STATE BY NOTED SCULPTOR GIFT TO NEW YORK STATE.

A. Phinister Proctor, Visiting Here, Uses Big Beaver, Black-foot Chief, as His Model.

A. Phinister Proctor, noted sculptor of western types, now making a short stay in Portland, received word recently that his work was progressing on the erection of one of his latest works, an Indian statue which will be presented to the state of New York by George D. Pratt, New York state conservation commissioner.

The statue will be placed against a hillside, beside a pool of water. The figure of the Indian is supposed to be recently that of a young man who was given a handful of water, and this idea will be realistically portrayed by a stream of water running from the Indian's hand.

Work on this study was begun by Mr. Proctor in the spring of 1919, when he went to the Glacier national park region of Montana to obtain a model. Big Beaver, a chief of one of the Blackfoot tribes, supplied the model.

Mr. Proctor is working on "The Circuit Rider," a monument commemorating the pioneer ministers, which will be presented to the state of Oregon by Senator R. A. Booth, and the Roosevelt equestrian statue to be given to the city of Portland by Dr. Henry Waldo Cox.
