LONG-BELL MILL ASSURED

HUGE LUMBER PLANT TO RISE ON COLUMBIA RIVER.

Development Expected to Include Building of Modern Town and Shipping Terminals.

Assurances that a huge mill and lumber manufacturing plant will be erected on the Columbia river by the Long-Bell Lumber company of Kansas City, Mo., are contained in an official announcement received yesterday from Kansas City to the effect that the company had completed the purchase of 2500 acres of land on the Columbia river, just west of the Cowitz river, as a site for the proposed mill, which will have a capacity of 1,000,000 feet and will be electrically driven.

The site was chosen owing to its accessibility to timber owned by the company, and also for the fact that it has three miles of deep water frontage on the Columbia river where ships can load for export and coastwise trade. The erection of the mill, according to the plans which have been made, will require the construction of a bridge over the Cowitz river and probably the building of a new town.

The site chosen for the mill is adjacent to the town of Kelso, Wash. The purchase included the Wallace ranch, about 1200 acres, the Frank G. Barnes ranch of 700 acres, and 650 acres belonging to the O. Olson estate.

The company has had options on the properties since a trip of inspection made by R. A. Long, president, and other officials of the concern last spring. At that time the possibility of the site was noted by the officials and engineers immediately were ordered to make a further investigation and report.

Early in 1920 the Kansas City company purchased 40,000 acres of choice timber in Cowitz and Lewis counties, not far from the town of Chaney, Rock, from the Weyerhaeuser company, the price being more than \$4,000,000.

The plans of the Missouri valley concern for locating here are declared to be but a phase of the movement of the timber industry of this section, caused by the exhaustion of the timber supply of the east and south.

MILL SITE TO BE DEVELOPED

Much Preliminary Work Needed to Develop Acreage.

KELOSO, Wash., Jan. 26.—(Special).—R. A. Booth of Eugene, Or., who represented the Long-Bell Lumber company of Kansas City, Mo., in the purchase of timberland northwest of Kelso, and who has been representing that company in its negotiations for land adjacent to Kelso, at the confluence of the Columbia and Cowitz rivers, was a Kelso visitor, conferring with McKenney & Pisk, local attorneys for the Long-Bell company. Mr. Booth had no statement to make in regard to the consummation of the deals.

With the closing of the deals for the mill site, Kelso people are becoming interested in the probable date of operations by the Kansas City concern. Much preliminary work must be done, as a large part of the acreage is in brush, having been reclaimed from overflow only last year.

Kelso plans to provide adequate transportation facilities to the mill site by the construction of a paved road from the Kelso district, a distance of two and one-half miles.

Three to Run for Mayor.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Jan. 26.—(Special).—The filing for mayor of Carl Gylling Tuesday, brightened the prospects for an interesting three-cornered race for that office. H. E. Bailey and S. K. Bowes are the other candidates who have filed. Gylling is a local contractor. All three of the candidates are well known business men. R. L. Tuffree, electrician, of North Aberdeen, has filed for councilman from the second ward. A. S. Brecht will be one opponent, and William Irvine, now in Washington, D. C., is expected also to file. Irvine now resides in the city, being absent on leave.

HUNGRY BURGLAR SOUGHT

POLICE LOOK FOR INTRUDER WHO STEALS FOOD.

Thief Reported to Scorn Jewelry While Making Off With Things to Eat.

Now comes the "hungry burglar" to glide his skiff atop the tidal wave of crime which is sweeping over the city. He scorns jewelry, silverware, clothing and other articles which can be converted into cash at a convenient pawnshop, but devotes his talents to the theft of things to eat.

M. B. Shipp, 5811 Forty-seventh avenue, Southeast, reported to the police detective bureau yesterday that the "hungry burglar" had made deep inroads on the family larder by the theft of two sacks of potatoes and two dozen jars of home-canned fruit. The burglar with an appetite forced an entry into the basement of the family was dreaming of pancakes and syrup. He left no clues behind.

C. G. Bowers, 372½ Hawthorne avenue, is another who has been through the operations of the "hungry burglar." A considerable quantity of foodstuffs was stolen from his home recently, while nothing else of value was taken.

A second visit was made to the Bowers home Tuesday night, when the hungry individual not only procured more food, but made away with \$25 in currency.

Police detectives are now turning their attention toward the "hungry burglar" with the expectation of reporting a capture within a short time. The last visit to the Bowers home furnished clues which the police believe will result in definite action before the close of the week.

SCHOOL BILLS OPPOSED

Civic Club Protests Against Measures in State Senate.

Resolutions protesting against the passage of House senate bills 8, and 12, which provide for the regulation of schools and the garb of teachers, have been adopted by the Southeast Portland Civic club.

The three bills are declared to be a cause for dissent and prejudice, and the resolutions express the belief that their passage would retard educational development. The club took action to forward copies of the resolutions to members of the legislature.

The three bills provide for standardizing the various schools of the state by the United States bureau of education, provide against the entering by a teacher of any garb which would show her to be an adherent of religious denomination, and provide for the regulation of parochial schools.
