DRUGGIST'S DEATH UNDECIDED—An autopsy performed yesterday afternoon on the body of Henry Raydahl, druggist of 1111 E. 1st st., who died Monday afternoon at the St. Vincent's hospital after being found unconscious in his store, revealed a healthy organic condition, according to Deputy Coroner Getchell. The cause of his death will not be determined until a chemical analysis of his stomach can be made. It is thought that he took an overdose of strychnine as a stimulant for his heart. No inquest will be held.

Mrs. Stanfield Reports Accident—Mrs. R. N. Stanfield, wife of Senator-elect Stanfield, reported an accident yesterday in which her automobile was damaged at Fourteenth and Alder streets at 5:15 P. M. Monday. An automobile which Mrs. Stanfield was following east on Alder street stopped without warning to avoid hitting a pedestrian. Mrs. Stanfield applied her brakes, but struck the back end of the other car. Her automobile sustained some damage, but no one was injured.

Convicted of Criminal Assault—Recey Loscy, convicted of criminal assault, sentenced to eight years in the penitentiary by Judge Kavanaugh, December 29, seeks postponement for a new trial, argument on which opened yesterday. His attorney, E. J. Shimmers, contended that a juror in the case, Samuel Gault, barber, had made the statement that he believed a man once guilty of a crime was always guilty and that an ex-convict had no chance with him. New evidence also is alleged.

DR. SCHMITT RECITES MARITAL TROUBLES

Judge Gatens' Attempt at Reconciliation Fails.

WIFE TAKES STAND TODAY

Testimony Ranges From Sordid to Humorous; Housekeeping as Done by Mate Criticized.

Recital by Dr. Adolph O. Schmitt, well-known Portland physician, of domestic differences which caused the estrangement between himself and wife interested a large crowd in the courtroom of Circuit Judge Gatens yesterday. Mrs. Alta B. Smith, who is contesting her husband's divorce action, will go on the stand today and relate the other side of the marital troubles.

For more than an hour and a half yesterday afternoon Judge Gatens attempted to pour oil on the troubled matrimonial sea by a heart-to-heart conference with the warring parties in his chambers. Husband and wife emerged from the attempted peace-making flushed and still antagonistic. Neither would agree to submit to the custody of their 3-year-old son, Stuart, and the cash settlement for the wife was another bone of contention.

Dr. Schmitt was on the stand most of the day. His testimony ranged from sordid details of no public interest, but eagerly devoured by court-room spectators, to the humorous. He said that his wife was slovenly as a housekeeper, cruel to their son, extravagant and unfriendly. She had too many shoes, silk stockings and velvet dresses, he asserted; and he had surprised her washing dishes in a new velvet dress unprotected by an apron.

A complaint common to a majority of husbands, it appeared from the murmur which spread about the courtroom when it was voiced, was that Mrs. Schmitt had so many dresses hanging in the closets of their home that Dr. Schmitt could find no place to hang his own clothes.

Mrs. Schmitt would never hang her clothes up properly, but would allow them to drape around on the backs of chairs rather than put them away, asserted Dr. Schmitt. She would never wash dishes until nearly all in the house were dirty and was very untidy about her house and person, he averred.

Bills Presented to Court. On one of the bills complained about by Dr. Schmitt as contracted by his wife without authority appeared items purchased by the physician. They included two cans of malt extract and some gelatin.

"Looks like home brew," commented Harrison Allen, attorney for Dr. Schmitt. The physician only laughed. A moment later Attorney Allen was "ruined" by opposing counsel, E. L. and F. C. McDougall, when he inquired concerning a pair of oxfords purchased by Mrs. Schmitt. "Were they high or low ones?"

Among items on bills in evidence were two pairs of shoes bought by the wife. For one pair \$8.65 was paid and for the other \$12. Asked if he thought the prices paid were too high,

Dr. Schmitt said that he did not, but that his wife had five pairs of shoes and he thought that too many.

One of the most serious quarrels concerning which Dr. Schmitt testified started when he saw that his wife had permitted the grates of the furnace of their home on Forty-ninth street to become warped.

Woman Also Gives Testimony. "I emphatically called this to her attention, for she had permitted the same thing to happen in a house across the street," said the physician.

Mrs. Grace M. Chambers was a witness for the plaintiff near the close of the session. She said that her husband had been telephoning to see Mrs. Schmitt and told that Dr. Schmitt was holding a clandestine meeting with Mrs. Chambers in Hood River at a time when Dr. Schmitt was out of the city on business.

Chambers dashed to Hood River to surprise the pair, but found his wife alone and no trace of Dr. Schmitt, who had never been near her, said Mrs. Chambers.

L. E. Schmitt, attorney, brother of the plaintiff, testified concerning the treatment of the son by Mrs. Schmitt. He declared that "time and again" when Dr. Schmitt would come home from the office Mrs. Schmitt would not let the boy around or see his father, but would shut the lad up in his room. Dr. Schmitt said his wife treated the boy cruelly. The Schmitts were married in 1913.

NEW ROADWAY IS URGED

Use of Railway Bridge Seen as Way to Save Funds.

OREGON CITY, Or., Jan. 4.—(Special.)—A movement is on to have the county court appropriate funds to build a road parallel with the Portland Railway, Light & Power company tracks from this city to Gladstone. It is pointed out by the originators of the scheme that a fill can be run along the electric line and at the same time extend the electric bridge to cover the road proposed.

The court here is ready to publish advertisements for bids on the new steel bridge over the Clackamas river on the old highway, and it is said that this money can be saved by using the electric bridge and the new road will eliminate two railroad crossings and be above the low-water mark every season. At present the road between this city and Gladstone is covered with about five feet of water in some places, which has halted traffic on the main artery until the water recedes.

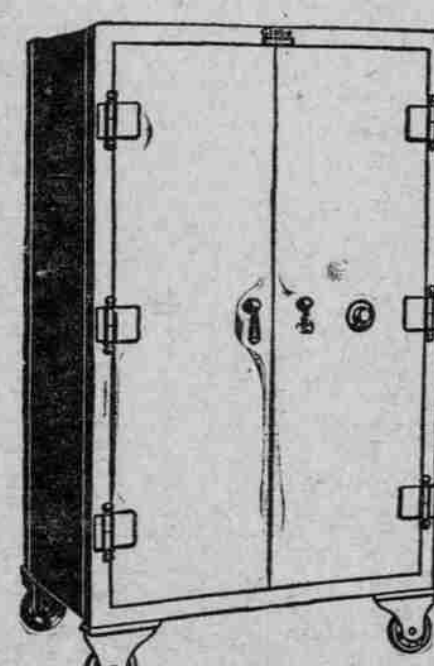
