

STILLMAN ALIENY IS TO BE APPEALED

Exclusion of Letters Also Is
to Be Fought.

OTHER RULINGS OPPOSED

Payment of \$30,000 Counsel Fees
and \$12,500 for Expenses of
Wife Financier's Target.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., April 4.—Counsel for James A. Stillman, New York financier, suing for divorce, announced tonight they would file an appeal against the order of Justice Morschauer fixing alimony, counsel fees and expenses and excluding certain documentary evidence when the order has been served on Mr. Stillman.

The appeal, it was explained, would be directed not only against the decision excluding the so-called "confession letter" of Mrs. Stillman and letters addressed to her by Fred Beauvais, co-respondent named by her husband, but also against the order to pay her \$15,000 alimony for March and April, \$20,000 counsel fees and \$12,500 expenses within 30 days.

Letters to be published, it was said, automatically make public these letters will be filed in the appellate division of the supreme court in Brooklyn probably tomorrow. It became known today that affidavits filed by Mrs. Stillman in support of charges made against her husband and Mrs. Florence H. Leeds in her amended answer, contain the names of 12 persons who support the allegations, including Mrs. Sophie Barakoff and H. H. Adams, John H. Adams, employed by Mrs. Leeds; Frank H. Ivens, superintendent of the apartment house where Mrs. Leeds was born, and Mrs. Estelle Klee, secretary to Mrs. Stillman.

Supreme Court Order Signed. Justice Morschauer today signed an order directing that payment of alimony and counsel fees in the divorce proceedings be made within 30 days and that the order be enforced by the sheriff.

Counsel for both sides agreed that sealed papers in the case, including letters said to have been written to Mrs. Stillman by Fred Beauvais, Indian guide, named as co-respondent, and the alleged "confession letter" of Mrs. Stillman to her husband, should not be opened when they are filed in the Putnam county courthouse at Carmel.

Alimony Agreement Made. After a conference it was announced that an agreement under which Mrs. Stillman will be paid \$15,000 alimony for March and April in three installments of \$5,000 each, the first payment to be made three days after the order has been signed.

During the discussion as to the possibility of making public the sealed affidavits, Justice Morschauer said to the opposing counsel: "If the plaintiff wanted to print them, he's going to print them. Judges are not running the newspaper. They are running the court."

There's no use in discussing now the right of the plaintiff to print any of these exhibits. The matter contained is not scandalous if it pertains to the case. "You gentlemen know what happens to lawyers when they print matter that may be libelous."

The order set forth that Mrs. Stillman, in her amended answer, charged that he had been intimate with Mrs. Florence H. Leeds and was the father of 20-month-old Jay. Leeds had presented the affidavits of 12 persons.

NEW EXPORT RATE ASKED

READJUSTMENT ON GRAIN AND GRAIN PRODUCTS WANTED.

Interstate Commerce Commission Recommends Changes in Letter Sent Out to Railways.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 4.—Readjustment of export rates on grain and grain products carrying a reduction of 3 cents east of Chicago was recommended to the railways today by the interstate commerce commission.

The commission recommendations covered a general readjustment of grain and grain products rates and were outlined in a letter sent representatives of the roads by W. V. Hardie, director of traffic.

After consideration of the situation and with the approval of Chairman Clark of the interstate commerce commission, Mr. Hardie stated there was no objection to readjustment of rates as follows:

A reduction of 3 cents east of Chicago in the all-rail export rates on grain and grain products. A reduction of 1 cent on grain and grain products of export traffic only from Missouri river points, including Sioux City to Chicago and Chicago rates east of St. Louis on grain and grain products.

Changes from Peoria and other related markets corresponding to those from St. Louis and Chicago, to preserve existing equalization.

No reductions to be made west of St. Louis.

The existing "at-and-east" rates on export grain now scheduled to expire April 15, to be continued indefinitely, but with no further reductions at present.

The "at-and-east" domestic rates on grain April 15 to revert to the rates in effect August 25, 1920, plus 40 per cent to be applied on the net rates.

Lake and rail rates on flour exports from Chicago, Duluth and Minneapolis to be reduced in the same amounts as the all-rail rates east of Chicago.

No reduction in the rates on grain or grain products from Minneapolis to Chicago.

On April 10, it was expected, the street railway department also will go on a cash basis for payment of salaries, and by April 25, it was said, all expenses will be handled in cash.

WAR SERVICE NO BENEFIT

Ineligible Aliens Denied Special Citizenship Privilege.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 4.—Japanese, Chinese and other aliens not eligible to citizenship in the United States are excluded from the privileges granted men who served in the military forces during the war of taking out full citizenship papers after two years' residence in the country.

This was announced by the department of labor today.

Volunteer Firemen Save Home. HOOD RIVER, Or., April 4.—(Special.)—Promptness in response of the volunteer fire department saved the home of Mrs. Kitty Cox from burning today. EXCLUSION LEAGUE POLICY PROCLAIMED

Anti-Japanese Organization
Announces Plans.

PROTECTION IS WANTED

Action to Carry Out Purpose of
California Association Will Be
Urged in Washington.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 4.—The Japanese Exclusion league of California has outlined a declaration of policy for protection of American interests in connection with the subject of Japanese immigration, on which it will urge action by the federal administration, it was announced here today.

The principles outlined by the league have been formally endorsed by the affiliated organizations, the Los Angeles County Anti-Asiatic association and the Japanese Exclusion league of Washington.

Representative on Way. The representative of the California league, W. S. McClatchy, left tonight for Washington, D. C., to present the matter to the state department and to congress.

The four points of the league's declaration of policy are:

First—Absolute exclusion of all Japanese immigration. Permission for temporary residence only for tourists, students, artists, commercial men, teachers, etc.

Second—Such exclusion to be in accordance with United States laws and regulations, as is done with immigration admitted or excluded from all other countries, and not, as at present, under an arrangement whereby control and regulation is surrendered to Japan.

Follow Constitution in Demand. Third—Compliance on the part of all departments of the federal government with the constitution, and the abandonment of the threat or attempt to take advantage of certain phrasings of that document as to treaties, which, it is claimed, gives the treaty-making power authority to violate plain provisions of the constitution in the following matters:

(a) To nullify state rights and state laws for control of lands and other matters plainly within the state's jurisdiction.

(b) To grant American citizenship to races of yellow color which are made ineligible for such citizenship.

Fourth—For the Japanese legally entitled to residence in California, fair treatment, protection in property rights legally acquired and the privilege of engaging in any business desired except such as may be now or hereafter denied by law to all aliens or to aliens ineligible to citizenship.

Provided particularly that they may not hereafter buy or lease agricultural lands.

WHEAT ONLY 95 CENTS
NO SALES ARE MADE EVEN AT
UNUSUALLY LOW FIGURES.

Low Prices Cause Large Number to Join Co-operative Market Association, Says Grower.

THE DALLES, Or., April 4.—(Special.)—With the greater part of the 1920 Wasco county wheat crop still unsold, local mills and export buyers today reported that 95 and 96 cents a bushel the maximum price which they will pay. No sales were reported at these quotations.

This year's low wheat prices is having the effect of causing large numbers of growers to enter the ranks of the Oregon Co-operative Grain Growers' association, one of the county's largest wheat growers said today.

More than 190,000 bushels of wheat reported today at a meeting of the board of directors of the new co-operative association. The state quota call for 7,000,000 bushels to be signed up by July 1.

Extension or organization work upon a large scale in eastern Oregon wheat-growing districts was decided upon today at a meeting of the board of directors of the new co-operative association.

MONTANA LAW OVERRULED

Communications Between Husband
and Wife Not Confidential.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 4.—The Montana law providing that all communications between husband and wife are privileged and confidential was declared unconstitutional by the

United States circuit court of appeals here today in connection with an action brought by Mrs. Evelyn E. Mason to collect \$5000 in insurance on her husband, George Mason, from the New York Life Insurance company. Mason shot and killed himself on May 6, 1919, and Mrs. Mason, holding that the shooting was accidental, according to her husband's statements to her before death, claimed his insurance. The insurance company held that it was suicide and that she had no right to testify under the law in regard to any communication of any nature between her husband and herself.

The district court held with Mrs. Mason, declared the law unconstitutional and ordered the insurance paid. The company appealed.

PERSHING RAPS SERVICE

HOSPITAL CARE OF WOUNDED SOLDIERS CRITICISED.

General Pleads for Better Facilities for Treatment of Men Disabled in War.

NEW YORK, April 4.—General J. J. Pershing in addressing a mass meeting tonight to arouse public sentiment for betterment of hospital conditions for wounded soldiers, declared existing organizations for the care of wounded veterans have failed in their purpose.

The number of the disabled requiring treatment is increasing, he said, and facilities for their treatment have not been provided as rapidly as needed. He criticized the public health service, upon which rests responsibility for caring for the wounded veterans, as being poorly organized.

Combination of welfare agencies under one competent head was advocated in order better to care for those physically and mentally disabled.

"The debt we owe the unfortunate soldier has sunk deep into the hearts of all patriotic citizens," said General Pershing, "but only those who fought the battle and suffered with him can fully realize our great obligation. The debt cannot be measured by material standards."

"Imagine the feelings of the neglected soldier toward a government for which he offered his life. No government is worthy of its name that fails in sympathy and care for men made helpless in fighting its battles."

FARM BANK TO FUNCTION

RESUMPTION OF ACTIVITIES
SET FOR MAY 1.

Assurance Given Governor Davis of Idaho by Federal Loan Board After Conference.

THE OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, D. C., April 4.—The federal farm loan bank at Spokane, Wash., which serves the district composed of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, will begin to function again on May 1, Governor Davis of Idaho was assured by the federal farm loan board today.

Fourteen members of the board, including Governor Davis, conferred at some length with members of the board, telling them that by a resumption of loans the board could do much to help the farmers and business generally in the northwest.

The board was undecided as to whether loans can be granted on the present applications, of which there are large numbers on file. It may be necessary to require new applications it was said. Since the recent decision of the supreme court upholding the federal farm loan act, the board has been making plans to meet the demands of the farmers by a sale of bonds and it was said today that there is a pleasing demand for the farm bank securities.

Another sign that the farm banks are expected to resume operations is the large number of applicants from all parts of the northwest for appointment as land appraisers. Representative Simpson has been notified by the commissioner of the general land office that a refund of \$125 an acre will be made to purchasers who paid \$2.50 an acre for land in even-numbered sections, as well as in odd-numbered sections, involved in the primary limits of the general route of the Northern Pacific railroad from Wallula Junction, Wash., to Portland.

10,000 Jews Join Christians. VIENNA, April 4.—(Jewish Telegraphic Agency.)—Reports from Budapest establish the fact that in the first six months of 1920 10,000 Jews in Hungary adopted the Christian faith.

Auto Accident Suit Filed.

ASTORIA, Or., April 4.—(Special.)—A suit to recover \$1562.35 damages as the result of an automobile accident has been filed in the circuit court by August Hansen against W. D. Walker, Ralph Sowers, Marguerite Noe and Mrs. August Anderson. The complaint avers the plaintiff was cranking his automobile when a machine hit his car.

FLEET HELD ALL RIGHT

SECRETARY DENBY IS HOME
AFTER TWO WEEKS' TOUR.

Marine Posts in Haiti Declared
Well Conducted; Completion
of Programme Urged.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 4.—Upon stepping ashore from the destroyer Pruitt at the Washington navy yard today after a two weeks' tour of the fleet and navy shore establishments in Cuba, Haiti and the Dominican republic, Secretary Denby said "the Atlantic fleet is in fine shape."

The secretary came home in record time, the destroyer making the 1900-mile non-stop run from the Dominican republic in 56 hours at a 25-knot clip.

Mr. Denby said he studied the situation in Haiti and found the marine posts well conducted, with a spirit of cordiality existing between them and the natives. He was impressed with the use of airplanes by the marines in Haiti to carry mail, transport the sick and maintain communication.

While at the Atlantic fleet winter base at Guantanamo Secretary Denby inspected the fleet from an airplane. He said he had no comment to make on the possibility of a foreign cruise this summer, or any change in the system of keeping separate fleets in the Atlantic and Pacific oceans.

The committee was appointed at Mr. Hoover's request to co-operate in working out a plan for closer relationship between business and the department of commerce.

Committees from all the great industries of the nation, Mr. Hoover has announced, are to be named to aid in the revival of business by assisting the commerce department with plans for the development of their trade fields. A committee from the American dye industry will be named, Mr. Hoover said, to develop results of preliminary conferences held with representatives of the industry on the necessity for protection against German competition.

Other preliminary conferences are to be held this week with leading manufacturers, including automobile manufacturers.

TRADE CONFABS TO START

EXPANSION OF AMERICAN BUSINESS AIM OF CONFERENCES.

Committee of Five From United States Chamber to Meet With Hoover Today.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 4.—Announcement was made tonight that Secretary Hoover tomorrow will begin conferences with a committee of five from the United States chamber of commerce to consider methods for expanding American trade, both foreign and domestic.

Mr. Hinkle urged special attention for the request, as the father is a civil war veteran who desires to see his son again before he dies.

Grays Harbor Logger Dies.

HOQUIAM, Wash., April 4.—(Special.)—As the result of injuries sustained when he was struck by the branches of a falling tree in Wynoochee Timberland company's logging camp, Thursday, John Severson died in an Aberdeen hospital yesterday. His relatives reside in Tacoma, though he had been a Grays Harbor resident for a number of years. He was 35 years old.

Woman, Burned by Flame, Dies.

ASTORIA, Or., April 4.—(Special.)—Mrs. Icy Della Walters, wife of William C. Walters, locomotive engineer employed by the Saddle Mountain Logging company, died yesterday from burns, resulting from the explosion of a can of oil she was using to light the kitchen fire. The deceased was a native of West Virginia, 35 years of age, and besides her husband, leaves two brothers, G. F. and W. A. Markley of Grays Harbor.

William M. Lowmyer Dies.
