PENITENTIARY CHAPLAIN WANTED—Employment of a full-time chaplain or chaplains, who should be experienced social workers, for the state penitentiary was recommended by the board of directors of the Social Workers' Association of Oregon at their luncheon held in Portland Wednesday. The belief was expressed that the social welfare of prisoners might thereby be more adequately conserved. The body also went on record as opposed to the consolidation of religious and educational functions in any state institution.

GORDON BILL TO BE DEBATED—A lively debate on the Gordon bill providing for a commission to pass upon city and county budgets will be staged at the Portland hotel today with F. W. Mulkey supporting the bill and County Commissioner Holman opposing it. Other bills to be before the legislature will also come up for discussion. W. S. Shively will discuss a legal subject of interest to real estate men.

CHURCH FUNDS CANVASED—A survey of available funds with a view to a report to the board of directors was made by the executive committee of the community chest at a meeting held at the United States National bank building yesterday. The executive committee is making a thorough canvass of the situation. The report, however, which is being prepared will not be made public until it is given into the hands of the directors for action. It was announced.

BIRD LECTURE TO BE GIVEN—"The Birds of Prey and Their Allies" will be the subject of an illustrated talk on birds by W. A. Elliott before the Oregon Audubon society next Saturday night in library hall. The hawk, owl and eagle comprise a world-wide family of great interest and economic value, and many fine pictures will be shown of this group. The public is invited.

Approximately one-half is in real estate. Heirs are Beale P. Gardener, widow; Allen W. and Fred A. Gardener, sons; Mrs. E. M. Sargent, Beale's daughter; and Martha Gardener, daughter. The widow is to receive \$2000 a year under the terms of the will, as long as she remains unmarried, this to come from the net income of the estate, which is to be held in trust until the youngest child reaches the age of 21 years, at which time it is to be apportioned equally.

CONVENTION IN EAST OF IMPORTANCE TO BUSINESS MEN.

United States Chamber to Convene April 26-29 and Trade Council May 4-6 Inclusive.

Two national conventions of importance to business men of the country are scheduled for the next 30 days, the first being that of the United States chamber of commerce, Atlantic City, April 26-29, and other the National Foreign Trade council, Cleveland, May 4-6 inclusive.

The Portland Chamber of Commerce officials urge the business men who contemplate making eastern trips this spring endeavor to make arrangements to join the delegations that will attend both of these conventions.

Portland sent a trainload of delegates to the last session of the National Foreign Trade council, held in San Francisco, and the exhibit displayed there by the chamber's publicity department attracted attention from delegations all over the world.

"The Atlantic City and Cleveland conventions will be attended by the leading business men of America," said Frank Ira White, manager of the foreign trade department of the Portland chamber. "Both of these conventions will afford an exceptional opportunity to impress upon the leaders of industry Portland's industrial advantages and we are hoping that all of the city's business men who are to go east this spring will try to arrange to attend."

At the members' forum of the chamber February 7 there will be discussions as to how these conventions may best be utilized to Portland's advantage. Speakers will set forth the various features connected with each meeting. Nathan Strauss is a director of the United States chamber of commerce. H. B. Van Duzer, O. M. Clark and A. C. Callan are vice-presidents of the National Foreign Trade council and M. H. Houser is a member.

MRS. LOWNSDALE DIES—Illness of Several Months Is Fatal to Portland Woman.

Mrs. Harriett Lowndale, wife of C. D. Lowndale, of this city, died at her home, 49 North Twelfth street, yesterday morning, after an illness of several months. She was the eldest daughter of the late T. J. Johnston, a well-known business man of Portland, and was born and educated in this city.

The funeral will be held from Holman's chapel at 10 A. M. tomorrow and interment will be at Riverview cemetery.

Government Sues Oregon Lumber Company for \$53,000.

Suit was instituted yesterday by the government, in a federal court, against the Oregon Lumber company, a Utah corporation, for the recovery of \$53,000, alleged to have been the value of timber cut from a tract in the La Grande district procured by fraudulent entry.

The company was charged with cutting 3,350,000 feet of timber from and filed upon in 1939 by John Olson, who, the government contends, was a fraudulent entrant. Olson was alleged to have proved up in 1900 and the land was transferred to the Oregon Lumber company, through its president, David Eccles, of Salt Lake City. Action to cancel the entry was taken by the government in 1914. The present suit is entirely a civil action to recover.
