EXTRA SHOW TO BE GIVEN

ORPHEUM BILL WILL REPEAT NEXT WEDNESDAY NIGHT.

ALLEGED BURGLAR HELD

Ed Jagelski, Said to Have Robbed Two Offices, Waives Hearing.

Ed Jagelski, 18, caught about 2:30 A. M. yesterday, while robbing the Dahl & Penne cafe at Second and Alder streets, waived examination on charge of burglary before Judge Rossmore yesterday. Jagelski was bound over to the grand jury. Jagelski was said to have obtained \$33.30 in cash from the Dahl & Penne cash register, and a piece of gold and some chains of small value from the Montana assay office which he was said to have robbed earlier in the night. The police surrounded the building when passersby reported seeing Jagelski in the Dahl & Penne establishment. He fled from the room through a transom opening on the roof, but was fired upon by Patrolman Fleming, who was posted there. Jagelski hid himself in the building, but was discovered. Jagelski has been implicated in the robbery of two poolrooms and a candy store within the last two weeks, according to Lieutenant Goltz. He is also alleged to have stolen some cigars and cigarettes from a delivery wagon in Albina about a month ago.

POLICE TO WATCH BANKS

Chief Jenkins Orders Men to Take Precautions Against Robbers.

Fear that bank robberies may be impending in the city was indicated in a general order issued yesterday by Chief of Police Jenkins that every bank should be kept under close watch and that toward making of possible attempts at bank holdups. Special care was directed toward watching banking institutions in the outlying districts.

Information in the hands of the police bureau indicated that such attempts were contemplated, the order stated.

COUNCIL IS OPPOSED OVER GORDON BILL

Three Members Strongly Opposed to Measure.

MAYOR ADVISES DELAY

Commissioner Mann Is Silent During Debate on Plan for Tax Supervisory Body.

Another enrollment was stirred up in the city council chambers late yesterday, when the Gordon bill, authorizing the establishment of a state supervisory tax commission, was brought up for discussion among the city commissioners.

Three of the city councilmen, Barbur, Bigelow and Pier, strongly urged that the council should go on record as opposing the measure, but Mayor Baker persuaded the commissioners to take no official action.

The proposed measure, which was introduced into the state legislature by Representative Herbert Gordon of Multnomah county, would establish a tax commission composed of three members, which would have supervisory power over tax levying bodies.

Gordon Bill Is Attacked. The councilmanic discussion in the afternoon, followed a conference held at the court house in the morning, attended by representatives from all the tax-levying bodies in Multnomah county, at which the Gordon bill was attacked in no uncertain terms.

“I don't agree with you one bit,” he said. “We did give the matter considerable thought, but the words were used to the effect that this was one of the most vicious measures ever attempted to be put over on the state. I, for one, will not support the measure in my capacity as a private citizen and a taxpayer. If we do not send an official representative.”

PAVING PLANT EFFICIENT

SAVING TO PROPERTY OWNERS IS \$68,420 LAST YEAR.

Repair Work on Hard Surface Pavements Done at Same Cost as in 1913.

In the construction of street work during the last year, the municipal paving plant has saved the property owners of Portland \$68,420, an amount approximately two-thirds of the total net appropriations from the city for the construction, equipment and operation of the plant according to the annual report of R. S. Doolin, the plant superintendent, submitted yesterday to A. L. Barbur, commissioner of public works.

NEW GAS TANK PLANNED

Improvements Contemplated for Year Total \$1,141,230.

The Portland Gas & Coke company plans to make improvements, including a new storage tank and main. The assets of the paving plant division were given as \$118,266, with liabilities as \$10,141. Appropriations received from the general fund, however, totaled \$94,417 and funds reserved for the maintenance of streets and new improvements amounted to \$7613, leaving a surplus of \$7088. Total returns to the gas fund on the cost-plus basis amounted to \$11,824.95.

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Walter Evans, district attorney, Frank S. Grant, city attorney, and W. P. LaRoche representing the dock commission, were appointed as a special committee to oppose the bill.

Other bills now before the state legislature, which were brought to the attention of the city councilmen by City Attorney Grant, were referred to various committees for investigation and recommendation.

These included house bill No. 2, which would require that all real property be assessed by the city, acquired through condemnation proceedings; senate bill No. 24, which would transfer the powers of regulating jitney buses, for-hire cars, motor stages, etc., from the city council to the state public service commission; senate bill No. 2, dealing with the use of sand and gravel from riverbeds, in construction work; and senate bill No. 5, dealing with contracts entered into between a municipality and a private corporation.

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“Shameful Neglect” of Our Disabled Dough-Boys

NOT niggardliness but mismanagement is behind the fact that thousands of our disabled soldiers of the Great War “are still waiting, exploited, neglected, forgotten, for the draft of honor to be redeemed.” The Public Health Service, according to Harold A. Littleale of the New York Evening Post, is months behind in dealing with urgent appeals from disabled soldiers needing treatment, as is also the Bureau of War Risk Insurance in payments. The Pittsburg Chronicle-Telegraph quotes Col. Frederick W. Galbraith, Jr., National Commander of the American Legion, as saying that “10,000 disabled veterans are quartered in cellars, poorhouses and insane asylums.”
