RELIEF DRIVE SPEEDS UP

NEXT TEN DAYS TO BE PERIOD OF VIGOROUS CAMPAIGNING.

Many Counties Behind Quotas; Work During the Holidays Slackened Slightly.

Workers in the drive for funds for European relief have been asked to make a vigorous drive during the next week or ten days to obtain the state's quota, according to F. I. Hollebur, manager of the state campaign.

There was a slight slackening during the holidays, says Mr. Hollebur, and several counties are behind while others are over-subscribed. As soon as these tardy counties have set about the work with renewed activity, the state's quota of \$125,000, it is Hollebur's hope, will have been subscribed.

Something in the neighborhood of \$50,000 remains to be given before Oregon has met its obligation, declares Hollebur. Bad roads and unfavorable weather, he feels, have been the cause of many counties and individual communities not showing so well as others.

Today all towns and counties in arrears will be urged to make a fresh effort to put the state over the top during the week, if possible. Many firms and individuals who are able to donate generously have either not volunteered subscriptions or have not been approached by the drive workers. A list is being made of these firms and persons and expected.
