GLOOMY VIEW IS TAKEN

Extension of Guerrilla Warfare in
Martial Law Areas Feared by
Officials in Dublin.

DUBLIN, Jan. 9.—All peace negotiations in Ireland have broken down, according to reports from official circles. Definite information was lacking, but it was said Premier Lloyd George had refused to consider the Sinn Féin proposal for the withdrawal of the home rule bill.

LORD DECIES IS CANDIDATE

Election to Proposed Southern Irish
Parliament Is Sought.

DUBLIN, Jan. 9.—The first candidate to offer himself for election to the southern Irish parliament is Lord Decies, who has written a letter for publication tomorrow, in which he admitted that the home rule act is far from perfect, but said it represents a gift of self-government which is ours for the asking.

Expressing the belief that the home rule act can be made better, he announced his purpose of asking some southern Irish constituency to elect him a member of the southern parliament.

The action was supposed to be part of the plan of the government to encourage willingness to work for the new act.

WIDE AMBUSH IS REPORTED

Bridges at Various Points Also Reported Destroyed.

LONDON, Jan. 9.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Dublin today said it was rumored that a wide area in the east, through Celbridge, Maynooth and Kildare, and all of which places road bridges were reported to have been destroyed to Battersdown, in the west.

RELIEF FOOD IS GUARDED

Armed Force Kept on American
Steamer, Despite Protests.

QUEENSTOWN, Jan. 9.—On the arrival today from New York of the American steamer Honolulu, with provisions for the relief of the famine-stricken people of Cork, the authorities placed an armed guard on the vessel.

SINN FEIN LEADER ARRESTED

BELFAST, Jan. 9.—Troops at Derry today surrounded the residence of Joseph O'Doherty, Sinn Féin member of parliament, and arrested him. He will be interned for two months.

80 Sinn Féiners Are Sentenced

CAHIRGUILLAMORE, Ireland, Jan. 9.—Sixty Sinn Féiners charged with unlawful assembly have been sentenced to six months' hard labor by a military court here today.

Bids for Bonds in Salem District
Must Be Received Before Noon.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 9.—(Special.)—Unless bids for bonds authorized today by the county board for construction in the Salem road district are received by the county clerk by noon tomorrow there will be no improvements made in this line during the year 1921, according to announcement made here today.

All the market road districts of Marion county, with the exception of the Salem district, have subscribed for the bonds, and have placed their sealed bids with the county clerk. One-half of the bond subscription of the county is in the Salem district.

WHEAT MARKETING TOPIC

Alberta Farmers to Hold 13th Annual Convention.

EDMONTON, Alta., Jan. 9.—Questions having to do with the marketing of wheat and the proposed wheat pool, the principle of which was approved by the Canadian council of agriculture, will be the dominating subject at the 13th annual convention of the United Farmers of Alberta, which convenes here January 13 to 21. With the official call there was sent out a list of 42 resolutions to be passed upon by the convention and this number is likely to be augmented before the opening session of the meeting. These resolutions include constitutional amendments recommended by the central board.

There are nine resolutions on the co-operative marketing of wheat,

asking for the establishment of a wheat pool or such other form of co-operative marketing as would overcome "the evils" of the present methods of marketing. Other resolutions ask for a national grain board for the marketing of all grains, somewhat after the fashion of the wheat board of 1919. Still another wants standardization of farm products prices.

One resolution to be submitted reads "The United Farmers are in favor of and wish to see such legislation enacted as to give the government complete control of importation, manufacture and distribution of both wholesale and retail of all liquor in the following manner:

"That no person in the province under 21 years of age may purchase liquor."

"That there be only one bonded government vendor in each village, town or city."

"That under no circumstances must the liquor be consumed either on the premises where it is sold, or on the streets of villages, towns or cities."

"That in case of drunkenness in public there be legislation providing for the same."

Other resolutions include co-operative creameries, freight rates, hail insurance, banking system.

TERMINAL HEARING IS SET

CASE OPENS AT 10 O'CLOCK
NEXT FRIDAY MORNING.

City Prepares to Present Its Side
of the Controversy With
State as Complainant.

Interest in the Portland terminal station centers upon the hearing of the case before an interstate commerce commission examiner, scheduled to begin at the quarters of the state public service commission in the courthouse at 10 o'clock next Friday morning.

Preparations are now going forward for presentation of the case from its various angles, with the state commission as the complainant and the city of Portland and the Great Northern and the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railways as intervenors. Counsel for these are preparing final papers from that standpoint, while engineers are busy compiling data on that feature of the case.

The object of the complaint, filed by Fred G. Buchtel, Fred A. Williams and H. H. Corey, of the state commission as a result of a demand made upon the so-called Hill railroad lines by Mayor Baker for a better depot here, is to obtain an order from the interstate commerce commission to the two roads named the right to permanent use of the facilities of the Northern Pacific Terminal company.

The majority stockholders of the terminal company, represented by the Southern and Union Pacific systems, recently voted to refuse the use of those facilities to the non-tenant roads after December 31, 1920. A special committee, composed of representatives of the city, was named by Mayor Baker to investigate the situation and to act. As a result, the city officially appealed to the state commission.

A request from the interstate commission sufficed to secure temporary terminal accommodations for the two non-tenant members until such time as the entire case is heard by an arbitrator and receives final consideration by the commission.

GRANT SUCCEEDS LAROCHE

NO IMMEDIATE CHANGES IN
OFFICE CONTEMPLATED.

City Attorney Will Attend Council
Meetings Instead of Sending
His Deputy.

Frank S. Grant will formally assume duties as city attorney today, taking the place of Walter P. LaRoche, who served in that capacity for nearly eight years, and who resigned last week to enter private practice.

Mr. Grant, while familiar in a general way with municipal affairs, having served as city attorney prior to Mr. LaRoche's tenure of the office, said last night that he will require some time to get into the intimate details of important cases now pending, such as the terminal hearing.

He was at the city hall for some time yesterday afternoon, going over the situation with the chief clerk of his office, and today will confer with his predecessor on major points.

"I have been too busy with private affairs of late to go into city matters," said Mr. Grant, "but I will confer with Mr. LaRoche on some of the major cases, such as the Portland terminal problem, and will then outline my future course as city attorney, gradually working into the business of the legal bureau."

"There will be no immediate changes in the office, so far as I am concerned. I will have to study the situation before I can determine whether there will be eventually. I will resume my practice of personally attending the meetings of the council instead of having a deputy present. I believe it gives the city attorney a better opportunity to keep abreast of all municipal legislation and problems attending thereon than to rely on reports submitted by someone else."

AIRMEN ARE YET IN WILDS

NO WORD IS RECEIVED FROM
RETURNING BALLOONISTS.

Hudson Bay Men Say Guide Bringing
Party Through Snow Is
Exceptionally Capable.

MATTIC, Ont., Jan. 9.—Information tonight was lacking in regard to three naval balloonists returning from Moose Factory, near where they descended after a long and arduous journey.

George MacLeod, one of the Indian runners, who brought the aeronauts' dispatches from Moose Factory, said he did not expect them until tomorrow. He said 11 days, the time taken by his party in covering the distance from Mislinab to Moose Factory, was a record. It usually takes two weeks, he added.

Lieutenant Farrell, the Indian continued, is being brought back on a sled. He suffered more from exposure than his companions.

Factor Mavor of the Hudson's Bay company, said tonight that Oliver Marks, the Indian guide leading the Americans out of the frigid wilderness, was an exceptionally capable man.

The Mislinab trail, he declared, was open in many places, and the party would be compelled to make numerous detours.

The balloon probably will be salvaged and brought out next summer, MacLeod said. The temperature today rose to 10 degrees above zero.

REPORT OF LEAGUE'S PROGRESS IS ISSUED

International Court Is Put
Among Achievements.

BLOCKADE STUDY CITED

Secretariat in Official Document
Announces Steps Taken for
Limitation of Armaments.

PARIS, Jan. 9.—The secretariat of the league of nations today issued an official document, "The work accomplished by the league of nations during the first year of its existence, January 10, 1920, to January 10, 1921." It mentioned establishment of a permanent international court of justice, work accomplished in the limitation of armaments and creation of an international commission to study use of the blockade as an economic measure. These were mentioned as measures "designed to prevent war."

As measures designed to remedy the economic crisis, the report said, creation of an economic and financial organization in accordance with conclusions of the Brussels financial conference and the organization of a transit commission were foremost in the league's work.

Humanitarian Work Discussed.

Concerning humanitarian measures, the report says, the league elaborated such projects as an appeal for funds to fight typhus; acceptance of responsibilities for opium traffic control and also the white slave traffic; caused the United States, Brazil and Spain to accept mediation in Armenia, and effected the repatriation of more than 100,000 war prisoners.

Regarding execution of the peace treaty the league pointed out these missions accomplished:

Administration of the Saar Valley.

City of Danzig Involved.

Direction of the affairs of the free city of Danzig.

Rejection of the German government's demand for a plebiscite in Eupen and Malmedy, and the final awarding of the territories to Belgium.

The acceptance of responsibility for the protection of minorities.

NATIONAL THRIFT WEEK COM-
MITTEE IS HEADED.

Portland Y. M. C. A. Is Taking

OREGON MEN PROMINENT

SENATOR McNARY PRESIDING
OFFICER IN SENATE.

Representative McArthur Takes
Speaker's Chair While House
Discusses Appropriation Bill.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Oregon has been more than usually conspicuous in both the senate and house during the last of the week. At the same time Saturday, and during most of the afternoon, Senator McNary was presiding in the senate while debates were raging over the Mussel shoals nitrate bill and Representative McArthur was presiding over the deliberations of the house on the post-office appropriation bill. Mr. McArthur continued in the chair today.

It is expected that three new Oregon river and harbor projects will be recognized in a bill upon which the house rivers and harbors committee began consideration yesterday. These are the Umpqua, Nehalem bay and the Clatskanie river, all of which have been reported favorably by the board of engineers.

Representative Hawley also expects favorable action on a project to improve the entrance to Coos bay.

Captain Frank P. Tingley is to be relieved as depot commander at Portland by Second Lieutenant Vere Painter, now with the general supply depot at San Francisco. Captain Tingley is assigned to Fort Mason, Cal. Captain Paul Hathaway, now at Camp Sherman, Ohio, has been detailed for general recruiting service at Portland.

Fourth-class postoffices in Oregon have been raised to presidential class as of January 1 and the postmaster's salary fixed as set forth after the name of each office in the following list: Bay City, \$1200; Cascade Locks, \$1100; Corvallis, \$1100; Coos Bay, \$1100; Knappton, \$1200; Molalla, \$1200; Mosier, \$1200; Turner, \$1300.

The effect of the advancement of these offices is to create an immediate postmaster vacancy at each place to be filled by appointment. The present postmasters will hold office until their successors are named. Some of course, stand a chance of succeeding themselves.

Canada's Naval Squadron Ordered to West Coast.

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LONDON, Jan. 9.—The London Daily Telegraph has received word from Sydney, New South Wales, saying: "Considerable publicity has been given here to the announcement that the Canadian naval squadron will be transferred to the Pacific, where it will co-operate with the American fleet."

The whole question of the development of the commonwealth's navy has been deferred pending the forthcoming imperial conference, but it is understood that a scheme whereby the Australian, Canadian and New Zealand navies could harmonize in conjunction with the American fleet for the protection of the Pacific.

"The creation of an imperial Pacific fleet, to which the royal navy would contribute, was prominently discussed here immediately before the war, and the subject will be raised at the imperial conference."

OREGON DINNER PLANNED

Homemade Products to Be Served
at Church Festivity.

"Made-in-Oregon" products will be displayed at a meeting tonight in the parlors of the First Congregational church. A dinner featuring food produced in this state will be served following which a programme of speeches will be held.

G. C. Clark, manager of the Associated Industries of Oregon, will be the principal speaker. Roy Heath of the Oregon Broom company, F. N. Clark of the Oregon Photographic company and other business men will make short addresses. Judge George Rossman will preside. An attendance of 200 is expected at the dinner.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Jan. 9.—(Special.)—McClellan Parto, aged 35, Centralia business man, died Friday in Tacoma following a brief illness of pneumonia. The funeral will be held tomorrow. Mr. Parto is survived by his widow and two daughters. In addition to his confectionery store, he conducted a wholesale candy and ice cream business in Tacoma.

WHITE SALMON, Wash., Jan. 9.—(Special.)—Jacob Hunsaker, a pioneer of White Salmon, died at Everett, Wash., December 27, in 1878. Mr. Hunsaker resided in White Salmon in 1880. He established the community pioneer store, and succeeded Douglas Sukendorf as postmaster. Mr. Hunsaker, during his residence here, served as county commissioner, and was elected to both the upper and lower houses of the legislature. He left here in the 1900s, moving to Everett.

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SMALL TOWNS TAKE TO BLUE SKY LAWS

Reform Movement Favored
in Rural Districts.

13 DISTRICTS ARE IN LINE

Places in Illinois Enlisted in Support of Plan for Ban of
Sunday Amusements.

CHICAGO, Dec. 9.—If you live in a big city and happen to entertain the flippancy viewpoint that this business of stopping the movies, baseball and the like on Sunday is one huge joke and cannot be put over in this day and age, don't express yourself too loudly.

You are forgetting the small towns. The small towns are taking to the blue Sunday movement enthusiastically, here in the middle west. Dr. W. S. Fleming, central district manager of the National Reform association, said in an interview last night. The doctor and his associate speakers have already succeeded in working up 13 Illinois towns to the "point of agitation," which is all they are aiming to do for the present; state legislation will follow.

These towns are: Evanston, Wilmette, Kenilworth, Downers Grove, Indian Hill, Winnetka, Hubbard Woods, Glenview, Ravinia, Highland Park, Lake Forest, Lake Bluff and Waukegan.

Other States to Be Invaded.

Dr. Fleming said that Indiana is to be invaded by Sabbatarian speakers next week and Iowa in the near future.

The agitation has reached the point in Downers Grove, where the question of a blue Sunday probably will come up for a vote of the people. It seems that a month ago Elmer Uhlhorn, proprietor of a motion picture house, started running Sunday night shows. They became so popular he started Sunday matinees.

This was too much for the most conservative inhabitants. The town board got busy and Chief of Police Verand arrested Uhlhorn. The movie man engaged Attorney Bunde, who informed the board that unless Uhlhorn is allowed to go on with his Sunday movies he would demand a referendum.

Illinois Towns Are Agitated.

The other dozen northern Illinois towns are equally agitated. Dr. Fleming has been in these towns advocating the following platform:

Strict observance of the Sabbath. Anti-vice legislation. Motion picture control by the state. The Bible in the public schools.

"I am glad to declare that the movie, the theater, the dance, baseball and other forms of commercialized pleasure on Sunday must be stopped," said Dr. Fleming.

"Women's club leaders and representative citizens in the smaller communities are dead set against the Sunday movie. These small communities get the uncensored films, and they are filthy. The movie people are really helping our movement."

Blue Sunday in Many Towns.

Opponents of the Sabbatarian in northern Illinois are wrought up. They say puritanical conditions already prevail. Evanston, by ordinance, has prohibited Sunday movies for six years. Wilmette has no Sunday movies. The sale of tobacco also is suspended there on the Sabbath. Winnetka has no Sunday movies. Highland Park and Lake Forest permit Sunday movies.

The Rev. Father du Penha of Milwaukee, speaking in Waukegan Sunday, assailed the blue Sunday movement, declaring that "men should go to church Sunday, but after worship they would be permitted to spend their time as they choose."

Counter attacks are accepted serenely by the reform association. They help the agitation.

Centralia Lights Hearing Set.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Jan. 9.—(Special.)—The city commission Tuesday will hold a hearing on the proposed creation of an improvement district in the business section of Centralia for the installation of ornamental lights. The estimated cost of the improvement is \$24,000. The commission Tuesday will also hold a hearing on the proposed ordinance to place a small tax on all vehicles for the upkeep of the city's streets.
