SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 9. - (Special.)-John B. Milholland, investment broker, of the firm of Milholland & Hough of Spokane, accused by Jay B. Callahan, mil-Honaire Wallace, Idaho, mining man, committed suicide by shooting himself at his home here tonight while the police were searching for him with a warrant for his arrest.

Prosecuting Attorney Lindsey, immediately after receiving the confeswion of Mr. Hough, issued a warrant for the arrest of Milholland, but before it could be served Milholland had killed himself.

Under a telescop Venus shows practically all the phases of the moon although it never appears full, as its orbit lies within that of the earth.
