

STEEL INDUSTRIES FACE UNIONIZATION

New Campaign Organized to Maintain Wages.

LABOR BACKS MOVEMENT

Mill Operators Are Warned Against Any Attempt to Lower Present Scale Affecting Workers.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—(By the Associated Press.)—Representatives of the international and national unions in the steel industry decided today to launch a new campaign to organize steel workers throughout the country.

Unemployment and present industrial conditions, it was announced, would not interfere or cause a postponement of the new steel unionization plans. Decision to combat at once any effort by the United States Steel corporation to reduce the present standard of wages in the steel mills also was reached.

The committee was said to expect to begin its active work in the early spring.

Special Committee in Charge.
The campaign will be conducted by a new committee to be officially known as the executive council of national and international organizations in the steel industry affiliated with the American Federation of Labor. This committee replaces the national committee for organizing iron and steel workers, which conducted the great steel strike of last year.

Approximately 14 national and international unions will participate in the new campaign and be represented by the executive council, as against more than 20 which were involved in the last strike.

Steel Workers Only Affected.
All organizations not actually interested in the steel industry, it was announced, have been eliminated from activity in the new movement, although they will back it with their moral support. M. J. Tighe of Pittsburgh, president of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers, was elected permanent chairman of the council, and William Hannon of Chicago, general executive board member of the International Association of Machinists, was made secretary and treasurer.

Industrial conditions throughout the country were thoroughly discussed by the committee. Hannon said, and it was unanimously decided that the new campaign should be conducted without any further waste of time.

Present Conditions No Bar.
"We believe that present conditions will be of short duration," he added, "and will be no bar to our activities."

While the testimony given before the joint legislative committee investigating the "building trust" in New York, regarding the open shop activities of the steel companies, was discussed, Hannon said the committee decided not to take any matter at this time, but would deal with any situation that should develop.

Reports have reached us that the United States Steel corporation is going to reduce wages," he continued, "and the committee decided to take such steps as may be necessary to meet such a move."

Strikes Are Not Included.
Mr. Hannon declared it was not the intention of the council to conduct strikes, but only to participate in legitimate organizing work in the steel plants, locating its headquarters either in Pittsburgh or Chicago.

Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor, announced that he held between \$70,000 and \$75,000 left over after all debts and obligations of the old committee had been paid. This money, it was said, will be used to finance the opening of the new campaign.

The organizations which will be represented in the new unionization movement were announced as the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, International Brotherhood of Blacksmiths and Helpers, Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers, Structural Iron Workers, Mine, Mill and Smelter Men, International Association of Machinists, Stationers, Firemen and Oilers, Iron Molders' union, International Brotherhood of Boiler Makers, Pattern Makers' League of America, Foundry Employers' union, Bricklayers' union, Steam and Operating Engineers and the Brotherhood of Railway Car Men of America.

BANK OF TIGARD ELECTS

50 Per Cent Dividend and \$2500 Surplus Feature Report.

The First Bank of Tigard held its annual meeting Thursday. The following officers were elected: President, C. F. Tigard; vice-presidents, Fritz Elmer and James M. McNaughton; cashier, W. M. Evans; assistant cashier, A. H. Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers.

The cashier's report showed that a 50 per cent dividend had been paid and that there was a surplus for the year of \$2500, with a surplus for the 18 months since the bank first opened of \$3500.

ALBERT ESTATE \$177,660

Salem Banker Dies Intestate and Widow Asks for Papers.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 14.—(Special.)—The real property of John H. Albert, Salem banker, who died recently, was valued at \$177,660, and the personal property at \$55,000, a total of \$232,660, according to a petition filed in the probate court today, by Mrs. Elizabeth McNary Albert.

Mrs. Albert asks that she be named administratrix of the estate. Her husband left no will or testament, she said.

FIRE LOSS IS \$12,000

Railway Pumping Station Destroyed at Metolius Early In Day.

BEND, Or., Jan. 14.—(Special.)—Fire of unknown origin destroyed the Oregon Trunk railroad pumping station at Metolius early this morning, causing a loss of approximately \$12,000.

Rebuilding will be started at once.

GANGSTER'S TRIAL IS SET

Alleged Assailant of Girl to Have Second Hearing.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 14.—The second trial of Allen McDonald on a charge of attacking Miss Jessie Montgomery in company with other men here early Thanksgiving morning was set today for Monday, January 17. The jury in the first trial disagreed. Thomas Brady, who was acquitted of participation in the same attack, will be tried after McDonald, for another offense in connection with Miss Montgomery's charges.

As a result of five jurors who voted to acquit McDonald asking for protection by the district attorney from public criticism, McDonald's attorney said he would move that his client be tried in another county.

"I am convinced that he cannot get a fair trial in San Francisco," he said.

in the League cabinet, follows:

Ordinary appropriations for public administration, interest charges on all debts, and pensions, \$7,525,000,000 francs; revenue from taxes in force and all other sources, \$2,525,000,000 francs.

This shows an apparent deficit of \$5,000,000,000 francs, but the figures do not take into account the excess yield of taxes over the budget estimates, which runs from 10 to 15 per cent. This would leave a deficit of a little more than \$4,000,000,000 francs. The collection of reparations probably will be sufficient to strike a balance.

Besides the ordinary budget, parliament was asked by the preceding administration to vote for 1921 appropriations of 16,000,000 francs as an advance on France's reparations accounts with Germany, to continue the construction work in the northern departments.

The new cabinet will insist upon realization of its claims upon Germany, so that at least the interest charges on this sum and the 35,000,000 francs previously advanced may be covered.

HUGHES HIGHLY POPULAR

FEW PUBLIC MEN THOUGHT TO HAVE MORE FRIENDS.

Some Urging Necessary to Get ex-Justice Into Cabinet; Acceptance Means Sacrifice.

THE OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Jan. 14.—Who is the most popular man in political life? Warren G. Harding having broken all records in presidential majorities, his name should be excluded in answering this question, despite the contention that the personal element entered into his victory.

Up around Marion, O., where the president-elect is busy trying to make a cabinet that will be qualified to carry a good share of the load in the next administration, it is agreed that the most notable reaction has been that which followed the mention of Charles Evans Hughes for a place in the official family. The response revealed that Mr. Hughes has admirers everywhere, and, if he has any enemies outside the circle of politicians, they have remained quiet.

"The president-elect is understood to feel now that it is incumbent on him to do more than to invite Mr. Hughes into the cabinet. The latter will be urged and it will require some urging, because Mr. Hughes is a man who never pretends to be anxious for the cabinet. Besides, it will be some sacrifice for him to give up private business for a job that pays only \$12,000 a year, no matter how high the honor."

Since his defeat for the presidency in 1916 it is understood that Mr. Hughes has acquired without any special effort on his part the most lucrative practice of any lawyer in the United States.

There were good evidences of his popularity last Saturday and Monday when crowds such as seldom have been seen in the vicinity of the door of the supreme court stood in line seeking to get into the courtroom to hear the former presidential candidate argue the Newberry election case.
