SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 17 .- (Speenal.)-The Atlantic coast states conums more pine lumber produced in the west than any other district of the United States, according to a table of lumber consumption for 1920 issued by the Western Pine Manufacturers' association. A total of 217,029,065 feet was chipped to Atlantic coast states direct last year, while a large amount was reconsigned to that dis-trict from other states. Production of western pine covers the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Mon-

The total cut for 1920 was 1,646,713,-\$54 feet and shipments were 1,340,-594,620 feet, consisting of 50,834 cars. The producing states also consumed large quantities of pine lumber. Idaho used 57,001.131 feet; Washington, 51,295,369 feet; Oregon, 14,644,457, and Montana 115,137,952 feet. The consumption of these four states approximates 18 per cent of the total production.

Von Tirpitz Says Trade Must Be Protected.

SURFACE CRAFT UPHELD

ST. BLASIEN, Baden, Feb. 17 .- (By the Associated Press.)—Admiral von Tirpitz, German naval authority, in interview today discussed American naval programme and its reference to the prospective relations of the United States with Great

"The United States is about to build a great fleet," he said. "As the country borders on both the Atlantic and Pacific, and lacks outlying naval bases, America will presumably give necial attention to the radius of action of her ships.
