by Sheriff Hays and was taken to Sandpoint, where, it is said, he is wanted on a felony charge.

CANDY FACTORY OPENED

Shop Employing 60 Persons Starts
on First Street.

The opening up of a new candy factory by Lang & Co. in addition to the other activities of the firm, was announced yesterday by Louis Lang of that concern at a convention of salesmen and department heads of Lang & Co. which is being held at the Multnomah hotel for three days, beginning yesterday. Mr. Lang said that the new factory, which is situated across the street from the headquarters of the company on First street, will employ 60 persons. The company announced that it intended

to make it one of the biggest industries of the kind in the northwest. Mr. Lang delivered the address of welcome at the convention yesterday, after which matters of business importance were discussed. About 100 salesmen and department heads were in attendance at the gathering. The convention will close with a banquet in the gold room at the Multnomah hotel Thursday night.

Lang & Co. now have nine branches in various cities of the northwest.
