

WALTER E. CONKLIN, HEADS FETE BOARD

Rose Festival Promoters Elect New Officials.

DIRECTORS ARE CHOSEN

Determined Fight Will Be Made to Win Appropriation From County Denied by Commissioners.

Walter E. Conklin was unanimously elected president of the 1921 Rose Festival auxiliary and nine members of the board of directors were chosen at a meeting of the auxiliary last night at the Chamber of Commerce.

The directors, chosen from a field of 45, were H. H. Haynes, Otto Mielke, Fred Gorman, W. J. Piepenbrock, Otto Hartwig, W. L. Thompson, Harry W. Kent, Barge E. Leonard and Mrs. Charles E. Runyon. Three directors from the 1920 board will be chosen to remain to make up the full board, according to the annual custom.

Mrs. Charles E. Runyon was chosen unanimously for vice-president of the auxiliary and E. N. Weinbaum was re-elected secretary.

Hauser Makes Up Deficit.
Eric V. Hauser, president of the 1920 board of directors of the Rose Festival association, in a report, turned over \$281 to the new board. Mr. Hauser donated \$1000 to clear up some of the small 1920 bills. A rising vote of thanks to Mr. Hauser for this gift and for his services as president was tendered by the delegates present.

E. J. Jaeger reported the results of his attendance at the meeting of county commissioners, when he asked that money for the 1921 festival be included in the county budget.

"I won't take 'no' for an answer," said Mr. Jaeger. "I suggest that the new board of directors call upon the county commissioners at their meeting Friday morning and demand funds for carrying on the festival."

Festival Must Continue.
"It think it would be a shame to do away with the Rose Festival for one year. We have spent Frank Branch alley east at the new board every year to tell about our Rose Festival. It would be like advertising if we did not have the festival this year."

Mr. Conklin, the newly elected president of the auxiliary, will arrange for a delegation of representative men and women to meet with the county commissioners Friday to discuss the question of financing the festival.

The auxiliary decided to endorse a plan suggested by Mr. Jaeger to encourage the use of Christmas cards which advertise Portland and Oregon.

Show Scenes Not Typical.
"Many of our Christmas cards show scenes of the city and suggest ideas typical of this part of the country," said Mr. Jaeger. "I should like to see a rose or scene of the Columbia River highway and the city of Portland on Christmas cards purchased by Oregon residents."

Oregon frame as a suitable decoration for Christmas cards was suggested by Mr. Weinbaum. The clubs represented in the auxiliary will be asked by the delegates to endorse this plan of further advertising Portland and the state.

Ira L. Riggs, retiring president of the 1920 auxiliary, presided.

coming before the 31st legislative assembly of \$45,456,377.55.

If the state expenditures are grouped, or classified, in accordance with the classification of the federal census bureau, we find that the estimates for 1921-1922 for general government aggregate \$1,048,917.55. Under this classification are included the expenses of the legislature, the executive, state, treasury, taxes and land department, the supreme court, supreme court library, the attorney-general, the salaries of the circuit judges and district attorneys, the prison, livestock sanitary, station registration and veterinary medical examining boards, the bureau of mines and geology, day industries, Pacific Northwest Tourist association, Pacific International Livestock exposition, and state engineers department.

For "health and sanitation," the estimates aggregate \$375,577.55, under the head of state, health, social hygiene, society, tuberculosis hospital, dairy and food commissioner and the barber, chiropractic, dental, medical, pharmacy, optometry and pharmacy boards.

For "highways" the aggregate is \$2,251,334.14, which includes \$2,081,181.10 resulting from the annual one mill levy for market roads. The balance of the estimate for highways comes from estimated receipts from sales of bonds from the federal government, from the counties of the state, from the tax on gasoline, from motor vehicle licenses and one-fourth mill annual levy.

For "charities, hospitals and corrections" the aggregate is \$1,165,752.57, and under this classification are included the state hospital, the state prison and general election expenses and the capital and supreme court buildings and grounds.

The estimates for protection to persons and property aggregate \$6,584,165.02. Under these classifications are included the banking, corporation, insurance and weights and measures departments, the board of accountancy, architect examiners and engineering examiners, the state fire marshal, motor vehicle registrations, public service commission, pilot commissioners, industrial accident commission, state board of forestry, Oregon Humane society, the industrial welfare and child welfare commissions, the child labor board and the bureau of labor, the Oregon National guard, special agents and bounties on wild animals.

Resource Development Listed.

"Development and conservation of national resources" aggregates \$1,818,221.46, which includes the state and county fairs, exhibit of Oregon products at Portland, the geographic, agricultural, lime, desert land, state cluded the board of control, which is the governing board of the various state institutions, the hospitals at Salem and Pendleton, the feeble-minded, blind, deaf, boys' training and girls' industrial schools, the penitentiary, the Florence Crittenton and Patten homes for the care of orphans, foundlings and wayward girls, and for the return of fugitives from justice.

Under the head of "education" the requirements aggregate \$5,594,123.57. This classification includes the office of the superintendent of public instruction, the board of examiners, the amounts expended for vocational education, the board of higher curriculum, Oregon state library, Oregon Historical society, the agricultural college, the University of Oregon,

Under the classification of "miscellaneous," aggregating \$1,254,832.47, are included the soldiers' home, the financial educational aid for soldiers, sailors and marines, and for the expense of the state printing department.

The following statement shows the aggregate for each state activity under the various classifications provided for in the law requiring the compilation of a biennial budget for the information of the legislature. It does not show, however, how the funds to meet these requirements are provided, which has been heretofore briefly stated.
