

He married Mary Elizabeth Knox of Hill, N. H., in 1855. Since her death three years ago he has been in failing health. He is survived by three sons, J. A., H. A. and W. C. Haseltine; two daughters, Mrs. G. Hamelton and Mrs. M. H. Schmeer, and nine grandchildren.

Mr. Haseltine nad been numbered among the prominent men in the commercial life of Portland. He was always interested in the betterment of the city and state. He had a wide circle of friends all over Oregon.


