Romances Start in Kansas.
Mrs. Speckels, formerly Miss Wirt of Garden City, Kan., has been the center of many interesting and romantic incidents since her marriage. When she was 17 years old, in 1910, and a student at the University of Kansas, she attracted her friends by announcing her engagement to Hugo Leal, a wealthy young nobleman from Brazil. On the wedding day she underwent a rapid change of mind and was married to Harry C. Williams, a newspaper man of Hutchinson, Kan., while they were in an automobile fleeing from her Brazilian fiancé and her parents. The couple lived together only a few weeks.

Miss Wirt was a cabaret singer in San Francisco, in 1915, when she met Speckels and they were married. Early in 1919 she was reported to have left her husband and to have gone to New York and ensuing rumors of a separation were indignantly denied by both her and her husband. It was said at that time that she had gone to the city to develop her voice for the opera stage and the subsequent trip to Europe was explained in the same manner.

BRITISH OIL QUEST HIT

McKELLAR WOULD CUT OFF
SUPPLY FROM AMERICA.

Senator Says Money Borrowed
From United States Helped
England Get Monopoly.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Great Britain was accused of "practicing the Hun" in her post-war policy by Senator McKellar, Democrat, California, following the attack of Senator McKellar, Tennessee, on the British oil policy and his recommendation that the American oil supply be cut off from Great Britain. Senator Phelan charged that Great Britain had obtained \$4,000,000,000 in loans from the United States, declaring "her back was to the wall" and had used her own money in an attempt to acquire a monopoly of the oil supply.

"Bring England to terms," by refusing her America's oil, was Senator McKellar's suggestion to the senate. He asked immediate action on his bill which proposed reciprocity in oil with those nations that do not discriminate against American citizens and retaliation against those nations that do.

Senator Phelan turned the debate from oil to the Japanese land question by declaring that the Japanese were buying oil from British companies in California at \$1.50 per barrel while California producers were getting \$2.40. He said that the general alien land ownership bill now proposed in California would prevent the acquisition by British interests of further oil lands.

Senator Kellogg, Republican, Minnesota, suggested protection of American oil interests in foreign lands by treaty and Senator Phelan declared he would introduce a resolution tomorrow asking the state department what had been done in that respect.

General anti-alien land ownership laws in states were opposed by Senator King, Democrat, Utah, on the ground they might provoke reprisals.

TARIFF SUPPORTERS HOPEFUL

Penrose Promises to Help Pass
Emergency Measure.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Supporters of the Fordney emergency tariff found encouragement today in the announcement of Chairman Penrose of the senate finance committee that he would use his influence to obtain passage of the bill. In a statement issued after his committee opened hearings on the measure, he assured his republican colleagues he would join them in pushing the legislation, but declared for modification of the rates in the bill as passed by the house.

Senate opponents of the bill, however, were not disheartened by the announcement, which they were inclined to accept as a political move. Democratic opponents asserted the statement was issued to rally republican senators on the committee.

THREE EVILS INTERDICTED

Liquor, Gambling and Prostitution
Emphatically Under Ban, Says
Attorney-General.

HELENA, Mont., Jan. 6.—(Special.)—The "lid is on and it stays on," was served on Montana law enforcement officers today by Attorney-General Rankin, who assumed office last Monday. "Booze, gambling and prostitution are most emphatically under the ban," he declared.

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—Federal Judge Lindbergh today issued temporary injunctions restraining four Chicago brewers from violating prohibition laws after Attorney-General Brundage had submitted evidence which he said proved that the brewers had been manufacturing illicit beer.

He said today's injunctions were a step in a drive against local brewers. James J. Doyle, state chemist, testified that the product contained from 2.5 to 4.2 per cent alcohol. Investigators from Mr. Brundage's office said it was sold at from \$4.50 to \$5.75 a case wholesale.

WHISKY TAX HEARING BEGUN

Kentucky Case Argued Before U. S. Supreme Court.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—There is no competition in the whisky business and the special 50-cent tax assessed against each gallon of whisky drawn from a bonded warehouse in Kentucky is not confiscatory, Charles L. Dawson, attorney-general of Kentucky, argued today before the United States supreme court in an effort to obtain vacation of an injunction forbidding collection of the tax. The injunction was granted by the United States court of the eastern district of Kentucky, which held that the law violated the state and federal constitutions in that it provided no adequate remedy at law and that it was confiscatory.

Two suits were involved in today's argument. In one the state and the Louisville Public Warehouse company appeared from an injunction granted to the J. & A. Freiberg company of Cincinnati and in the other the state appeared from a similar injunction granted to the Kentucky Distilleries & Warehouse company. The Freiberg company attempted to remove its whisky to Massachusetts for storage without paying the tax. The warehouse company refused to release it and the suit resulted.

FIGHT ON LIQUOR HARD ONE

Revenue Officers "Are Up Against
Tough Proposition."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Revenue officers under the Volstead act "are against the toughest proposition any men ever were up against," according to Paul F. Myers, assistant commissioner of internal revenue, whose testimony before the house appropriations committee was made public today.

Myers declared they were dealing with the worst element of crooks in the country. Commissioner Williams explained that the department was having difficulty in finding the right type of men to go after violators at the rate of pay offered and that they were open to all sorts of temptation, particularly to bribes.

Some of them have fallen, and that was to be expected," he said. "When a man feels the pinch of hunger, he is apt to go wrong."

Big Scale Bribery Charged.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—Lawrence Malawista, an agent of the National Surety company, was arrested today at the corporation's Broadway office by secret service men on charges of offering government agents bribes totaling more than \$100,000 for assistance in connection with liquor permit frauds.

INDIANS' RIGHTS TESTED

Suits Brought to Determine Question of Exemption From Taxes.

YAKIMA, Wash., Jan. 6.—(Special.)—Leading cases to be heard by Judge F. H. Rudkin in a session of federal court which opens January 17 are suits brought by Yakima Indians to set aside tax deeds issued by Yakima county, following certificates of tax delinquency. These are the first cases of that character and are therefore regarded as a test of the right of Indians to exemption from state and county taxes.

One of the tracts involved is the old homestead of Chief Saluskin in the Parker district. It now is claimed by his widow, and the place is held in veneration by the Indians because upon it is located their famous "medicine stone."

YAKIMA, Wash., Jan. 6.—(Special.)—A health clinic for needy pupils of the Yakima public and private schools has been established by the Yakima health department. According to figures given out by Miss Georgiana Maguire, school nurse, a large proportion of the children who showed under-weight in October, and who have been given half a pint of fresh milk daily by the school district, show marked improvement in weight and general conditions of health.

Tractor School Started.
