

\$794,827 IS SPENT TO TEACH VETERANS

Cost of State Educational Aid So Far Compiled.

ENROLLMENT IS 5402

Interest on Certificates of Indebtedness Is \$3222—Cost Is Defrayed by Millage Taxes.

SALEM, Or., April 5.—(Special.)—Total disbursements under the so-called soldiers' sailors' and marines' educational aid law from the time of its inception, June 25, 1918, until March 31, 1921, were \$794,827.51, according to a report prepared here today by Sam A. Koser, secretary of state.

The enrollment in the various educational institutions, under the provisions of the act, aggregated 5402, while the applications representing transfers of students from one institution to another, duplicate applications and canceled applications numbered 627.

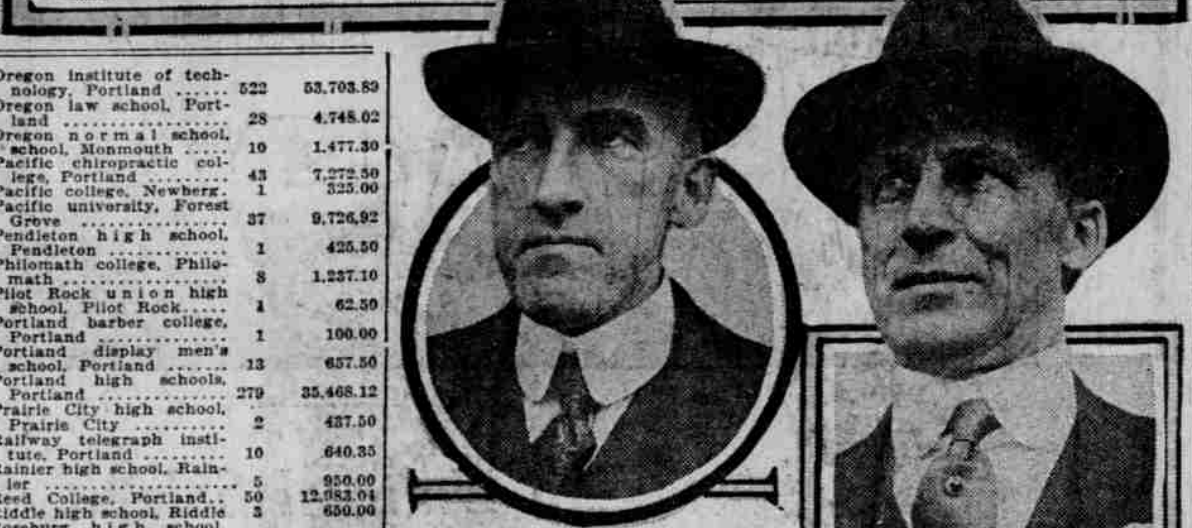
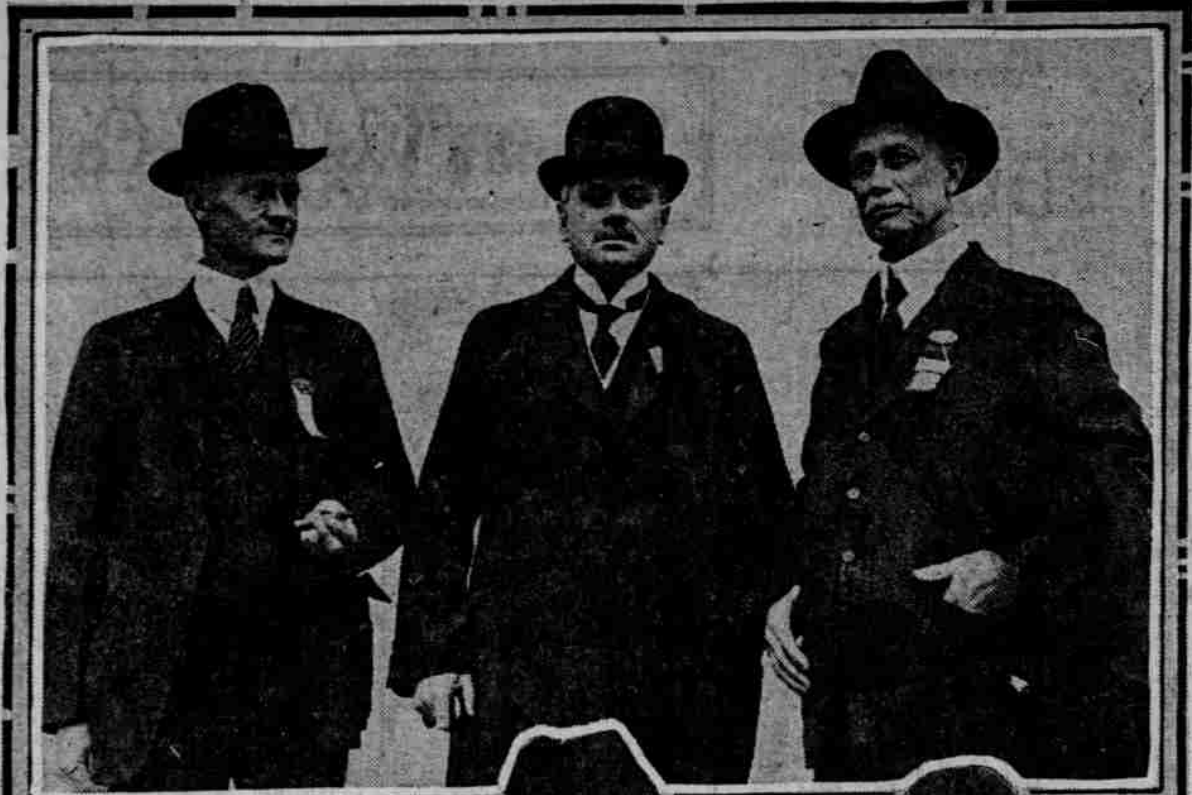
Making up the total disbursements was \$790,886.09 distributed among the various institutions in which the ex-service men were enrolled, expenses department of public institutions, \$719.31, and interest on certificates of indebtedness, \$322.11.

The cost of operating the educational aid law aggregates approximately \$450,000 a year, and is defrayed by millage taxes totaling four-tenths of a mill. These taxes were approved by the voters of the state after being referred by the legislature.

The various schools, together with the number of ex-service men enrolled in each, and the amount of money paid to the individual institutions, follow:

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DEATH, RUIN TRAIL JAPAN COAST STORM.

Property Damage Is Great and 30 Lives Lost.

VESSELS DRIVEN ASHORE

Many Houses Are Demolished by Wind and Large Sections Are Reported Inundated.

TOKIO, April 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Great property damage was done and 30 lives were lost in a terrific storm which swept the southern coast of Japan Sunday night. Telephone and telegraph lines were cut throughout the southern part of the empire. Tokio was still in darkness and a number of houses were destroyed here.

The storm was especially severe in the harbor of Yokohama. The Japanese steamers Alabama Maru and Atlas Maru dragged their anchors and went ashore. The former vessel was about to sail for Seattle and had her passengers aboard.

Eight workmen were buried when a tunnel collapsed near Fukushima. The Ibi, Hida and Tenryu rivers in the province of Gifu overflowed their banks and 3000 houses were flooded. The famous bridge across the Tenryu river was destroyed.

The American steamer Golden State successfully weathered the gale and arrived at Yokohama yesterday. There were numerous reports given by officers and men, the return of American shipping to the Pacific being welcomed by officials at Yokohama.

ALIEN SLACKER BARRED

COURT DENIES CITIZENSHIP ON BAD WAR RECORD.

Claim for Exemption on Ground of Being Foreigner Comes Up to Defeat Naturalization.

ALBANY, Or., April 5.—(Special.)—Wilhelm Wruk of Thomas claimed exemption from military service as an alien after he had declared his intention to become a citizen of this country and American citizenship was denied to him in the state circuit court here yesterday.

Judge Kelly did not mince words in addressing Wruk in denying his application.

Wruk, who is of German parentage but born in Russia, came to the United States several years ago and in 1913 declared his intention to become an American citizen. He was drafted during the war but in his questionnaire claimed exemption from service because he was an alien. After considerable correspondence over Wruk's status his claim for exemption was allowed.

This record confronted Wruk when his application for admission to citizenship came up for hearing here.

Fourteen applications for citizenship were heard by Judge Kelly and nine of the applicants were admitted to citizenship. Three applications were continued and one dismissed without prejudice. Wruk's application was the only one dismissed with prejudice. Several of the applicants were Germans.

Lebanon Legion Stages Smoker.

LEBANON, Or., April 5.—(Special.)—The local American Legion post held a smoker and ring and mat contest at its meeting this week. The curtain raiser was a three-round bout between Whitaker and Hlyeu, which was won by Hlyeu.

Scotch Whisky Is Seized.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 5.—Thirty sacks of Scotch whisky, valued at \$4000, were seized by police when they arrested R. E. Marcy and Jacob Hlyeu near Lake City, a suburb today.

Cement Rate Protested.

SALEM, Or., April 5.—(Special.)—The Oregon Portland Cement company and the Portland Traffic and Transportation association today filed application with the Oregon public service commission to readjust the rates on this product now in effect on the lines of the Southern Pacific railroad, Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company, Spokane, Portland & Seattle, Oregon Electric and Oregon Short Line roads. The petitioners alleged that the present rate for the transportation of cement was excessive.

Clackamas Pomona to Meet.

OREGON CITY, Or., April 5.—(Special.)—The Clackamas County Pomona grange will meet at New Era on Wednesday, April 14. The local grange has arranged to entertain a large crowd. Two banquets will be served, one at noon and one at night. Among the events of the day will be the conferring of the fifth degree on a large class.

Broccoli Seed Received.

SALEM, Or., April 5.—(Special.)—Another step in the campaign to produce broccoli in the Willamette valley on a commercial basis was announced here today, when C. C. Russell, father of the industry in this vicinity, informed members of the broccoli association that he had received considerable seed which would be distributed among the producers.

"It was a happy thought," he said, "that the City of Roses should be host to the third annual convention. In Idaho we have about every mineral one can name and we are interested in the tariff. Many men are out of employment. Not a zinc property is operating in the northwest states, because Belgium can bring zinc into the country at a lower rate than we can produce it. The same is true of Spain and its lead exports to the United States."

Stanfield to Support Cause.

"We are going to have the support of Senator Stanfield for our cause and he has authorized me to state that we have his co-operation and that he favors a tariff to protect the mining industry. I want to thank you on behalf of Idaho for our welcome to Portland."

The welcomes and responses were followed by an address, "Basic Industries of the Northwest," by Mrs. N. Dana of Portland. He recalled the \$15,000,000 originally paid for the Louisiana purchase and described it as a wonderful bargain, as was later proved. He said single crops each year west of the Rocky mountains had many times repaid that original \$15,000,000.

"We want you to feel, when you come to Portland," he said, "that you come not only to a city of friends but to a city pre-eminent in business as well as a financial center and a great potential port. The secret of our success is the Columbia river."

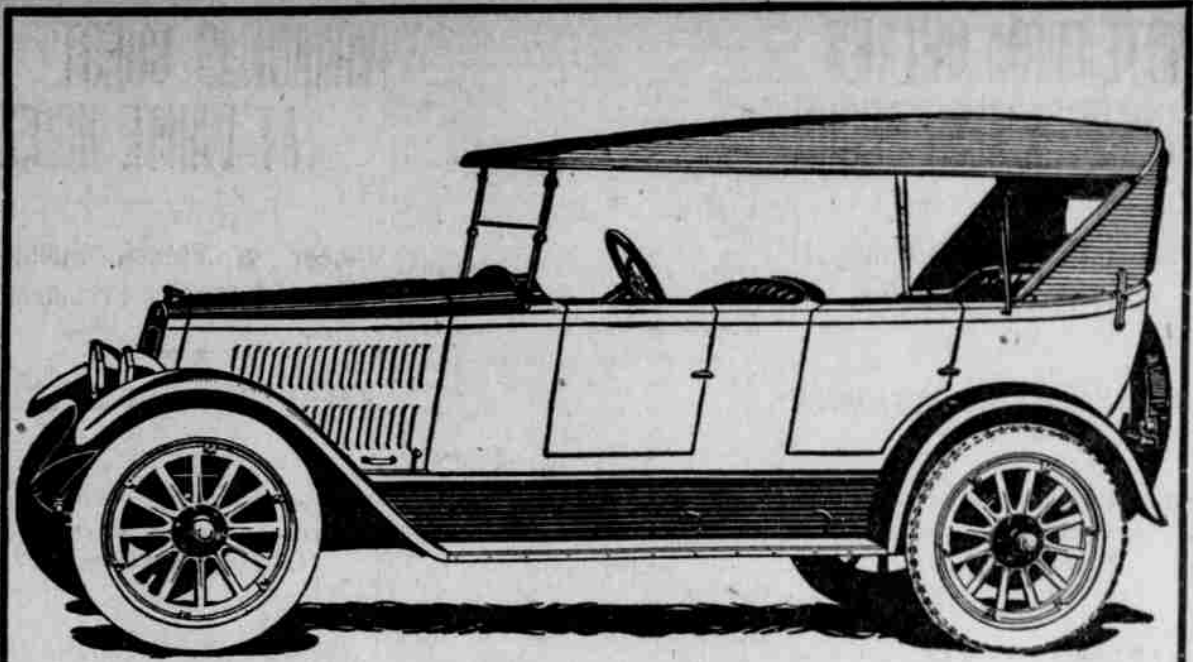
Portland's Honor Recognized.

SALEM, Or., April 5.—(Special.)—The state marshal, in a city council today, declared the so-called Chinese section of the city to be a fire menace, and said that some action should be taken to improve the existing conditions. The buildings referred to by the state fire marshal are on South High street. A committee of the council was appointed to investigate the alleged fire menace, with authority to submit recommendations at the next meeting of the body.

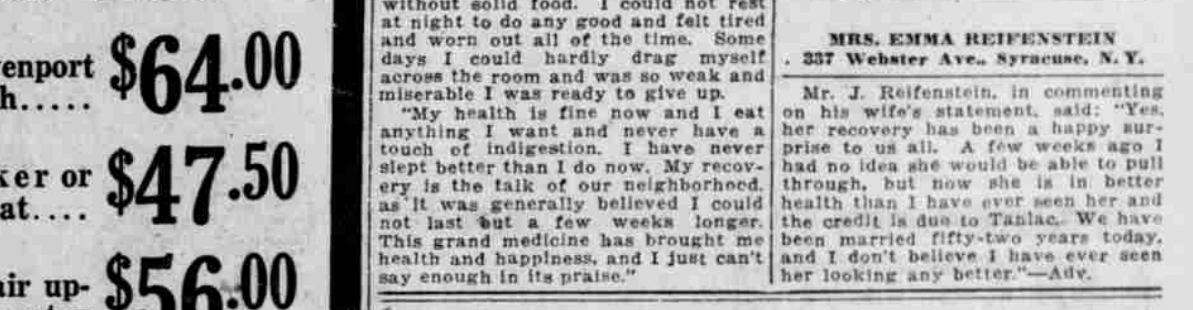
