

HARDING SCANS COAL PACKERS AND NAVY

Wide Range of Problems Covered in Conferences.

FUEL OUTLOOK VIEWED

Delegation Pleads With President-Elect for Leniency in Meat Industry Regulation.

MARION, O., Dec. 29.—A wide variety of subjects, including the coal situation, packer control and the naval building programme were talked over by President-elect Harding today in a dozen conferences which kept him busy from early morning until late at night.

The coal production problem was presented to him by Daniel B. Wentz of Philadelphia, president of the National Coal association, who furnished detailed information about the present rate of production and the outlook for the coming year.

Mr. Harding asked many questions on the subject, but it was not indicated what attitude he took regarding government regulation of the industry. Mr. Wentz was accompanied by Fred Upham, of Chicago, a prominent coal man who is treasurer of the republican national committee.

On the subject of naval construction, the president-elect sought information from Patrick Kelley, representative in congress from Michigan and chairman of the naval committee, which handles naval appropriations. Means of cutting down expenditures without crippling national defense were discussed at length.

Kelley suggesting that while the present building programme was being completed, an international agreement might be perfected for limitation of armaments. He also urged that the naval reserve plan be perfected as an inexpensive guarantee of sufficient naval power.

A committee from Chicago, headed by S. B. Stafford, president of the Chicago livestock exchange, took up with Mr. Harding the question of government regulation of the livestock industry and presented a plea that during the next four years the business should not be harassed unduly by legal restrictions. They asked that a secretary of agriculture be selected in harmony with that policy, but said afterward that they did not put forward any particular candidate.

Confidence Is Expressed.

All the members of the delegation expressed confidence that the president-elect would inaugurate a policy to reassure the trade and stabilize markets.

Another caller was Victor F. Lawson, publisher of the Chicago Daily News, who said his conference concerned various domestic problems. Charles B. Warren, secretary of the public national committee for Michigan, had luncheon at the Harding house.

The day brought no outward developments regarding cabinet selections, but the impression was given by those close to Mr. Harding that at least one or two members of his official family would be definitely chosen in the near future. It has been generally expected that the first to be settled upon will be the secretary of the treasury, and that other appointments will be announced from time to time later.

Tomorrow the president-elect will talk to Will H. Hays, prominently mentioned for postmaster-general or secretary of the interior, and with Philander C. Fox, representative of Pennsylvania, who, with Charles E. Hughes, has been in the fore of recent speculations about the secretaryship of state.

It was said at the Harding headquarters, however, that the call of Mr. Hays and Senator Knox was conferred primarily with arrangements for the inauguration. The Pennsylvania senator is in charge of the congressional committee aiding in plans for the ceremony and he will come to Marion with E. B. McLean, chairman of the inaugural committee.

BEND SEES GAIN OF 1000

School Census Figures Declared to Indicate Increase.

BEND, Or., Dec. 29.—(Special.)—A further evidence of the rapid increase in population in Bend during the past year was given today when figures were made public for the school census of the Bend district, just completed. This showed 824 boys and 739 girls between the ages of 4 and 19, inclusive, as against a total of 1468 last year. The sex proportion this year was more nearly even than at the end of 1919, in which year 739 boys were totaled and 670 girls.

Using the totals of the two years as an index to population, a proportion is reached which would indicate a gain of nearly 1000 since the government census was taken a year ago. This proportion, applied to 5415, the number given by Uncle Sam's enumerators as Bend's official population, shows that the number of people now residing in the city must be at least 6235.

Caughey and Mrs. C. E. Hamilton, both of Hood River. Her mother, Mrs. Lucy Post, resides at Trinitville. Two sisters and three brothers living are Mrs. B. T. Young of Hood River, Mrs. Jane Gilmore of Kent, Frank and Joe Post of Post and Clarence Post of Seattle.

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Mount Calvary cemetery. Mr. Barnes is survived by his widow, Mrs. Frances Barnes; his sons, Harry and Lawrence Barnes, and his daughters, Mrs. C. B. King and Miss Frances Barnes. Mr. Barnes had been ill two years.

ALBANY, Or., Dec. 29.—(Special.)—Mrs. Kathryn Knapp Fellman, wife of Rev. B. F. Fellman of the First Baptist church of Albany, died at the parsonage here Tuesday. She was 48 years old and had been ill for the last seven weeks.

Mrs. Fellman was a native of Illinois. When a small child she went with her parents to York, Nebraska, where she resided 26 years. Later she resided at Des Moines and Omaha, coming to Albany eight months ago. She is survived by her husband and two children, Misses Lois and Lucille Fellman, both of Albany.

ALBANY, Or., Dec. 29.—(Special.)—Peter Ruettnier, well-known resident of Albany for the last 22 years, died at his home here last night, aged 68. He was born in Switzerland and came to America when 19 years old. He resided in Chicago before coming to Albany. Mr. Ruettnier was a member of the Lutheran church of Albany. He is survived by his widow.

William Litt, 75, of 27 Delay street, an old-time river man who had been working between Portland and Astoria for the past 30 years, died at 1:30 yesterday morning at St. Vincent's hospital. Mr. Litt attempted suicide on December 26 in a North Fourth-street barber shop by cutting his throat with a razor. Continued ill health was assigned as a motive for the deed. He had no known relatives in Portland.

Interment was at River View cemetery. Mr. Perrault was born in Portland, November 16, 1848. At the time of his death he was an employee of the firm of Allen & Lewis. STATE WHEAT POOL PLAN

FARMERS WISH TO ELIMINATE GRAIN SPECULATION.

Delegates of Growers' Organizations Meet to Discuss Market Stabilization.

PENDLETON, Or., Dec. 29.—(Special.)—Eleven delegates representing various state agricultural organizations closed a two-day session here today after drawing up a tentative contract for the formation of a statewide wheat pool to obtain for the farmer "that fair price which the law of supply and demand honestly should demand." Plans were announced as incomplete when adjournment was made.

The purpose of the meeting held here, according to one delegate, was to form a closer bond of co-operation between the farm organizations in the state.

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SOLDIER'S MEMORY FAILS

EX-SERVICE MAN MENTALLY LOST RECOVERING.

Washington Man Finds Himself in Oakland, Cal., and Tells of His Experiences in War.

OAKLAND, Cal., Dec. 29.—Appearing at the Oakland police station last night, Albert McLeod, who said he resided with his wife, near Clinton, Wash., asked what day it was and what town he was in. When informed he broke down and wept, relating a story to the police that on or about December 15 he kissed his wife good-bye and drove a team of horses to town with a load of potatoes. He remembered nothing more until he awoke here yesterday.

He was placed in jail as a lunatic, but was later taken to a city hospital upon request of ex-service men who investigated his story.

McLeod, who claims to have served in France, with the Canadian army, where he was shell-shocked, gassed and wounded, told the police he had been suffering for many months; that his wife, a former Red Cross nurse, cared for him. The local post of the American Legion is waiting word from McLeod's relatives.
