LEGION HOSPITAL PLAN FAVORITE—Support for the Summers bill in congress, providing for the establishment at Walla Walla, Wash., of a rehabilitation hospital for service men during the convalescent period after discharge from other government hospitals, is sought of the American Legion in Oregon by the Washington legion, according to communications received at state headquarters yesterday. Vocational training at the stages would be a feature of the rehabilitation hospital. It is a brick building at Walla Walla which could be refitted to care for 250 patients. State officials of the American Legion in Washington just completed an investigation of the proposed site.






