

O'CALLAGHAN STATUS DETERMINED UPON

Cork Mayor to Be Allowed to Reship Foreign.

STATEMENT IS GIVEN OUT

Secretary of Labor Recognizes Power of Secretary of State Over Aliens Without Passports.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Jurisdiction of the state department in cases of aliens arriving in this country without a passport is recognized by the department of labor in a formal statement sent today by Secretary Wilson to the chief of the immigration bureau.

It was announced, however, that the decision of Secretary Wilson that Donald O'Callaghan, lord mayor of Cork, should be allowed to re-ship on a foreign vessel by reason of the ruling that he occupied the status of a seaman had not been rescinded.

The labor secretary's letter to the immigration bureau said that the decision that O'Callaghan be permitted to re-ship "should be consummated at the earliest possible moment."

It had been announced that the labor secretary had written to O'Callaghan's counsel directing that the lord mayor be surrendered "promptly" to the immigration inspector at Norfolk.

Conference Is Held.

Mr. Wilson's letter said: "At a conference held in the White House yesterday between the president, Acting Secretary of State Davis and myself, the following understanding was arrived at: "Aliens without properly viced passports, seeking admission to the United States, whether admissible under the immigration laws or not, shall be denied admission unless the secretary of state waives the passport requirements."

"Alien seamen who follow seaman'ship as an occupation will be permitted to land for purposes of re-shipment on a foreign vessel, unless the secretary of state directs that they be kept on their vessels."

O'Callaghan Allowed to Re-Ship.

"The cases of stowaways will be reported immediately to the secretary of state and they shall be held aboard their vessels or in physical custody until the secretary has rendered a decision. If the secretary does not direct that they be kept on their vessels they may be permitted to land for the purpose of re-shipment on a foreign vessel."

"The decision of the secretary of labor that O'Callaghan be permitted to re-ship foreign shall be consummated at the earliest possible moment."

The secretary of labor's order directing the surrender of O'Callaghan to the immigration inspector at Norfolk was described by labor department officials as merely the formal notification to Judge Lawless, in whose custody O'Callaghan was placed by the department. The secretary's decision last week that O'Callaghan was a "seaman," and as such should re-ship on a vessel bound for Cork, was understood, however, that in directing the prompt surrender of the lord mayor, Secretary Wilson was influenced by a conference yesterday with Acting Secretary Davis of the state department, whose order of deportation has been ignored by the labor department. This conference was held after the regular meeting of President Wilson's cabinet.

COUNSEL IS MAYOR'S ADVISER

Move of O'Callaghan Not to Be Determined by Boland.

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Harry Boland, secretary to Eamon de Valera, "president of the Irish republic," today declared that the next move of Donald O'Callaghan, lord mayor of Cork, ordered deported by Secretary Wilson, would be determined by his counsel, and in no way by Boland's office.

O'Callaghan was registered at a hotel here and called on Boland today. He intends in the way to attempt to circumvent American governmental desires while he is enjoying liberty on parole, Boland stated.

U. S. HONEYMOON FAVORED

Prince Carol Longs to Make Tour With Bride in California.

ATHENS, Jan. 19.—Crown Prince Carol of Roumania and Princess Helena, daughter of King Constantine, who are to be married soon, probably before the end of the year, would like to spend their honeymoon in California, but because of its distance from Greece probably will be compelled to restrict their tour to European countries.

This was announced by the crown prince today.

"It would be very pleasant to go to America again," said the prince, "but it is too far."

King Ferdinand and Queen Marie of Roumania may come to Athens for the wedding.

Also many pressing problems at home may prevent Queen Marie from visiting the United States this year.

The prince is living in Constantine's palace but complains it is overcrowded with tennis and motoring occupy much of his time.

FREE SEED FUND ERASED

Time-Honored Appropriation Cut From Agricultural Bill.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—The annual fund for free distribution of seed by senators and representatives was eliminated from the agricultural bill today by the house sub-committee on appropriations.

Palmer Demands Probe

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Insistence of Attorney-General Palmer that a sweeping congressional investigation be made of charges that department of justice agents in rounding up alleged communists in winter were abusive and disregarded the legal rights of accused brought assurance today from a senate judiciary sub-committee that it could hear, first hand, both the agents who supervised the raids and their critics.

The attorney-general appeared before the sub-committee which was considering the advisability of granting amnesty to persons convicted of violating the espionage act and other war-time laws. Mr. Palmer said that an amnesty proclamation would not effect an immediate and wholesale release of persons confined in prison for violations of war-time statutes, because each would have to be gone into on its merits.

Mr. Palmer discussed the charges made against his department by the national popular government league. These charges were drawn up, he declared, by attorneys "many of whom were counsel for persons arrested for deportation on charges of being alien radicals." He asked that an effort be made to ascertain the facts. "I have nothing to go on but the reports of department of justice agents, carefully selected," said Mr. Palmer. "Naturally I believe them."

OREGON PRODUCES BEETS

Land Tests Made in Lake County Declared Success.

ALTURA, Cal., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—Land tests in Modoc county, California, and Lake county, Oregon, to adaptability for sugar beet growing, conducted by the Nevada-California-Oregon railroad, and the Spreckels Sugar company, have been reported upon by the latter company and the results were declared a success.

Some 25 plots of sugar beets were grown by farmers and the product sent to the laboratories of the Spreckels Sugar company for analysis. The returns show sugar content ranging from 17 down to 10 per cent, with an average of about 15 per cent, and a purity of 84.2 per cent down, the average being about 89 per cent.

Further tests will be made to ascertain the extent to which the beets are subject to insect and plant pests.

ENGLAND ACCUSED OF SHIPPING PLOT

Irishman Tells Committee of "British Monopoly."

AMERICAN TRADE SUFFERS

Provisional Irish Republic Opens Direct Service With United States Despite Repression.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—The provisional Irish republic, through its consular service, is building up a large and successful direct shipping service between Ireland and other countries, especially with the United States, the commission of the committee of 100 investigating the Irish question was told today by J. L. Fawcett, who said he was the Irish consul-general at New York.

A fortnightly service between New York and Cork he said is in operation and another service will open soon between Boston and Ireland.

England, he said, was making every effort to prevent direct shipping with Ireland.

"On account of her large debt to the United States, Great Britain probably will not take extreme measures to embarrass American foreign shipping," he added, although it has subjected every ship to search and other indignities.

Maritime Warfare Is Waged.

No passenger vessels are allowed to land in Ireland direct from America, he declared, adding that this was "England's effort to stifle American passenger service that would compete with the British monopoly."

Warfare has been waged against Irish shipping by English seaport towns, he declared.

Data and figures intended to show the result of British economic repression in Ireland were presented by Fawcett, who summed up the Irish question as a clash between two forms of civilization—the centralized, capital controlled—government represented by Great Britain, and a co-operative community system represented by the Irish republic.

"The black and tans," by destruction of creameries, dairies, banks and other industries operated by the co-operative effort and capital of the Irish farmers are fighting the battles of the "British trust," he declared.

Millions Lost by Policy.

"This destruction has amounted to an actual loss of \$5,000,000, but by crippling a flourishing and growing system, it has caused losses amounting probably to hundreds of millions."

The British parliament, he said, had taken cognizance of the danger to "English trade" from the Irish co-operative system and had withheld the Irish development grants.

Figures from British sources were said by Fawcett to show that Ireland paid \$37,000,000 in taxes to Great Britain and received only \$22,000,000 in expenses in return.

"The Irish republican government," he added, "could administer the affairs of Ireland with the present taxes and remit from \$20,000,000 to \$30,000,000."

Mallow Incident Described.

Frank Dempsey, mayor of Mallow, described the partial destruction of Mallow following the attack by the Sinn Fein on the British barracks September 27. He asserted that soon after he had received an invitation to come to America to testify, his home was raided and his correspondence taken.

PORTLAND BOY HONORED

Frederick S. Whiteside Elected to Board of Harvard Crimino.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—Frederick S. Whiteside of 245 Douglas Place, Portland, a member of the junior class at Harvard college, has been elected, photographic chairman of the Harvard Crimino. Whiteside was first elected to the board in 1918 and since then his work has been of the best.

The Harvard Crimino is a daily paper published by and for the undergraduates of the university. It is largely a publication of the annual competition which are held among the strictest in the college and it is a considerable honor to be chosen a member of the board of editors.

PORTLAND MAN IS FREED

Charge of Holdup Against George Willis Is Dismissed.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—George Willis of Portland, a former jockey, who was held here on suspicion of being one of two men who robbed a druggist and a restaurant in this city, was today dismissed.

Four witnesses of the London girl hold-up failed to identify either Willis or his friend Earl Moser. The latter, who says he is a baker of Seattle and Bellingham, is held for deportation by the immigration authorities on the grounds of being an undesirable.

LABOR FOR SUNDAY LAW

Executive Council of Federation Approves Sabbath Rest.

BRUSSELS, Jan. 19.—The executive council of the federation of labor has approved a law prohibiting virtually all business activities between 8 A. M. Sunday and the same hour Monday. This measure also forbids the sale of newspapers and periodicals between 3 P. M. Sunday and the same hour Monday, except on elections.

roads on the map and the commission alone should do this, according to the general message of the governor delivered when the legislature assembled, and in this thought the highway commission concurs. Mr. Booth said that there are some roads on the map now which are not as important as some others which were not put on the map when it was made in 1917.

Discretion should be given to the commission with regard to locations, argued Mr. Booth. For instance, the law provides that The Dallas-California highway shall go by way of Shaniko. Mr. Booth stated that the highway engineers have studied various routes and this requirement to go to Shaniko will necessitate 20 miles of extra road. Even under most favorable circumstances, continued the commissioner, the building of the northern end of the highway will cost a very great sum of money.

Senator Hall, who presided at the joint committee meeting and who is

trying to get the Roosevelt highway under way, was informed by Mr. Booth that he thought it a wrong principle to apply a certain sum for any one road.

Hall Tells What He Heard.

Senator Hall announced that he had heard of rumors that there is a plan to double the market road mileage and give the state highway commission \$5,000,000 with which to cooperate with the counties.

All the money now in sight will be needed to complete present roads. If other roads are to be improved, new sources of revenue will be necessary. To complete the two main highways the Columbia and the Pacific, \$5,500,000 will be required. However, construction on these main trunk lines is costly and a million dollars does not go very far. On the other hand, when laterals are built a million dollars will go a long way.

In conclusion, the joint committee requested the commission to submit a list of its suggestions so that the committee act intelligently, and it was also the desire of the committee that the commissioners meet with the committee from time to time. Assurances that they would always be on call of the committee were given by Commissioners Booth, Yeon and Barrett.

BUSINESS TAX SUSTAINED

CONSTITUTIONALITY UPHOLD BY CALIFORNIA COURT.

Writ of Habeas Corpus Denied in Two Parallel Cases—One of a Lawyer, Other a Grocer.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—(Special.)—The supreme court of California today upheld the constitutionality of the business license ordinance of the city of Los Angeles, thus establishing the constitutionality of these measures in all cities.

The court took action in denying a writ of habeas corpus in two parallel cases brought by Elton C. Galusha, an attorney, and Frank Nowak, a grocer, who protested against paying the municipal tax upon their respective vocations, and against their jail sentences for violation of the ordinance.

Galusha contended that attorneys were officers of the state and therefore taxing them was a state matter and not one that came under the jurisdiction of the municipality, but the court denied the appeal on the ground that attorneys are engaged in a private profession for pecuniary profit and as such can be rightfully taxed by the municipality in which they pursue their profession.

In the Nowak appeal he declared that the Los Angeles charter of 1913 had provided for the appeal, but the court decided that the charter expressly authorizes this sort of a tax.

NET PROFIT \$5,319,975

ARMOUR & CO. DECLARE 2.4 PER CENT DIVIDEND.

Corporation President Says Cash Was All Drawn From Reserves Accumulated Abroad.

CHICAGO, Jan. 19.—Only by drawing on reserves accumulated by their foreign connections were Armour & Co. enabled to show a net profit as a result of their 1920 operations, according to the annual report of J. Ogden Armour, president, which he presented today to the stockholders.

The statement disclosed that, while the company's total sales approximated \$200,000,000 for the year, that portion of it which represented sales in and exports from this country resulted in losses aggregating many millions of dollars. In view of these losses, Armour & Co. found it necessary to draw upon the reserves of their foreign connections to show a net profit of \$5,319,975.44, which represented 2.4 per cent on the average net capital investment of \$221,000,000.

Regarding the prospects for 1921, Mr. Armour said: "There is abundant reason to look forward to a better year. The coming months should show a brisk business and satisfactory profits."

Mr. Armour was re-elected president of the company while Lester Armour, a nephew, was elected a member of the board of directors. All other officers were re-elected.

SCHOOL DANCE SHOCKING

Tacoma, Wash., Principal Says Frocks Are Daring.

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—Shocking conditions existing in Tacoma high school dances were pointed out after W. F. Geiger, superintendent of schools, had made an investigation.

Cheek to cheek dancing, party frocks for young girls which are daring and of general looseness of supervision were censured. School directors first took cognizance of conditions when a report was made by a man and his wife who acted as chaperones at one of these affairs. They said that the general moral atmosphere was bad and the looseness of supervision was startling.

Another Gangster Found Guilty.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—Allen McDonald, criminal gangster, was found guilty by a jury today in the second of two trials for attacking Miss Jessie Montgomery of Reno. The jury deliberated 50 minutes.

CORK FIRE WORK OF BRITONS, SAY IRISH

Crown Forces Accused of Arson and Looting.

BULKY REPORT IS FILED

Labor Party and Trades Union Congress Submits Results of Inquiry Since Disaster.

LONDON, Jan. 19.—What is alleged to be the sworn testimony of some 70 eyewitnesses describing the burning of public buildings and stores in Cork, December 11-12, as unprovoked and unjustifiable and the condition of Ireland under British military rule as one of "lawless terrorism" was issued today by the Irish labor party and trades union congress.

The document is in the form of a report, printed and published in Dublin, it was circulated in London by the British labor party without any actual endorsement.

The report, which is described by its authors as the result of an impartial inquiry, contradicts statements by Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, in the house of commons that the British labor party without any actual endorsement.

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Recalling Sir Hamar Greenwood's assertion on December 13 that "it is obviously to the interest of the government to find the perpetrators of this outrage," the report declares, "then this investigation is to the interest of the government for it certainly found the perpetrators."

Contradicting Sir Hamar Greenwood's statement that the fire started in the Patrick street stores and spread to the other buildings, among them the city hall, a considerable distance away on the opposite side of the River Lee, the report says: "It is a pity the chief secretary does not know a little more about the topography of the country. He could then make a map."

Cork Map Held "Faked."

A map of Cork is attached with a reproduction of one published in a London paper, which, the report charges, was "faked" to substantiate the official report on the burning of the city.

Disputing the suggestion that the burning partook of the nature of a reprisal for the ambushing of a party of British troops in return, it is declared that long before the attack it was known there was going to be trouble, shooting and quarrels having been going on throughout the evening.

"There is evidence that 300 gallons of petrol was taken out of Victoria barracks that night," the report asserts.

A summary of the testimony following the burning of the city, the report says, was that the burning and arson and other out-laws were carried out by the Cork crown forces. The report emphasizes that "it was while the military had complete charge of the streets and while no civilians might be abroad without a permit that the city was burned and looted." This it adds is "enough to decide the authorship of the fire."

Crown Charges Rejected.

The report continues: "So far from firing on or arresting looters and incendiaries, the officers and soldiers on duty in the city were encouraged the work of plunder and destruction."

Commenting on the manner in which the official report was prepared in an endeavor to show that the crown forces found the buildings burning and tried to save them, it says: "It is hard enough on Irishmen to have their city burned; it is still worse to be told they did it themselves. A government stooping to such methods is not only a bully but a sneak."

The report refers scathingly to the government's refusal of a judicial inquiry and to its entrusting the investigation to "those publicly accused of being the perpetrators."

IRISH SHOOTING CONTINUES

Arrests and Ambushes Reported Officially and Unofficially.

DUBLIN, Jan. 19.—Shooting from ambushes and arrests continue, according to official and unofficial advice.

Dublin Castle has reported that auxiliary police at Longford were attacked and that two men were wounded by a party of men Tuesday evening. Nine young men, believed to be members of the Irish republican army, were arrested at Ballyhanna. A soldier was wounded while riding along the Charleville road today.

Auxiliary parading Dublin Tuesday were attacked by civilians, three of whom were captured. One detective was wounded. During the ambush of police at Kilree Tuesday, three members of the attacking party were wounded. Thomas Collins, a member of the Sinn Fein parliament from North Wexford, Ireland, was arrested today at Castle Reagh.

AUSTRALIA BARS EMISSARY

Alleged Sinn Fein Agent Denied Permission to Land.

LONDON, Jan. 19.—The government at Melbourne has directed that Osmond Grattan Esmond, who is regarded by it as a Sinn Fein emissary, be not allowed to land from the steamer Makura, which is tied up in Sydney harbor by a strike, says a dispatch to the London Times from Melbourne. It is said that Esmond has had eight days in which to decide whether to accept the offer of allegiance and that, as he has not made up his mind, the government considers that he would not be a desirable citizen in Australia.

Esmond is a son of Sir Thomas Henry Grattan Esmond, former member of the British parliament from North Wexford, Ireland.

German Astronomer Dies.

BERLIN, Jan. 19.—The death of Dr. Wilhelm Foerster, professor of astronomy in Berlin university, was announced by the Tageblatt today.
