

OREGONIAN WANTED FOR HEALTH BOARD

Naming of Non-Resident as
Secretary Opposed.

GOVERNOR HEARS PROTEST

Dr. Parrish and Delegation of ex-
Service Men Present Petition
Favoring Dr. John Abele.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 4.—(Special.)—The fight which originated in Portland recently to block any action the state board of health may take in the direction of election of a non-resident of Oregon as secretary of the board was shifted to the executive offices here today.

Dr. George Parrish, city health officer of Portland, Dr. James Walsh, representing the veterans of the various wars, and J. Walker Jones, national junior vice-commander of the veterans of foreign wars, arrived at the statehouse at noon and were escorted with Governor Olcott for nearly an hour.

The visitors argued that the members of the state board of health had under consideration for secretary a physician now residing in California, despite the fact that Oregon was alleged to have a number of doctors who were eminently qualified to handle the affairs of the office.

Position Pays \$4000 Year.
The position of secretary of the state board of health pays \$4000 a year, according to a statement made by Dr. Parrish, and would prove attractive to a large number of Oregon physicians.

Although at first confining their protest to the election of a non-resident as secretary of the health board, the visitors subsequently admitted that they had in mind a physician who had the endorsement of the ex-service men of the state and would fill the office with credit to himself and the administration. This man, they said, was no other than Dr. John Abele, for many years a resident of Portland.

Governor Olcott was informed that Dr. Abele had been engaged in public health work for more than 12 years, and for the last four years had acted in the capacity of assistant health officer of the city of Portland.

Army Service He Cited.
It was said that he is a veteran of the Indian wars, Spanish-American war and served in an important government capacity during the recent engagement with Germany.

There would be few, if any, salary increases for state and county officials by the legislature which convenes here next Monday in case that body follows the recommendations of the so-called salary investigating committee appointed at the special session of the legislature held here last January. This was made plain here today by Senator Bell of Lane county, who is chairman of the committee.

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for Oregonians was the keynote of the statements made by the visitors, and they were emphatic in their protest against the importation and election of non-residents to important state positions when local men were available.

Nearly all the visitors imported. It leaked out following the conference that during the last few years the state board of health had created 11 positions for public nurses, and that practically all of these are now filled by women imported from eastern and middle western states. These positions are known as county health nurses and pay a salary of \$125 a month. It also was charged that two of the four state health officers elected by the state board of health during the administration of Dr. Andrew C. Smith were importations, and that in both instances they failed to live up to the requirements of the offices they were selected to fill.

The importation of these nurses and state health officers, coupled with the present proposal on the part of the board to elect a secretary from the state of California, was sufficient to awaken the people of Oregon to a realization that they are being discriminated against by a body of their own creation, according to statements made by the visitors.

Parrish Considering Bill.
Dr. Parrish, at the conclusion of the conference, declared that he had in mind the preparation of a legislative bill designed to prohibit the employment of state employees in various lines of service unless the applicants had resided in Oregon for at least two years. This bill, he said, probably would include the state health officer and secretary of the state board of health.

It also was learned today that Governor Olcott previously had received a number of protests against the election of a non-resident secretary of the state health board. These protests came from A. G. Clark of the Oregon Associated Industries, ex-service organizations and from individuals who are interested in giving Oregon men positions created by Oregon people.

Governor Olcott informed Dr. Parrish and his colleagues that the appointment of a secretary of the state health board was a matter that rested solely in the hands of the board and that he had no authority to interfere with their operations. He admitted, however, according to the visitors, that he was a strong advocate of the protection of Oregon people and Oregon industries and to that end hoped that an Oregon man would be elected to succeed the retiring secretary of the state board of health.

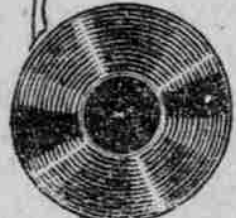

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cluded the committee from recommending any great number of salary increases, although it was possible that the compensation of one or two state officials might be advanced to cope with the high cost of living.

The committee headed by Senator Bell recently completed a tour of the state and their report is now being prepared for presentation to the legislature. The committee visited practically every county in Oregon, and all officials were given an opportunity to submit their claims for increased salaries.

Although not making public the contents of the proposed report to the legislature, it was intimated here today that the few recommendations for salary increases will affect the state superintendent of schools and attorney-general. These officials, it is said, are receiving inadequate compensation when compared with the heads of other state departments.

\$112,000 Damages Asked.
