VETERANS PLAN PERMANENT ORGANIZATION.

Portland Committee Working Up Large Delegation to Attend Banquet at San Francisco.

Plans are under way to form a permanent organization of ex-members of the Eighteenth Engineers (Railway) at the reunion and banquet of ex-soldiers of that regiment to be held at San Francisco Saturday, according to advice received by the Portland committee, which is working up a large delegation from the northwest for the affair. It is the intention to make this the first of a series of annual reunions to be held alternately in California and some northwest city, it is declared.

The Portland committee, composed of Kenneth D. Hauser of the Hauser Construction company and Kenneth Griffin of the Burke Machinery company, ex-major and sergeant in the regiment, reported that considerable interest is being shown in the proposed trip to San Francisco and it is hoped to take a good number to represent this section. Dr. Walter Kelton, ex-major, also reported that he is securing delegation from Seattle and other Washington cities.

It is planned to have the northwest delegation leave Portland on the train which leaves the Union station just after midnight Thursday.

1920 REPORTED BEST YEAR IN LOCAL HISTORY.

The year 1920 was the greatest in the history of the Portland Y. M. C. A. in activity, membership and contributions, according to reports made yesterday at the annual meeting of members. Total membership during the year reached 13,000, while at present 5234 active members are on the rolls. The local association is the largest west of Chicago, according to H. W. Stone, general secretary.

Annual election of officers was postponed until March by a vote of the membership. The directors of the association authorized the raising of a fund for a memorial for A. M. Grille, ex-executive secretary and physical director of the Portland association and head of training camp activities at Camp Lewis during the war. B. C. Darnall, chairman of the physical department committee, presented the matter of the memorial to the directors.

SEWERS TO BE REMEDIED

CONTRACTORS TO MAKE GOOD DEFECTIVE CONSTRUCTION.

Work Will Be Done Under Close Supervision of City and Paid For on Acceptance.

Under an agreement reached yesterday, the contracting firm of Asar & Co., which recently came into the spotlight in connection with investigations into defective sewer construction, will start at once to remedy the faulty work and will complete all other construction work for which it has contracted with the city.

The work will be done under the closest supervision by officials of the department of public works. Payment will be made to the concern as the work is completed and approved, to enable the firm to accomplish the repairs. It is estimated that it will cost the company about \$10,000 to unearth and properly lay the Ainsworth and Minnesota avenues sewer system, against the which complaint was made.

The agreement under which the work will proceed, was reached yesterday at a conference between officials of the department of public works, A. Y. Asar, president of the company, and Frank E. Smith, representing the Fidelity & Deposit company of Maryland, the bonding house of the Asar company. The bonding house agreed to aid Asar in accomplishing the repair work.

Asar is at present under contract to do nearly \$100,000 worth of construction work for the city. This work was temporarily halted following the discovery of the defective work in the one sewer system.

O. E. Stanley, an assistant city engineer, was suspended for a 30-day period and W. A. McQuiggin, an inspector, was discharged after the faulty work was revealed.

LAND FRAUD IS CHARGED

Executrix of Rumble Estate Is Named Defendant in Suit.

Dummy entries in fraudulently obtained government land in Walla Walla county is charged in a suit filed yesterday by the government in an attempt to collect \$4800 from the estate of E. W. Rumble. Daisy E. Rumble, executrix of the estate, is named as defendant.

Rumble is alleged to have procured title to 440 acres of timber lands in 1902 through the payment of \$200 each to three men who filed upon the land for him. Shortly after gaining title he disposed of the land to C. H. Minnaugh for \$4800.

Through the suit filed yesterday by Assistant United States Attorney Veach the government will attempt to recover the \$4800 and interest at 6 per cent from September, 1902.

PROPOSED FAIR INDORSED

Building Trades Council Gives \$100 Toward Financing Event.

The proposed exposition in Portland in 1925 has been indorsed by action of the Portland Building Trades Council. The organization yesterday forwarded \$100 to the Columbia Hydro-Electric league to go toward financing the affair and announced in the communication accompanying the check that it would call upon all organized labor to support the exposition both morally and financially.

"The state of Oregon has too long kept her resources hidden from the outside world," declared the letter, which is signed by E. A. Cheyne, B. W. Stearns, Fred C. Ream and J. D. W. Smith, members of the committee of the Building Trades council.

FOUR HUNTERS FINED

Men Arrested on Last Day of Season Plead Guilty.

Four Washington county men, arrested near Cornelius on the last day of the duck season, paid \$25 each and costs and forfeited their shotguns for hunting without licenses when they entered pleas of guilty before the justice of the peace at Hillsboro Monday, according to announcement of the state game warden's office yesterday. One of the names was fined \$25 in addition to having wood ducks in his possession.

The four men were Joe Kama, John Behrman, Ernest Behrman and George Behrman. All were arrested by Joe Craig, deputy game warden, on January 15.

Milwaukee Grange Desires to Become Part of Multnomah.

Annexation of a portion of the northern part of Clackamas county to Multnomah county was urged at the last meeting of Milwaukee grange in the way of a resolution which was unanimously adopted.

PORTLAND FINANCES BEST

ROTARY CLUB HEARS COMPARISON OF RESOURCES.

Charles H. Stewart Declares Savings of Community Are Vital Factor in Exports.

The financial situation on the Pacific coast was declared to be better than other sections of the United States and that of Portland to be better than other coast cities, by Charles H. Stewart, vice-president of the Northwestern National bank, in an address delivered at the luncheon of the Rotary club at the Benson hotel yesterday in connection with the thrift programme.

Mr. Stewart said that banks in Portland were leaning less heavily on the federal reserve bank than those in either Seattle or San Francisco and were consequently in better shape to meet any emergency.

In order that this country may maintain its position as an exporting nation it is necessary for it to be able to give long time credit to countries in Europe and others needing it, he said. He declared the ability of this country to extend such credit depended greatly on the savings of the people and the manner in which they built up savings bank accounts.

Life insurance as a means of investing savings was the subject treated by Vernon T. Moteschenbacher. The value of owning a home was explained by J. Fred Staver.

Elimination of Intangible Property Suggested by Economist.

EUGENE, Or., Jan. 18.—(Special.)—Elimination from the tax rolls of Oregon of all intangible property, such as stocks, bonds, money and credits and substitution in place of the revenue thus lost a moderate state income tax was proposed by Dr. James H.
