The drive is being conducted by Eugene Vincent, a senior, with the aid of class representatives, and will end today, when it is expected the total sum will reach \$400.

ROBERT L. WILKINS GETS DAMAGES.—Damages of \$5000 were awarded Robert L. Wilkins by a jury in the court of Circuit Judge Tucker yesterday, in his suit against the North Coast Power company, in which \$50,000 was asked. He suffered severe injuries when he was given a severe electrical shock because a metal flange pole he was carrying touched a high voltage cable, which had been allowed to sag over a road between Kelso and Castle Rock, Wash. The accident occurred on May 18, 1920.

Cullen robbed the residence of the Chinese at Fourth and Salmon streets on November 20, taking a safe containing about \$1000. Though Cullen will be taken from the city jail to serve his sentence, a motion for a new trial will be argued after his incarceration.

He was removed to the county hospital, where it was reported that he probably would live, due to prompt medical attention at the city emergency hospital.

YOUTH ADMITS ROBBERIES.
BURGLARIES OF HOMES CONFESSED BY GANG MEMBER.
 One Victim Not Aware of Losses
 Until Informed of Fact by Police Department.

Several small house robberies were cleared up yesterday when Charles Davis, ex-reform school pupil, pointed out to inspectors Howell and Price various residences and stores that he and companions had entered during the past few months. Two of the youths arrested with Davis, Eddie Liaoaki and Paul Hoffman, were released for lack of evidence against them, but Claude Twigger, fourth member of the alleged gang, is held on larceny charges.

Among the places that Davis said he had helped burglarize were the residence of H. D. Oliver, 125 Second street; the Red Front store, the residence of W. W. Hill, Thirtieth street and Sandy boulevard, and the residence of D. C. Jaxheimer and W. L. Hamlin, 205 and 201 Stanton street, respectively. In almost every instance the plunder was small. It was the practice of the gang, said Davis, to enter a house by means of a collection of pass keys and relock the door upon departure, thus delaying discovery of the robbery. At least one of the householders whose residence was pointed out as having been entered, declared that the confession was his first knowledge of any such robbery.

Captain of Inspectors Circle believes that John Doney, now in a local hospital recovering from an operation, is another member of the gang, and a warrant will be issued for his arrest as soon as he is discharged.

BOY SCOUTS TO VISIT BANK.
 Reception Saturday Is in Interest of Thrift Stamp Campaign.

The Boy Scouts of Portland and vicinity will be entertained all day Saturday and Saturday evening with a reception at the Peoples bank. During the day the boys will be shown through the bank and the bank routine explained to them by officers of the institution. Samuel Slocum, who is in charge of the bank's juvenile department, will present each scout with a thrift stamp as he enters the bank.

The reception will begin at 10 A. M. and will last until 8 P. M. or later, if the boys so desire. Every scout in Portland has been invited through James E. Brockway, scout executive. Since the scout thrift stamp campaign began hundreds of the scouts have begun to save money, which formerly went for candies and amusements. Most of them are saving for next summer's vacation. Others are saving their dime for scout suits and hiking equipment.

BRINGING AMERICANS FROM GERMANY HIT

Mother Did Not Like United States, Says Doctor.

PAIR NOW GROWN UP

Dr. F. A. Kiehle Tells Why He Opposes Raising Funds for Children of Late Professor Tausch.

The wisdom of Dr. David Starr Jordan's plea for funds to enable the return to Oregon from Germany of the two children of the late Professor Tausch, who taught in Portland high schools and who was a member of the Willamette university faculty 15 years ago, is challenged by Dr. Frederick A. Kiehle of this city, in a recent letter to Dr. Jordan.

The plea of the noted California educator was that, inasmuch as the children of Dr. Tausch were born in Oregon and are citizens, though the mother took them back to Germany after the death of their father, a fund should be subscribed to enable them to return. With this Dr. Kiehle takes issue, asserting that he, too, knew both Dr. and Mrs. Tausch, and that he doubts the advisability at this time of aiding the German-reared children—now grown to young manhood and womanhood—again to establish a residence in this country.

Both parents proved their inadaptability to Americanization, declared Dr. Kiehle, holding it altogether probable that the children have been trained in German citizenship and ideals, rather than in ours. His letter to Dr. Jordan reads:

"In The Oregonian of last Sunday appeared an appeal, attributed to you, for funds to finance the return to this country of the two children of the late Dr. Tausch."

"I am far from desirous of hampering the career of youth—even those of German lineage—but in this instance, particularly so, for their return to America involves, as I infer it does, the return of their mother as well. I must from loyalty to my country protest with vigor."

"Dr. and Mrs. Tausch became known to me about 20 years ago in Minneapolis, where my father, the late David Litchard Kiehle, befriended them."

"Even at that time their inadaptability to American life, their tactlessness and their lack of sympathy with American customs and civic ideals, manifested themselves in their positions in the east."

"Headless of this experience, a similar fate befell them in the middle west."

"Coming to Oregon, the story was the same, and to my knowledge at least three positions procured for them through their friends were soon lost because of outspoken condemnation and criticism of the very land and its institutions that were giving them a much-needed livelihood."

"Mrs. Tausch is a woman of thorough education and German refinement, but she was distinctly unhappy in this country. Returned to her native land as she was through funds donated for that purpose by her friends, and going eagerly with the avowed desire of bringing up her children as Germans, I feel very strongly that she should have no circumstances return to America, least of all at this trying hour when the world is finding itself."

"Nor does it seem probable that the mother's precepts and example can possibly have furnished the children with the proper foundation for American citizenship. I trust, sir, you will give serious thought to a reconsideration of your support of this proposed undertaking."

SOCIAL WORKERS UNITE.
 Representatives of 20 City Clubs

Action for forming a legislative council, which it is hoped will represent various organizations of the city interested in social work, was taken at a meeting of the Oregon Social Workers' association, also attended by representatives of 20 other city organizations at the Central library yesterday afternoon.

A committee was appointed by S. C. Kohs, president of the Social Workers' association, to draw up a constitution for the proposed council. The plan is to have the proposed council handle legislation in which the organizations may be interested, thereby taking care with one body of much of the work now handled by individual clubs through their legislative committees. 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THRIFT WEEK PLANNED

PORTLAND WILL JOIN BIG ECONOMY MOVEMENT.
 Private and Public Organizations to Unite in Campaign to Create Spirit of Saving.

Portland will observe national thrift week, January 17 to 23, with just as much diligence as it devoted to various calls of the government during the war. The movement for conservation is being fostered by private and public organizations, and the spirit of saving will be emphasized. H. W. Stone, general secretary of the Portland Young Men's Christian association, is in charge of the work in this district.

Joe T. Pratt, director of the national budget committee, New York City, has written Mr. Stone that the committee is giving full co-operation to the thrift programme.

"While we are organized to promote a national budget, yet we are anxious to help on budget day," wrote Mr. Pratt. "Thrift on the part of the individual is greatly handicapped by waste on the part of the government. On the other hand, there will be no forceful demand for government economy until the individual learns to save and become interested in governmental expenditure of his saving."

"It is for these reasons that we believe nations and individuals should go hand in hand and should be stressed at the same time."
