

BERLIN THREATENED BY LABOR UPRISING

Wilhelmstrasse Is Closed
Against All Traffic.

TROOPS ARE ON GUARD

Approaches to All Government
Buildings Are Barricaded as
Precautionary Measure.

BERLIN, March 28.—(By the Associated Press.)—The government late tonight ordered Wilhelmstrasse, the principal street of the city, closed to all traffic in anticipation of possible disturbances Tuesday, when the radicals hope to tie up the big industrial and other plants in a general strike.

Approaches to all government buildings are barricaded with barbed-wire entanglements.

HALLE, Germany, March 28.—(By the Associated Press.)—Eisenstein, the quiet and under control of the police, reports from Bitterfeld and other places that the only fighting has been near Sangerhausen, where a workmen's general strike was held up and several were killed and wounded.

The workmen still have the upper hand in Leuna, police showing no intention of attacking them for fear they will fulfill their threat to blow up big factories there.

At Halle the situation is quiet, this being due, according to the police, to postponement of the communists' plans, which provided for the capture of the surrounding towns first.

Police Nervous Over Outlook.
Police are not yet ready to say that the communist movement has failed and are still nervous over the outlook. However, it is generally believed the police are in a position to enforce the law.

Later in the day Halle was cut off from almost every line of communication except to Berlin by the police in an effort to check agitation by alleged Russian bolsheviks, said to be numerous here.

The streets were cleared by 9 P. M. and no vehicles were permitted to go beyond the city limits.

Congregation in the streets of more than three persons was forbidden and there were wholesale arrests.

American Reporters Arrested.
The Associated Press correspondent, two other American reporters and one Englishman, who had been frequently investigated, were arrested for the second time while entering the security police administration headquarters, where they had been a number of times. They were sent to district police headquarters under guard and examined for three hours.

Their papers were scrutinized for suspected forgeries, the speech was examined for signs of the Russian agent and their opinions were solicited to determine if they had radical sympathies. When they entered the room conversing in English a repulsively uniformed sergeant with monocle, closely clipped hair and upturned mustache, called out sternly: "Speak German here."

Correspondents Are Grilled.
The correspondents paid no attention to this order and a young officer appeared and said, "Follow me."

"Who are you?" was asked, and he replied, tapping his chest: "Here I am, follow me."

The correspondents followed and were subjected to a cross-examination regarding other newspaper men reported to have made bolshevik speeches. They were permitted to proceed when the German authorities finally were convinced they had no intention to act as agents of the enemy and that they were not bolshevik propagandists.

Another arrest occurred as the correspondents were calling on a communist leader and caused a long harassment, during which police authorities attacked the English press as partly responsible for the situation here, because of its anti-american attitude. Strangers are shadowed at every move and the police are in possession of the minutest details concerning every visitor.

Communists Are Shelled.
HALLE, Germany, March 28.—(By the Associated Press.)—Federal artillery took a prominent part today in dealing with the insurgent communists in this disturbed section of Prussian Saxony.

The artillery shelled the communists who were grouped on the hills to the west of Eisenstein, dispersing them. After a brief engagement, the town of Sangerhausen, southwest of Eisenstein, was occupied by federal forces, which now control the place.

American Area Affected.
COBLENZ, March 28.—(By the Associated Press.)—A communist uprising took place this morning in the American bridgehead area at Montabaur, six miles northeast of Ehrenbreitstein. A riot call was answered by the provost marshal and American military police were dispatched to Montabaur to restore order.

It took the 20 men of the American military police only a few minutes after their arrival at Montabaur to put down the disorders. They arrested the leader and confiscated communist literature.

GIRL GIVEN TO FATHER
Supreme Court Puts End to Fight
Over Little Julia Marmo.

OLYMPIA, Wash., March 28.—(Special.)—The supreme court issued a

writ prohibiting the King county juvenile court from continuing to exercise any jurisdiction over Julia Marmo, minor child of Andrew Marmo of Tacoma, and ordering the court to surrender the child to the father.

The case was the outgrowth of a divorce action started in Spokane county by Helen Marmo, in 1916, in which she sought a divorce from Andrew Marmo of Great Falls, Mont., and the custody of the two children. The divorce was granted and the custody of the children awarded to the mother. The Spokane county court, in modifying the decree, awarded the children to Marmo, as did the King county court. Later Marmo did not comply with an order the juvenile court of Seattle issued, which provided that Julia Marmo should see her mother once a week. The juvenile court again took possession of the child and it was then that Marmo appealed to the supreme court.

GRAND JURY PROBE DUE

GEORGIA NEGRO PEONAGE TO
BE INVESTIGATED.

Officials Do Not Expect to Find
More Bodies in Search of
Williams Plantation.

ATLANTA, Ga., March 28.—A special grand jury is expected to be convened in Jasper county this week to investigate the alleged peonage cases at the Williams plantation where the bodies of 11 negroes were discovered.

Officials tonight expressed the belief that no more bodies would be found on the Williams plantation, although the investigation was being continued.

Officials of the Ocmulgee circuit, which includes Jasper county, also began inquiring into the recent lynching of Eugene Hamilton, a negro, and federal agents were said tonight to be investigating other alleged peonage cases. Sheriff Persons of Jasper county and his nephew are under indictment and will go on trial here April 4 on charges of having kidnapped negroes and taken them into peonage.

CHECK FORGER CONVICTED

Former Y. M. C. A. Secretary Gets
10 Months' Sentence.

SALT LAKE CITY, March 28.—Fred N. Morris, formerly Young Men's Christian association secretary at Pocatello and later at Central City, Neb., has been found guilty of forging two checks belonging to former employers and sentenced to ten months in jail at Idaho Falls, Idaho, according to William H. Davenport of the United States secret service, who has returned from Idaho Falls. The offenses were committed while Morris was in Pocatello.

It was charged that Morris received the letters containing bonus checks for the two men and that through having received their discharge papers he was able to forge their signatures to the checks.

GERMANS ARE CONFIDENT

Preparations for Upper Silesian
Autonomy Are Ordered.

LONDON, March 28.—"In certain expectation" that Upper Silesia will be accorded to Germany in its entirety as a result of the plebiscite, the German cabinet, says the London Times, has instructed the minister of the interior to make preparations in connection with the upper Silesian autonomy act. This was reported today.

When we had worked a few moments over Mrs. Donnerberg she opened her eyes and asked, "My boy, my boy, is he all right?" We assured her that he was. She closed her eyes and lapsed once more into unconsciousness.

"A few moments later someone suggested that Astoria doctors be telephoned. Two motorists drove away to find the nearest house, one going in one direction and one in the other. Just about an hour afterward the ambulance came and with it the doctors.

"I was still helping to bring the people back to consciousness. The crowd got larger and larger. For a time it seemed that no one knew what to do. Then an automobile drew up and a man walked over to view the bodies as had every newcomer. He exclaimed, 'That is my brother!'"

RUSSIA TO KEEP UP DRIVE FOR U. S. TRADE

Concessions to American
Business Concerns Likely.

GOODS READY TO SHIP

London Daily Mail Agrees With
President Harding in Rejecting
Bolshevik Overtures.

HELSINGFORS, March 28.—(By the Associated Press.)—Regardless of the rebuff administered by the state department at Washington in its recent communication on the subject, the soviet government probably will continue its efforts for trade with America, Jan Antonovich Behrns, soviet minister to Finland, told the Associated Press today.

"Other efforts undoubtedly will be made," he said, "most likely through American business concerns to which we are ready to grant concessions, while, of course, soviet Russia is undoubtedly ready to make new overtures at any time the American government sees fit to change its viewpoint toward us."

"But one thing is certain, despite all newspaper reports to the contrary, Russia will not give up communism and revert to the principle of private property."

Goods Ready for America.
"In brief our situation is this: We now have for the first time peace with our neighbors and have things well in hand at home. Our government is willing to become a capitalistic concern itself in order to maintain communism within its borders. As a government it will deal with foreign concerns, granting and guaranteeing concessions, but the results of these deals in produce necessary for our people will continue to be distributed communistically by our government."

M. Behrns said that soviet Russia had a certain amount of raw products, including wool, ready to offer to America now, but that the principle in view of the trade offer was future concessions in Siberia and elsewhere, the minister pointing out that a vast territory in the Russian domain was still undeveloped.

"Conditions in the interior are far from satisfactory," he added, "but they are better than at any time since the revolution."

LONDON, March 28.—Agreement with the principles enunciated by Charles E. Hughes, American secretary of state, in his reply to overtures for a trade agreement with the Russian bolshevik government is expressed by the Daily Mail in commenting on the situation. The newspaper says the British government's attitude in concluding an agreement for the opening of trade relations with soviet Russia contrasts strikingly with America's decision.

Distort of Bolshevik Seen.
"President Harding," the newspaper says, "distorts bolshevik diplomacy and lost no time in rejecting Lenin's overtures. It is certain Great Britain will find herself at variance with the bolsheviks sooner or later. It is obvious that Russia will have to be

kept well up to her undertaking to abstain from hostile action and from spreading propaganda against the British empire. Public opinion here will remain disquieted until the terms of the soviet treaty which touch India most nearly—those relating to Afghanistan—have been fully disclosed."

LONDON, March 28.—The Russian soviet government has given Sweden an order for 1000 locomotives and Germany an order for 100, says a wireless dispatch from Moscow today. Forty thousand smokestacks, 3500 tires, more than 18,000 tons of tin and quantities of other railway materials already have been received from Germany, the message adds.

VIVIANI IS AT NEW YORK

EX-PREMIER OF FRANCE AR-
RIVES AS SPECIAL ENVOY.

NEW YORK, March 28.—Rene Viviani, ex-premier and envoy extraordinary of France to this country, arrived today on the steamship Eclair, and will go to Washington tomorrow. He expects to confer on Wednesday with President Harding, to whom he came "on a mission of courtesy."

A small reception committee went down the bay to meet the visitor and brought him back to Battery park, where thousands had assembled. He was accompanied by Stephane Lauzanne, editor of the Paris newspaper, Le Matin.

He declined to discuss the official nature of his visit before having talked with President Harding. "I have come to the United States," he said, "to pay to the president the respects of the government and the nation of France. In saluting the first and great citizen of the great American democracy, I salute also the great and noble people for whom France keeps her tender affection and eternal gratitude."

Marcel Knecht, director of the French information service here, said tonight the ex-premier's visit has nothing to do with France's war debt.

ROAD TO OPEN EARLIER

Snoqualmie Pass to Be Ready for
Traffic Between May 1 and 10.

SEATTLE, Wash., March 28.—(Special.)—Snoqualmie pass through the Cascade mountains on the Sunset highway is to be opened to traffic between May 1 and May 10, three to four weeks earlier than any previous year, according to the terms of a contract approved this morning by the King county board of commissioners and which is to be entered into jointly by King and Kittitas counties with Boss & Hampshire, Ellensburg contractors.

Three and one-half miles of highway on the King-county side and four and one-half miles on the Kittitas side are to be cleared of snow. King paying \$2324 and Kittitas \$1666 for the work.
