BERNARD ELECTED ROAD PRESIDENT—J. P. O'Brien, vice-president and general manager of the O. W. R. & N. Co., has been elected president of the Camas Prairie Roadway company, for 1921, taking the place of E. C. Hinchard, who becomes vice-president. Mr. Blanchard is assistant general manager of the Northern Pacific railway, with headquarters in Tacoma. The Camas Prairie line is 145 miles long and extends from Riparia to Grandville. It is owned jointly by the O. W. R. & N. and the Northern Pacific.

RAILROAD OFFICIALS HERE—C. E. Perkins, vice-president of the Missouri Pacific railway, accompanied by Mrs. Perkins, C. S. Stone, passenger traffic manager, and O. G. Parsley, assistant freight traffic manager, arrived in Portland yesterday from St. Louis. They were met here by C. M. Fowler, general agent at Seattle, and inspected terminal and freight facilities of the port. They were lined at the Arlington club at noon by officials of the Chamber of Commerce.

FALANGUS ESTATE IS \$50,000—The will of the late Demetrius Falangus was filed for probate yesterday and places a valuation of \$50,000 on his estate. Of this amount \$12,000 is in real property. Mr. Falangus died on December 26, leaving as heirs his widow, Anna Falangus; three nephews, Theodore N. Leon and Theodore J. Falangus; a brother, Stamatis Falangus; and a nephew, Mitchell J. Falangus, the last two being in Greece.

DR. DUBER'S FUNERAL HERE—The funeral of the late Dr. W. C. Duber, former Portland dentist, who died at Tillamook Monday, was held yesterday morning at the Madeleine church. Pallbearers were Henry Weber, John Cahalin, Arthur Murphy and Dan Coman. Dr. Stuart McGuire sang several solo numbers and Professor Goodrich played the organ. Interment was at Mount Calvary cemetery.

W. W. BOLLAM DENIES BOND BUYING—W. W. Bollam, of Bollam & Co., 123 Front street, said yesterday that he is not the Bollam whose name was printed among a list of the Morris Bros. bond buyers in The Oregonian Wednesday. Mr. Bollam said that many people had taken it for granted that he was the unfortunate purchaser owing to the fact that the initials were the same as his.

CAR COMPANY IS SUED—Lena E. Walsh yesterday filed suit against the Portland Railway & Navigation company for \$10,000 damages. The plaintiff says that July 12 she was riding in an automobile driven by her husband, when the machine was struck at Nineteenth and Broadway streets by a street car. Mrs. Walsh was seriously injured in the collision.

BAG CONCERN IS BANKRUPT—Papers in bankruptcy were filed in the United States district court yesterday by the Kleiman Bag & Paper company. The concern says that it has assets of \$26,727 with which to pay debts aggregating \$65,333. The heaviest creditors of the bankrupt concern are S. Barde & Sons, with \$12,000, and A. Rosenfeld, with \$9,092.

HOUSE AT 94 EAST 24TH STREET IS USED TO STORE NARCOTICS; 5 CANS SMOKING OPIUM FOUND.

The first step in an energetic campaign to stamp out the narcotic traffic in Portland was taken yesterday, when Chey Sim, convicted violator of the Harrison act, was sentenced to serve two years in the federal prison at McNeil's island by Federal Judge Wolverton.

The heavy sentence came as a shock to those engaged here in the illicit drug trade, who heretofore have been able to escape with fines, which served to detract only slightly from the enormous profits they made.

Before imposing sentence on Sim, who is reputed to be one of the wealthiest men in the local Chinese colony, Judge Wolverton denied the motion of his counsel for a new trial. Sim received a stay of execution for 30 days to arrange his personal affairs, and his bail was increased from \$1500 to \$5000.

Sim Alleged Ringleader. Although Sim was not directly accused of smuggling drugs over the boundary into the United States from Canada, government officials said that he was the leader of a large gang engaged in that occupation and that he maintained offices in Seattle for that purpose.

Sim's illegal drug operations are said to have been conducted from a house at 94 East Twenty-fourth street, which he used solely as a storage place for his narcotics. Sim first bought the house about six years ago during the long wars and used it as a refuge for himself. Later he moved to 107 North Fourth street, maintaining the Twenty-fourth street house, completely furnished, but unoccupied.

Residents living in the vicinity of the latter house testified that Sim would drive up each day in an expensive limousine, remain in the house for a short time and then drive away. Sim also made frequent trips to Seattle on the pretense that he had a branch of his business located there. In Portland he said he was engaged in the cannery business.

Smuggling Jacket Found. Two ounces of morphine, one ounce of cocaine and five cans of smoking opium, cleverly concealed, were found in a jacket which was turned over to street house after Sim's arrest. A smuggling jacket was also discovered among Sim's effects.

WARDEN CHASES HUNTERS

GAME VIOLATORS CAUGHT WHEN ONE GOES OVERBOARD.

Deputy Reports Exciting Capture Following Exciting Motorboat Race on Bay.

The story of an exciting motorboat chase on Yaquina bay, in which four citizens of Toledo, Or., were captured and three of them afterward fined \$25 each for shooting ducks from a motorboat was learned in Portland yesterday as the result of the receipt of a report from W. G. Emery, deputy game warden in the Yaquina bay district, by the fish and game commission.

The men arrested as a result of the chase were Bert Howe, president of the Toledo Gun club; Dale Kimes, railroad agent at Toledo; Joel Booth, bank cashier at Toledo, and S. E. Newkirk, merchant of Toledo. All were fined with the exception of Newkirk.

The fact that Newkirk fell out of the speeding motorboat into the bay during the hottest part of the chase was all that prevented the hunters from escaping the deputy game warden, who was in another motorboat, according to Warden Emery's report. He said that the hunters had to stop to pick up the man who was overboard and thus gave him a chance to overtake them. Newkirk lost an \$85 shotgun, which went to the bottom of the bay as the result of the escapade.

Owners of property adjacent to Peninsula park have protested against the proposed establishment of an automobile park directly opposite on Aldina avenue. The protest, signed by a committee representing the property owners who attended a mass meeting Sunday, was filed yesterday with City Auditor Eugene Fugle.

The protest stated that investigation by the committee had determined that an automobile park, as proposed, would be a detriment to the neighborhood. The value of Peninsula park as a playground for children, the petition averred, would be largely destroyed.
