

HENRY FORD SPURNS
WALL-STREET COIN"Didn't Need It, Don't Want
It," Says Manufacturer.

LOAN PLANS REPUDIATED

Several High Officials of Motor
Company Reported Resigning
Said to Have Been Fired.

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—(Special).—That the majority of the seven executives who recently have left the Ford Motor company or are leaving did not resign, but were "fired" during a premature spring housecleaning is the substance of an interview with Henry Ford by Joseph Jefferson O'Neil, printed in the World.

The seven men who resigned are Hubert E. Hartmann, assistant secretary and general counsel, who will leave March 15; Frank L. Klingensmith, vice-president; W. C. Anderson, European chief; Charles A. Brownell, advertising manager; L. H. Turnell, auditor; Louis Block, branch manager at Philadelphia; and Rev. S. Marquis, sociologist and head of the welfare work.

Explaining how Mr. Klingensmith severed his connection with the company, Mr. Ford cleared up the mystery about the reported loan he was trying to get in Wall street.

"Kling's" Acts Repudiated.

Back in 1919, Mr. Ford said, when he had determined to buy up the outstanding minority stock in his company, he obtained a large loan from a Boston trust company. Early in this year there were some millions of this loan unpaid and Mr. Klingensmith came to New York to make certain arrangements about payments.

"Now 'Kling' is a fellow who likes to talk big figures," Mr. Ford was quoted as saying. "He likes to flirt around, I might call it, with millions. He's the kind of a chap who might drop in on a bank and say, 'Well, what's the chance of getting hold of \$50,000,000 today—or \$75,000,000—or \$100,000,000?'"

"We did not want any money at that time. We don't want any now," Kling had no authority to ask for any loan. But apparently he made some inquiries of the kind I mentioned and that started the story that we were in the market for money. The story was spread far and wide by certain interests we are dealing with in our weekly paper (the means, of course, the Jews) for propaganda purposes. There was only one thing

to do to prove to them that we didn't need or want money and that 'Kling' was acting without authority. That one thing was to let 'Kling' go."

"Junk" Largely Human.
At the time Mr. Klingensmith resigned he told Detroit newspapers that he "could not agree with the policies of the company." He is said to be in Chicago discussing new connections, and is reported to be a millionaire several times over.

"If I really did want any money," said Mr. Ford, "I could get all I needed from other sources than Wall street, and before I'd deal with Wall street I'd tear down my plant, brick by brick, with my own hands."

When the plant was shut down recently, according to Ford, it was for two seasons. First, there was not any overwhelming demand for cars, and second, there was a necessity for cleaning up the "junk" at Highland Park. Some of the "junk," it is no secret, was of the human variety, according to the dispatch from Detroit.

SUPREME COURT SILENT

Jurists Give No Opinions in Many
Cases, Including Newberry's.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 28.—Important cases in which the supreme court failed today to render opinions included those of Senator Newberry of Michigan, convicted in lower court of conspiracy to violate the federal corrupt practices act; the suit of the Colorado Coal company against the United Mine Workers of America, argued under the Sherman anti-trust act. The so-called invested capital case and the child labor case, were two others.

Student Pastor Permanent.

CORVALLIS, Or., Feb. 28.—(Special).—The Presbyterian synod for the state of Oregon has purchased a house and several lots near the college campus to make a permanent residence for a student pastor. A community house will be erected for the benefit of Presbyterian young people in attendance at the college. A student pastor has been here as an experiment for the last two years. The synod is convinced of the necessity of such an official for so large a school, and it is now taking that step to make the position permanent.

Judgment for Government Stands.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 28.—Judgments for \$18,400 obtained by the United States against the Delamar company, limited, a British corporation, for timber taken from public lands in Idaho, will stand as result of the dismissal today by the supreme court of the appeal of the company.

Railroad Lays Off 10 More.

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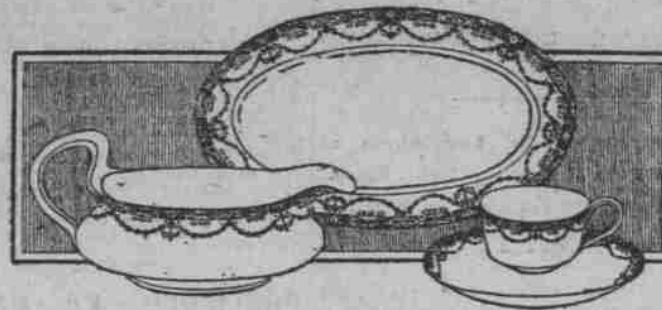
