

IDAHO BILL AIMS AT TUBERCULOSIS FUND

Sand Point and Payette Projects Would Be Hit.

\$180,000 NOW LAID ASIDE

All Obligations Would Be Paid Up and Balance of Appropriation Revert to General Fund.

BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 28.—(Special.)—Most important of the bills introduced in the lower house today was house bill No. 117, by the state affairs committee, which repeals the action taken by the legislature of 1919 appropriating \$180,000 for the erection of two state tuberculosis hospitals. The measure provides for meeting all obligations incurred to date by the tuberculosis commission, including the purchase of sites for the proposed hospitals at Sand Point and Payette, and plans for the hospitals prepared by architects, but requires that all moneys remaining in the fund shall revert to the general fund of the state.

House bill No. 115, by Peck, provides the manner in which the referendum amendment to the state constitution shall be put into effect, how legislative enactments shall be put upon the general election ballot and become law on popular vote.

Education Bill Passed. One of the measures passed was the education committee's house bill No. 69, authorizing trustees of independent school districts to use 2 per cent of the district income for Americanization education of adults and for industrial rehabilitation work. Nine negative votes were cast on the measure. The other was a senate measure for recording public land lists in county auditor's office.

One of the bills amended was house bill No. 33, relating to fruit-trees spraying. House bill No. 31, by the state affairs committee, was reported out of committee without amendment, after a debate on a change proposed by the judiciary committee which would increase salaries of court reporters. As introduced by the state affairs committee, the bill revokes a statutory provision permitting court reporters to pay assistants for transcribing court records.

Anti-Allen Land Action Up. Idaho's first anti-alien land law will be enacted if the bill introduced by Van de Steeg of Canyon county is passed. Its introduction has been expected daily since the author submitted his concurrent resolution calling upon congress to limit Japanese immigration and the rights of Japanese to American citizenship. Differing in language from that resolution, the anti-alien land bill, which becomes house bill No. 114, does not specifically mention the Japanese race, but it makes stringent provisions under which aliens may acquire and dispose of real estate in the state of Idaho.

Briefly, the message, which consists of seven typewritten pages, extends the right of holding, inheriting or disposing of land to aliens eligible to citizenship under treaties now existing between the United States and foreign countries and recognizes any agricultural leases held by them, but limits the life of any such lease now in force or hereafter made to December 31, 1925.

Tax Relief Causes Debate. The witty tax relief measure, senate bill No. 1, caused another fiery debate in the senate, with Senators Armstrong of Blaine county, Boughton of Kootenai and Paddock of

Washington county the chief orators. House bill No. 4, by Carpenter, aimed to prohibit the Indian stick gambling game, came up for third reading and was passed after a considerable debate by a vote of 32 to 10. Senator Johnson, who had played the game; Senator Seth Jones, who had seen it, and Senator Holberg, who had heard of it, all urged that the measure be passed, while Senators Witty and others contended that the present law against gambling covered it and it was not necessary to encumber the books further. He contended the Indian was smart enough that if stick gambling was prevented to use something else besides a stick for the same game.

Farm-Name Bill Passed. The senate passed the farm-name registration bill providing for the registration of farm names with the department of agriculture; also senate bill No. 29, amending the law for auctioneering and leasing of state lands. The house bill by the state affairs committee providing that the bond of county treasurers be at least 25 per cent greater than the moneys likely to be handled was passed by a vote of 25 to 18.

Two bills were received, one of which was by Disney, providing that the tax penalty for delinquent taxes be greatly reduced. Both houses adjourned at noon out of respect to the

memory of the late C. A. Elmer, state commissioner of public investments, who died today.

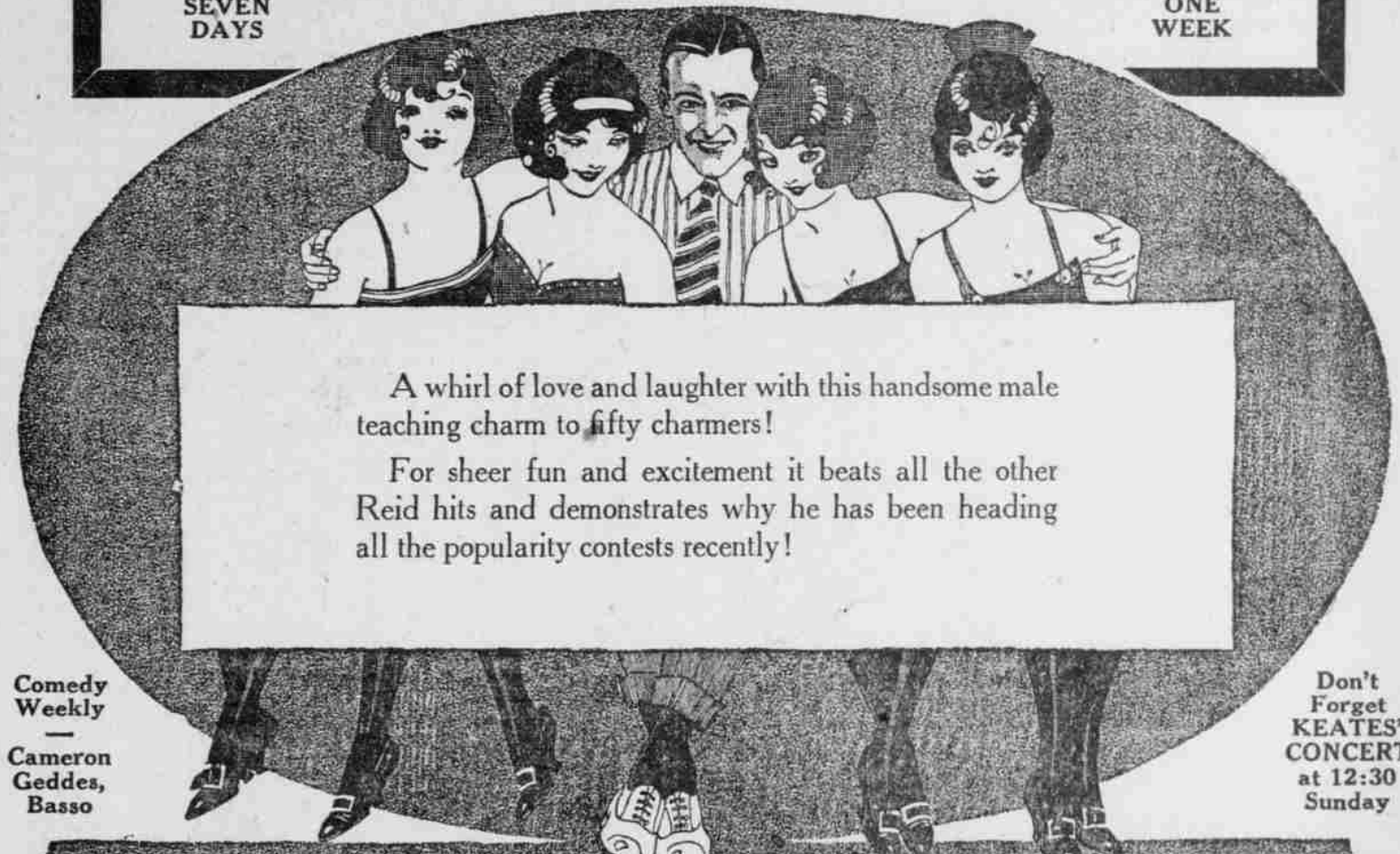
