KNOCKS OUT BURKE

Martin Has Opponent Hanging on Ropes in Fifth.

15 ROUNDS SCHEDULED

Left and Quick Right to Jaw Spell
End of Bout; Blood Drawn
From Victor in Third Canto.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Jan. 31.—Bob Martin, American expeditionary force champion, won a technical knockout over Martin Burke, New Orleans light-heavyweight, in the fifth round of their scheduled 15-round fight tonight.

Referee Dorr stopped the fight as Burke was hanging on to the ropes. Just after taking the count of nine, Martin caught Burke on the jaw with a terrific right that sent him sprawling in the fifth. He was hardly able to regain his feet before the count of 10 and as he staggered up, Martin knocked him to the ropes again. Burke helplessly hung there taking much punishment and apparently was out when the referee stopped the fight.

Burke had a shade the better of the first round, knocking Martin with a left as the latter tried unsuccessfully to land with a right cross. Martin won the second round, scoring with a stiff right to the body. In the third Burke had a chance, when he got a left jab to the face and drawing blood from Martin's mouth. Martin tried for a right to the jaw repeatedly, but his blows failed. The fourth round Burke making a target of his opponent's face.

From the going Martin went after Burke in the fifth, using a left hook to the face for the first time, scoring twice, and was beating Burke with ease, when he shot a left and then a quick right to the jaw, ending the fight.

CANADIAN BOOTERS WIN

Labor May Buy Power Stock.

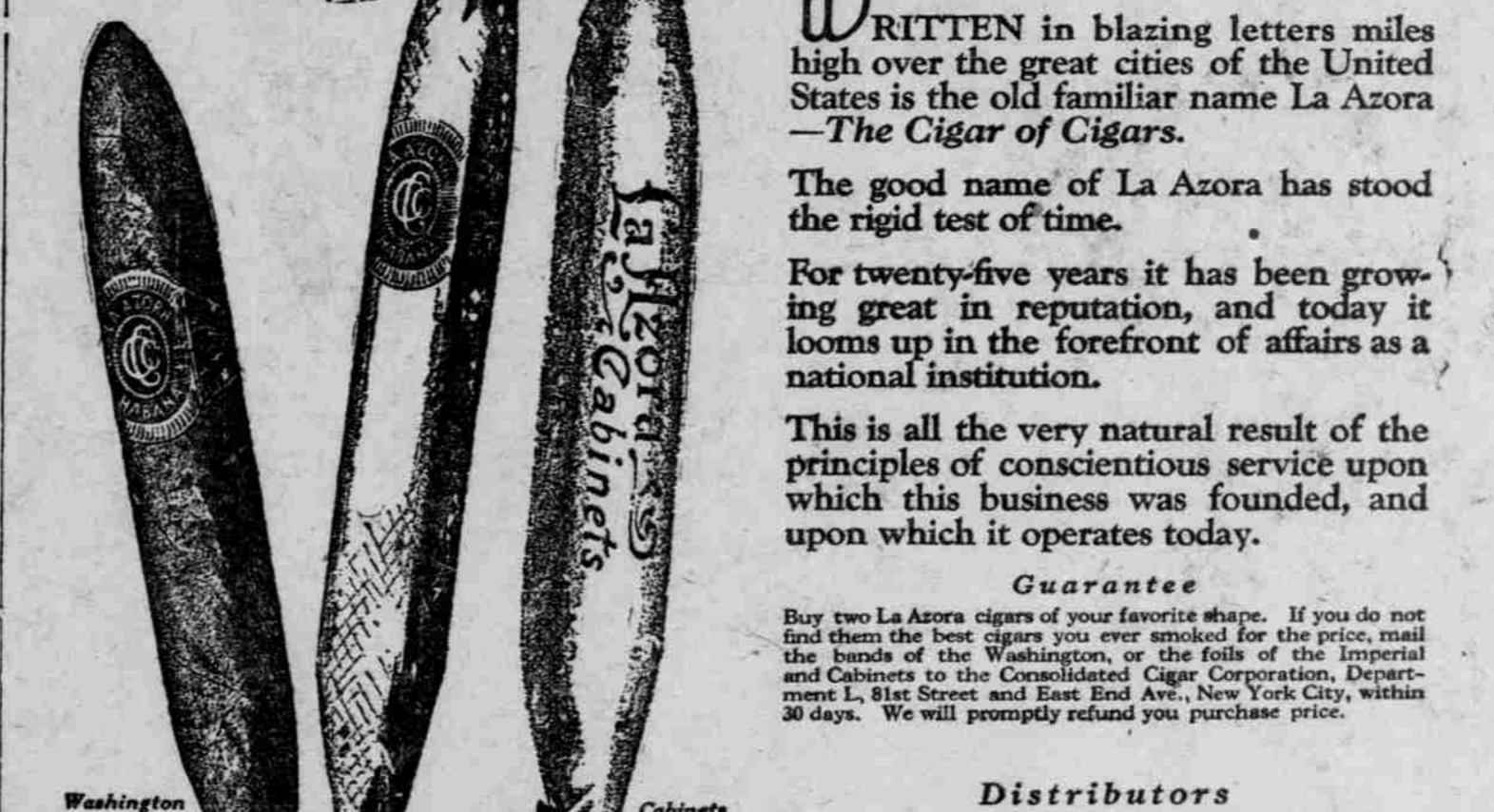
