SEWER PLANS TO BE FILED—Plans for the Balth truck sewer, which will drain a large area including Westover terrace, Willamette heights, and the North Portland industrial section, will be filed by the city engineer at the next council meeting. The sewer, which will be one of the most important in the city, will cost \$170,000, according to estimates. It will provide suitable sanitation facilities for the Montgomery Ward & Co.'s building, one of the largest in Portland, and the Can Company and many other large industries in the northern part of the city.

BOOTLEGERS ARE SENTENCED—Richard Deitch, recently installed judge of the district court, proved "bad medicine" for bootleggers yesterday when he passed out two county jail sentences and three fines to three men arrested in a raid early this week by Deputy Sheriff Christofferson and Schirmer. Harry Travis, 35, was sentenced to 180 days and fined \$200; Fred Cameron to 150 days and fined \$200, and W. H. Katers was fined \$50. The men, who were taken into custody in a raid on a still in a dwelling at Steel and Greenwood streets, pleaded not guilty, but admitted the facts testified to by the deputy sheriffs.

GUANO HILL OR LIQUOR CHANGE—Guido Celai, proprietor of the Basket Grocery and Delicatessen company on Alder street, between Second and Third streets, visited yesterday on a warrant sworn to by John Mowry, special agent in the office of District Attorney Evans, on a charge of selling intoxicating liquors. Mowry confiscated several cases of pseudo-medical concoctions under the name of "Wine of Pepsin," "Horse Wine," etc., all capable of being used as beverages, and containing alcohol from 25 to 49 per cent by volume, in a raid three days ago.

ALBANY REUNION HELD—Plans were perfected for an active social year at the annual reunion of former students of Albany, Or., at the central library Thursday night. A musical programme was given under the direction of Mrs. L. A. Kent, and speeches recalled old-time activities at Albany. The annual election resulted as follows: Fred P. Nutting, president; Mrs. L. A. Kent, vice-president; Miss Olive Baltimore, secretary, and Miss Lillian M. Hackleman, treasurer.

NUNO GETS THREE MONTHS—Louis Ervin, colored habitue of the north end district, pleaded guilty yesterday before Federal Judge Bean to a charge of having violated the Harrison narcotics act, and was sentenced to three months in jail. Ervin at first stoutly denied his guilt, but evidence that he had conducted considerable traffic in cocaine and morphine induced him to change his plea and accept punishment.

NATURALIZATION SCHOOL TO OPEN—The Oregon naturalization school will open February 1 in room 612 Worcester building. Its purpose will be the teaching of English to adults and special preparation for citizenship papers. The school will be directed by Miss Josephine Sneed. Mornings, afternoon and night classes will be held, with courses in reading, writing and speaking English.

BILL MALOFF IS SOUGHT—Efforts to learn the whereabouts of his brother Bill Maloff are being made by Base Maloff, of 521 1/2 Sixth avenue south, Seattle, Wash., according to a communication received here. The missing man had been working in the vicinity of Aberdeen, Wash., and it is thought likely that he came to Portland. He has not been heard from since July 8, 1918.

CHINA RELIEF FUNDS RECEIVED—The Oregonian yesterday received three additional contributions to the China famine fund, for a total of \$120. They were from E. L. Smith, \$5; McNamara, \$2; and J. M. Brown family, Banks, Or. \$5. All funds received for famine relief are being turned over to A. L. Mills, president of the First National bank, for transmittal to the New York headquarters.

SCHOOLS TO OBSERVE FEBRUARY 11—Because the anniversary of Lincoln's birthday will fall this year upon a Saturday the Lincoln Memorial society of Oregon will observe February 11 instead of February 12 by furnishing speakers at the various major schools of the city. It was announced yesterday. Addresses at the schools will be made early Friday afternoon, while several societies of young people have signified their intention of honoring the name of the martyr on the Sunday following his birthday. Ministers of the city have stated that their Sunday sermons will deal with the life and character of the great emancipator. The committee appointed by the Lincoln Memorial society to arrange speaking schedules is composed of L. D. Mahone, A. L. Barbur and C. J. Schnable.

RAIL, CUMPS MEET—Presidents and other officials representing transcontinental railroad lines entering Portland continued their executive session on the local terminal problems throughout the day yesterday and upon adjournment last night it was announced that still other meetings will be necessary to arrive at an adjustment of various features connected with the situation. The executive are endeavoring to work out a solution of the problem as the Great Northern and the Spokane, Portland & Seattle lines may receive permanent use of the Portland union terminal station and trackways. Property rights and equities entering into the question, as well as physical phases, are being discussed.

POLICE MATRON DISMISSED—Suspension for 30 days of Mrs. J. S. Sampson, police matron on the day relief, was ordered yesterday by Mayor Baker following charges of alleged cruelty. Charges were brought by Miss Mary Jory Patterson, drug addict, now in the city jail undergoing treatment to cure the habit. According to the complaint Mrs. Sampson allowed the girl to fall to the floor several times and refused to call a doctor when the patient desired treatment. The order, signed by Mayor Baker yesterday, is effective today. Mrs. Sampson has recourse to the civil service board.

"FORBIDDEN FRUIT" TO BE SHOWN—Vaudeville and the national premier public viewing of Cecil DeMille's latest production, "Forbidden Fruit," were yesterday added to the programme of the society midnight matinee to be given at the Liberty theater tonight at 11 o'clock as a benefit for the Hoover-Europe relief fund. The matinee is under the sponsorship of the motion-picture league of Oregon and under the general chairmanship of Mrs. William MacMaster and Paul E. Noble.

DUNWY WAR LOANS \$11,504.63—Liberty bonds to the total value of \$10,336.79 and war savings stamps worth \$11,504.63 were found in the \$78,278.85 estate of the late Ralph R. Dunwuy, according to the inventory in the probate division of the circuit court yesterday by P. H. Deshon, John L. Karnopp and Frank Watkins, appraisers. The estate was composed chiefly of realty and stock in Oregon, personal property including \$2021 cash in bank.

EASTERN ROADS HOLD OFF—Railroads operating out of Chicago have definitely declined to join in freight rate differentials favorable to the Pacific coast territory, according to reports from the Chicago office of the Portland Traffic and Transportation association. Efforts to get this concession on export and other business have been in progress since the lines were restored to private ownership.

POLICE FORBIDDEN REWARDS—Rewards or remuneration given to policemen for work of any kind must hereafter be turned in at police headquarters within 24 hours after they are received, according to an order issued yesterday by Chief of Police Jenkins. If the police officer feels that he is entitled to retain the reward he may submit a petition to the city council. Penalty for violation of the order is dismissal from the force.

EAST MADISON TO BE EXPOSED—Plans were filed at a special council meeting yesterday afternoon, for the first time, to expose the East Madison street to Union avenue. This will give Madison street a hard surface from the waterfront to East Fourth street and will allow much traffic to be diverted from Hawthorne avenue, the bridge street, thus relieving congested conditions on that and Clay streets.

JOHN WOODS FOUND GUILTY—John Woods, accused of contributing to the delinquency of a 16-year-old girl, was found guilty after a trial before Judge Kanter of the court of domestic relations yesterday. He was sentenced to three months in the county jail and fined \$100. He was represented by his attorney, Deputy District Attorney Hamner, who conducted the prosecution.

DAMAGES SOUGHT FOR INJURIES—Because he was injured on coming in contact with a high-power electric cable, while working in the car shop of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, at Oregon City, Emil Zahradnik is suing for \$250 in a suit filed in the circuit court yesterday.

RAIL PAY HERE \$6,541,948—Figures compiled by the O. W. R. & N. Co. and made public last night, reveal that that railroad employed a total of 2756 persons in this city during 1920. Total salaries and wages paid to these employees was \$6,541,948.

SOFT-DRINK APPEAL SET

SECOND CASE AGAINST CITY COUNCIL TO BE HEARD.

Action Takes Form of Injunction Proceedings to Prevent Closing of Alleged Bootleg Joint.

The second soft-drink appeal to the circuit court from the action of the city council in revoking its license will be heard by Presiding Judge Kavanaugh next Thursday morning. The establishment is at Second and Madison streets, and is run by Frank and Tony Borelli and Joe Felice. The license of the place was revoked by the city council after two men, arrested in the establishment, were convicted of intoxication by Municipal Judge Rossmann, and one of the proprietors, Frank Borelli, was continued for sentence.

The appeal from the council's decision is taken in the form of an injunction and complaint against Mayor Baker and the four commissioners, and alleges that they "fraudulently, falsely and arbitrarily" caused the revocation of the license. Under a temporary restraining order, the establishment is now running, despite the order of the council.

Motion for an immediate hearing of the case was granted to Assistant City Attorney Mackay yesterday by Judge Kavanaugh. With ordinary court procedure it might have been September before the case would come up for hearing on the regular docket. The soft-drink establishment would have been allowed to operate until that time under its restraining order.

The first of the soft-drink appeal cases, that of Joe Tolich against the council, recently was dismissed by Judge Kavanaugh on a demurrer by the city. A voluntary non-suit was entered by the establishment. Another case yet to be heard is the appeal of Alexis & Demos.

CONSULAR FUND URGED

CONGRESS ASKED NOT TO CUT APPROPRIATION SCHEDULE.

H. B. VanDuser Telegraphs Request to New York Paper and to General Manager Dodson.

That the beneficial effect of several years of effective work by the consular representatives of the United States is threatened by the action of the appropriations committee of congress in striking from the schedule the \$300,000 included in the state department estimate, is the view of H. B. VanDuser, president of the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

President VanDuser expressed his conviction on the subject in a message to the editor of the New York Commercial Thursday and conveyed his sentiments in a message to General Manager Dodson, who is in Washington, D. C.

The text of the message follows: "Disorganization of the consular service that would result from the failure of congress to provide adequate funds would be a great loss to American business men engaged in foreign trade. Just now, when this country is in competition with other maritime and commercial countries for a fair share in world trade, it is important that trained men be retained in service and that it be strengthened by the best talent obtainable."

"Through the activities of men in consular service, the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce has made rapid advance in establishing trade relations in many lands, especially in the orient and countries touching upon the Pacific, the benefits of which should not be lost to the nation by ill-considered curtailment now."
