GOVERNOR HART VETOES PLAN TO SAFEGUARD DEPOSITS.

House Measure Providing Issue of Bonds by Diking Districts

Is Approved.

OLYMPIA, Wash., March 15 .- (Special.)-Governor Hart today vetoed senate bill 159, relating to the de-posits of public money and making the city, county or state responsible for the safety of bonds and securities deposited by depository banks in lieu of surety bonds to secure deposits of public funds.

The governor signed house bill 282, providing that the board of commis-sioners of any diking district may upon the petition of the owners of a majority of all lands within the district to be benefited, issue bonds for the total amount of proposed im-provement and at any time thereafter without such petition issue bonds for

without such petition issue bonds for the purpose of funding outstanding warrants or obligations. The governor also signed senate bill 212, appropriating \$12,490,000 for highway improvement. Of this sum \$2,800,000 is appropriated from the primary bichway maintenance fund primary highway maintenance fund for the maintenance of primary high-ways and \$9,650,000 from the public highway and motor vehicle funds for the engineering, construction and paving of the primary and secondary highways of the state.
