

IDAHO LEGISLATURE BACKS FORDNEY BILL

Congress Is Memorialized to
Establish Tariffs.

LOWER HOUSE ORGANIZES

Session on First Day Lasts Only 32
Minutes—Appointments and
Attaches Announced.

BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 5.—(Special.)—The first memorial of the 16th session was introduced in the senate today by Senator Clark of Clark county. It was senate joint memorial No. 1 memorializing congress to pass the Fordney Emergency tariff measure, imposing temporary duties upon certain agricultural products to meet the present emergency and re-establish a market for the farmers and stock raisers.

The memorial came directly following a communication from the Idaho Cattle and Horse Growers' association, now in session in Boise, announcing an endorsement of the Fordney measure and urging the 16th session to memorialize congress to pass the measure, with an amendment including beef and hides.

Senator Yeaman called attention to the report of the special audit commission, announcing that members of the house and senate had given practically two years of their time to this work and the report would be referred to later. Copies of the report were distributed to the senators for reference.

Representatives Get Ready.

The house of representatives prepared for active duty this morning by electing the remaining attaches for the session and adjourned until tomorrow, the session today lasting 32 minutes. Appointments Are Made.

The speaker announced his appointment of Mrs. Agnes Hite as his secretary. He also announced the appointment of the first three standing committees, as follows:

Printing and supplies, Preston of Franklin, Thomas of Shoshone, Bolt of Butte, Hull of Bear Lake and Welker of Washington.

Rules and order of business, Storey of Ada, Gulikensen of Cassia, Bourne of Bannock, Carpenter of Nez Perce and Cannon of Elmore. Joint rules: Hall of Owyhee, Preston of Franklin and Callahan of Shoshone.

The first bill was passed before adjournment. This was the senate bill authorizing the distribution of statutes to members of the legislature.

Acoustics Are Criticized.

Something is wrong with the acoustics of the new legislative chambers, and the law makers propose to find out what it is.

On motion of representative Storey of Ada county, who is custodian of the capitol, the house adopted a resolution authorizing the speaker to appoint a committee on acoustics. Representative Thomas Preston left the capitol, his home at Weston having been informed by telephone at noon today that his brother had been stricken suddenly with a cerebral stroke and was in a very serious condition.

NEW GRADE SCHOOL OPEN

Hood River Boasts Fine Building
for Grammar Children.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—Hood River grammar school children celebrated the new year by starting work in the new Park-street two-story brick building, just completed at a cost of \$70,000 and characterized as one of the finest grade schools in the state.

The building has ten class rooms. Essie Goyette is principal of the school.

When the old building "removed" nearly a city block will be available for playgrounds and landscape gardening.

RAIL TIES TO BE HEWN

Mount Hood Rancher Revives Old
Industry in Oregon.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—E. C. Miller, Mount Hood rancher, has revived a pioneer industry. He expects to give employment to a number of men the remainder of the winter hewing ties from fir timber.

Mr. Miller has a contract to furnish to the O. & N. company 4000 bowen ties. Half of the material will be cut in the Mount Hood district. The other ties will be manufactured from timber purchased from J. W. Morton, along the Columbia river highway west of this city.

Obituary.

BURNS, Or., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—Business was suspended in Burns Tuesday afternoon during the funeral services of Dr. Carl C. Griffith, who died Saturday at his ranch. The ceremony was conducted by the Masons and interment made in the local cemetery.

Dr. C. Griffith was born in Salem 41 years ago, graduated from the University of Oregon medical school in 1907, spent a year doing hospital work in Portland, then came to Burns in 1908, forming a partnership with Dr. W. L. Marsden. After the latter's death in the spring of 1913, he practiced alone until 1914, when he associated with Dr. J. Shelley Saurman until the latter was called to service in 1917.

On May 17, 1916, he married Miss Bertha Williams of Burns. Besides his widow and infant son Carl Thornton, the following are left to mourn: Dr. L. F. Griffith, Salem, Or.; Warren W. Clark, Chetek, Wis.; A. W. Giesey, Portland, Or.

BEST GROVE, Or., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—Nelson Gardner, one of the oldest citizens of this city, died at his home here yesterday, aged 89 years 11 months and 24 days, suffering a stroke of paralysis a week ago.

Mr. Gardner was born in Osage county, Missouri, January 28, 1840. He crossed the plains by ox team in 1862. He and Mrs. Gardner celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary last March. He is survived by his widow and eight children. The funeral will take place at the Methodist Episcopal church today.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—Charles Victor Stenstrom, aged 24 years, died at his home here last night as the result of injuries sustained when he fell while working on the roof of Vick Brothers' new garage a month ago. Mr. Stenstrom fell 35 feet and the physicians later found it necessary to amputate one of his legs.

Besides his widow, Mr. Stenstrom is survived by his mother, Mrs. M. Stenstrom of Salem; three brothers, Harry and Arthur Stenstrom of Salem and Lloyd Stenstrom of Portland; and four sisters, Mrs. E. D. Cooper of Portland, Wash.; Mrs. L. E. Bates of Liberty, and Misses Maude and Marie Stenstrom of Salem.

ALBANY, Or., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—Mrs. Lucy M. Rainwater, resident of Albany and vicinity practically all of the time for more than half a century, died at her home in North Albany last night, aged 57 years. She was born in Nebraska and came to Oregon with her parents in 1864, when she was three years old. Since then she had lived most of the time just north of this city and part of the time in Albany. She is survived by her husband, J. R. Rainwater and four children, Fred Rainwater, Mrs. Hattie Penny, Andrew Rainwater and Elmer Rainwater, all residing in or near Albany.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—Mrs. Margaret Ellen Bloore, aged 71 years, and for a long time a resident of Salem, died here today. She is survived by her widower and four children. Funeral services will be held here Thursday.

OIL COMPANY LOSES SUIT

WASHINGTON COURT DECIDES
IN FAVOR OF STATE.

California Corporation Expected to
Carry Case on Appeal to
to Supreme Bench.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—By decision of the supreme court reversing Judge Wright of the superior court of Thurston county, the Shell Oil Company of California lost its suit to recover \$15,973 paid in fees for oil inspection under provisions of a 1907 law, afterward found unconstitutional as an inspection measure on the ground that it violated the commerce clause of the federal constitution.

While the law may be unconstitutional as to the section providing for inspection of oil in interstate commerce, the entire law was not held invalid by the decision. The constitutionality of one provision where where property is subject to segregation was not affected.

The fact that the fees to be charged for inspection were in excess of the expense of administering the law was regarded by the court as evidence that the measure was not primarily intended as an inspection measure under the police power of the state, but was in fact a proper revenue measure.

Judgments against the state totaling \$73,000 obtained by the several companies operating in the state and representing fees paid under protest while the law was in force were affected by the decision. It is understood that the oil companies will carry the case to the United States supreme court.

CITY BODY REORGANIZED

New Commission of La Grande
Begins Its Official Duties.

LA GRANDE, Or., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—The city commission of La Grande has been reorganized with the coming of the new year, and at the annual meeting, Monday evening, David L. Stoddard, newly elected commissioner, taking the place made vacant by the retiring of Dr. H. S. Brown, who was sworn into office.

W. D. Grant was chosen as chairman for the commission for the coming year, taking the place of J. D. McKennon, former president.

Under the commission form of government, only the city manager and the municipal judge are appointed by the commissioners, the other officers being appointed by the city manager. H. J. Kitchen was re-elected as municipal judge, but the commissioners laid the matter of appointing the city manager over until the regular meeting, which will be held this evening.

INCUMBENTS TO REMAIN

No Changes to Be Made in Officials
of Lewis County.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—James McClure, treasurer; J. H. Lathrop, assessor; E. C. Beachy, engineer; Miss Eva Knight, auditor; and Miss Z. May Melgren, superintendent, all of whom were re-elected at the November election, will remain in office. No changes in their list of deputies when the installation of county officers for the coming two years takes place next week. Mr. Grimm, county clerk, will have for his principal deputy Miss Bernice Drew of Centralia, who has been a clerk in the office some time.

R. Poyas will be chief deputy sheriff under Frank Roberts, sheriff, and Emmet Hamilton, an overseas veteran, will be added to the force of deputies, which will include the retention of Felix Herriford and F. G. Camady.

Woman Loses Thumb in Mishap.

WOODLAND, Wash., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—Mrs. Harvey D. Riker, wife of a prominent farmer and stock raiser nine miles north of Woodland, caught her right thumb in the gears of a feed cutter Tuesday, which mangled the thumb and broke the bones so badly that Dr. C. 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AUTO REGULATION PROPOSED IN BILLS

Olympia Session to Consider
Supervision of Stages.

GASOLINE TAX LIKELY

Plans Being Laid for Inaugural
Ball Are on Greater Scale
Than in Many Years.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 5.—(Special.)—Rapid increase in the volume of automobile transportation will necessitate the enactment of regulatory legislation by the state lawmaking body when it meets next Monday. In addition to the several recommendations contained in the report of the secretary of state affecting motor vehicles, a number of measures will be submitted at the request of automobile associations, dealers and operators.

When it is remembered that the number of motor vehicle licenses issued during the current year shows an increase of more than 30 per cent over the previous year, totaling approximately 280,000 and producing in fees revenues amounting to nearly \$2,000,000, it is apparent that the demand for adequate legislation governing their operation with a view to protecting life and property is founded upon sound public policy. It does not follow that all of the proposals to be submitted will be approved, but it may be taken as indicating that motor traffic legislation will form an important part of the work of the session.

Supervision of Stages Proposed.

Copies of a proposed measure providing for supervision and regulation of auto stages and jitney busses by the public service commission have been placed in the hands of members of the legislature prior to assembling. The bill was drafted at a meeting of representatives of motor vehicle transportation at Tacoma last week. Its purpose is to place under the jurisdiction of the public service commission persons or companies operating automobiles for the transportation of passengers for compensation over public highways of the state, between fixed terminals, or over a regular route. Taxicabs, hotel busses and sight-seeing busses are exempt from the provisions of the proposed law.

Few Leaders on Hand.

The entire interior of the ballroom at the clubhouse is being remodeled and a large force of decorators is at work. A symphony orchestra of national reputation now on transcontinental tour has been engaged to furnish music. The affair will be given under auspices of the Olympia Chamber of Commerce and will be followed by a series of social events in honor of visiting members and their families.

Owing to a lack of contests in organizing the house and senate, the coming session has been noticeable in the absence of early arrivals. The usual conferences of senate and house leaders in advance of the session had not been held at this year, and not at the capitol. In fact, with only a few days intervening before the legislature is called to order, only a few members have made their appearance on the ground and those have come in advance mainly to arrange for quarters. The hotel lobbies have as yet not taken on the appearance of an approaching session and the majority of the members are not expected to arrive Saturday evening.

Oregon Law to Be Followed.

Enactment of a measure along the lines of the Oregon gasoline tax law probably will be submitted to the Washington legislature following a recent conference at Portland of secretaries of the northwestern states and heads of motor vehicle divisions of state departments.

Decision of the Washington supreme court upholding the oil inspection law of 1907 as a legitimate revenue measure may add stimulus to the demand for the enactment of the gasoline tax law. The court finds that while the clause subjecting oil produced out of the state to imposition of inspection fees is in interstate commerce is a violation of the commerce clause of the federal constitution the entire act is not thereby invalidated and that the imposition of the inspection fee on oil that has lost its interstate commerce status by removal from original packages or by expiration of a reasonable period of time is in fact the exaction of a privilege tax upon property within the state and is valid as a revenue measure.

Lords May Be Regulated.

Regulation of the maximum load carried by motor trucks seems certain to be presented and will doubtless be passed by the session as designed to protect public highways from destruction by overloaded vehicles. It is pointed out that much of the highway improvement was made to accommodate light traffic and the increase of heavy truck traffic is threatening the destruction of much of the improvement.

The state board of control, in charge of arrangements for the ceremonies incident to the inauguration of Louis F. Hart as governor of Washington, has announced the ceremonies will take place in the corridor of the state house at 2 P. M. on Wednesday, January 12.

Judge Emmett N. Parker, who will be sworn in as chief justice of the supreme court January 19, will administer the oath of office. The ceremonies will be held in the capitol.
