

LORD TALBOT NAMED TO GOVERN IRELAND

Unionist Whip Is Held Most Popular in Generation.

LESS RIGOR IS EXPECTED

Lord Lieutenant Succeeding French May Gain Favor if System Is Not So Stringent.

LONDON, April 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—The French of France will be succeeded as lord lieutenant and governor-general of Ireland by Lord Edmund Bernard Talbot, who has held the post of joint parliamentary secretary for the treasury.

Sir Robert S. Horne, president of the board of trade, has been appointed chancellor of the exchequer in succession to J. Austen Chamberlain. Stanley Baldwin, parliamentary secretary of the treasury, will become the new president of the board of trade.

The appointment of Lord Edmund was due to the necessity, under the home-rule act, of appointing a civilian viceroy.

These changes necessitated a considerable reconstruction of the ministry. Among the new appointments were:

Dr. Christopher Addison, minister of health, was made minister without portfolio.

Captain Frederick Gust, aide-de-camp to Field Marshal French, became air secretary.

Sir Alfred Pease, first commissioner of works, became minister of health. Viscount Peel, under-secretary for war, became chancellor of the duchy of Lancaster.

Earl of Crawford, chancellor of the duchy of Lancaster, became first commissioner of works.

The Right Hon. Frederick G. Kellogg, head of the overseas trade department, became postmaster-general. Charles A. McCurdy, food controller, became joint parliamentary secretary to the treasury.

Major Sir Philip Lloyd Graeme, parliamentary secretary to the board of trade, became director of overseas trade.

Albert H. Illingworth, who held the post of postmaster-general, retired on account of ill health.

Less Rigid Policy Likely.

The London Times, referring to Lord Edmund Talbot as "the most popular unionist whip for a generation," said editorially:

"Whether his qualifications as the foremost lay Catholic in England will recommend him as strongly to the Irish people as the government seems to expect, is an open question, but as he would scarcely have accepted the appointment without some assurance that the system of administration which marked the later years of Viscount French's viceroyalty will hardly be maintained, it is all the more probable that he will enter his most important office under favorable auspices."

EX-SOLDIER FLEES SHOTS

Seriously Wounded Man Leaps Into River and Makes Escape.

DUBLIN, April 1.—An ex-soldier, whose home is in Cork, was fired upon today by four civilians. Though seriously wounded, he escaped by jumping into a river, from which he was rescued by boatmen.

Thirty bombs and many appliances for their manufacture were discovered in Dublin stables today.

Forty-four masked men on clerks of the county petty sessions court were made last night and today for the purpose of seizing funds realized from dog licenses.

A large number of similar raids were carried out earlier in the week, resulting in heavy estimated at nearly a thousand pounds, which, it was declared, is being handed over to the Daily Freeman.

Owners of dogs recently were warned not to pay for licenses, on the ground that the government would use the money to fight the Irish people.

DUBLIN MAYOR PLANS TRIP

Information on Irish White Cross to Be Given America.

DUBLIN, April 1.—Lord Mayor O'Neill of Dublin today announced his intention of going to America soon with R. D. Slater, Salem, news editor of the Irish Agricultural Society for the purpose of giving to the American committee for relief in Ireland full information regarding the White Cross organization of which the mayor is chairman.

"Some misconception has arisen in America as to whether the American relief committee will be allowed to function in Ireland," he said. "Dublin Castle has notified the American delegation that they must be careful in their activities. Our visit to the United States is intended to remove this misconception."

The mayor has received \$5000 subscribed by the diocese of Indianapolis for the White Cross.
