The committee is making rapid progress in its analysis of the requests sent to it by charitable and educational organizations of the city, and probably will make its report to the board of directors of the chest during next week. Members of the committee are: E. C. Ball, C. D. Brunn, Max S. Hirsch, Mrs. Thomas D. Honeymann, Emory Olmstead and Walter D. Whitcomb.

NEW MEN TAKE OFFICE—Few changes will be made in public offices around Portland today. Charles Hudson succeeds A. A. McCune as commissioner; Hiram U. Welch succeeds Henry E. Reed as county assessor, and Edward DeLoach succeeds Judge Joseph Jones as district judge. The only state office change is the succession of C. L. Hawley to the office of state dairy inspector, replacing J. D. Mickie, who has held the position for eight years.

He received a 90-day jail sentence in police court yesterday following an attack on Patrolman Nelson in the north end of the city. WOMEN RAISE \$17,000—Mrs. W. C. Alvord, chairman of the women's committee of the European relief council, announces that more than \$17,000 has been raised by the women's committee. The sum does not include the New Year's eve work of the Elks, the contributions received by the Fremont, the city and other funds. By raising more than \$17,000, the women's committee earned a gift of \$5000 from a woman who will not permit her name to be used.

FRED HEIDER BRINGS BRIDE ALONG ON THEATRICAL TOUR

Actor Declares Separation of Husbands and Wives by Stage Engagements Is Almost Sure to Wreck Marital Happiness.

"TIS more than twenty-five years since I visited Portland," reminisced Fred Heider at the Helleg last night. "I suppose in 25 years there have been many changes in your fair city, but I am not able to notice them for I was only about 4 years old when I was here 25 years ago. I don't even remember one thing about it, save that I was in a variety team with my mother and father and in looking over some old programmes in my trunk last week I found one marked Portland. My father was Matt Heider, a comedian of the old school who was associated with Weber and Fields. My mother was his singing and dancing partner, and we three had a wonderful life until my mother passed on, when I had reached young manhood.

Mother's Maxims Remembered.

"My father joined her a few years ago and, although I am grown now to man's estate and have acquired some of the philosophies of life, I have never ceased to miss them and their encouragement. My mother used to impress on my childish mind that whatever I saw one else do I could do too. Her words constantly spurred my ambition and every step of my development in my work I owe to her early training. Whenever I am interviewed by my mother and father creep into the story somehow, and that's the way I want it. I'll tell you why. Things didn't break as easy for them as they have broken for me. They were pioneers in the vaudeville game, or variety, as it was called then. Every inch of ground they gained was their own, and they sometimes the game seemed hardly worth the struggle. But through it all my mother smiled and danced and my father cracked his jokes and we played and worked together like three children.

Bride Brought on Trip.

"Whenever I read their names in one of my interviews as it is a sort of tardy recognition, and that somewhere they know of it. In this life of perpetual change, and often I meet people who remember them. It is a great happiness to me to talk with anyone who knew my mother and my father." Mr. Heider is honeymooning. He is in the 20th week, and unlike most theatrical newly weds, his wife is honeymooning with him.

"I married a New York girl, a non-professional," said Mr. Heider, "and

my wife is not stage struck. I am glad she isn't, for I want to stay married to her the rest of my life and we wouldn't last more than a season if we both were on the stage. I have never known a successful marriage where both husband and wife were theatrical folk unless they were a team that refused to be separated. Of course all marriages depend on the individuals who marry each other, and no set of rules can be applied. But I do think that in this theatrical life where the bookings send a husband with one show and his wife with another, and we have to buck the loneliness and the blue hours that come to us all, it is scarcely to be wondered at that vows are forgotten.

Wife Fond of Theater.

"So took no chance. My wife loves the theater and its people, she has lots of friends in the theatrical profession, and her encouragement and constructive criticism are a great help to me. If I return 25 years from now I hope to still be honeymooning with my present wife."

GOVERNMENT TAX SEEN

NATIONAL CONTROL OF SCHOOL SYSTEM PREDICTED.

Great Increase in Attendance in Recent Years Declared Reason for Additional Funds.

"The great increase in school attendance in recent years means the necessity for an increase in expenditures," asserted Dr. Charles E. Chadsey, dean of the school of education at the University of Illinois, in an address to the city club yesterday at the Benson hotel.

He stated that in order to attain equal standards of education in all parts of the United States that he believed the federal government would eventually have to meet increased expenses of education. He prophesied an educational tax for future days to correspond in a measure to the war tax of the present time.

The teaching profession is well worth while, he asserted, and he urged teachers to believe in their work and be proud of it. He made an appeal to teachers not to speak of the low salaries which members of the profession have been receiving. He said that teachers have been talking before their students about their low compensation and thus have discouraged young men and women from entering the teaching field.

"Some of the most fundamental problems in education have been settled only recently," declared Dr. Chadsey. "The idea of a public school system being maintained at public expense was not settled until after the middle of the 19th century. It took 40 to 45 years more to get the principle established that parents must send their children to school."

"The last great development is now in progress with the rapid passage by legislatures of compulsory continuation acts. These laws provide that all young people shall remain in school until they are 18 or do an equivalent amount of school work, if they work during the day."

\$1,500,000 BONDS SIGNED

Issue Authorized at Last Session of Highway Commission.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 31.—(Special).—O. F. Hoff, state treasurer, and Governor Olson today signed state highway bonds aggregating \$1,500,000. Issuance of these bonds was authorized at a meeting of the state highway commission held last month. The bonds will bear date of January 6 and will draw 4 1/2 per cent interest. Sale of the securities has not yet been negotiated.
