PERJURY SEVEREST PUNISHMENT—Olaf Hauge, a native of Norway and a Clackamas county farmer, was sentenced to serve six months in the county jail and pay a fine of \$100 yesterday by Judge Wolverton in federal court, following his conviction upon a charge of perjury in connection with his naturalization. He claimed exemption in his questionnaire upon three grounds, alien birth, marriage and physical inability. When under oath in his naturalization proceeding later, however, he said he had not claimed exemption from military service. It was contended in his defense that the statements made in his questionnaire were mistakes, due to his lack of knowledge of the English language.

BURNING SCHOOL LEASES BUILDING—The LaRoy apartment house at 422 1/2 East Burnside street was leased for a two-year period as temporary headquarters for the state school and employment bureau for the adult blind yesterday. The lease was approved by the state board of control in session at Salem Monday. The building is owned by George Pirie. Negotiations for the lease of the structure were taken up some time ago on recommendation of J. P. Meyers, ex-superintendent of the Portland school for the sightless, which has been taken over by the state.

690 TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS MADE—Operations under motorcycle patrolmen under Lieutenant Ervin resulted in the arrest of 690 speeders and other traffic law violators during the month of March. Fines collected from the offenders in municipal court amounted to \$2355.50. Patrolman Pierre led with 144 arrests and Patrolman Kelly with second with 141. Records of the other five were: Babcock, 123; Scott, 115; Anderson, 105; Smythe, 101, and Shaylor, 94.

DEPORTATION OF ALIENS SOUGHT—That aliens in this country should be compelled to become citizens or be deported was the substance of a resolution adopted by Over the Top Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, at a meeting Monday night. The organization pledged itself to use its efforts through legislation and other means to obtain this end. The organization in the same resolution pledged itself to do everything possible to eliminate the hyphen in organizations of the United States.

FISHERMAN FINED \$25—Y. Ogruri, Gresham, Or., was fined \$25 by District Judge Deich yesterday on a charge of having undersized trout in his possession during the closed season. Ogruri was arrested by Deputy Game Warden Cornell when fishing in Johnson creek. He also was charged with fishing without a license. Judge Deich discharged John T. Heslin of Fairview and S. Johnston and R. W. Burghfield of Portland, who were charged with fishing without a license. The judge said that the fine was too severe for a first offense.

WOMAN DIES OF SMALLPOX—The first death from smallpox which has been registered at the city health bureau in several months was that of Mrs. Cecil C. Kimbrough, of 86 East Humboldt street, who died Monday night from the effects of the disease. Mrs. Kimbrough was 25 years old and according to the records had been suffering from smallpox only two days.

BOOTBLACK SAYS NEVER AGAIN—F. L. Mock, bootblack in the Rainier barber shop, declared that he would never again take part in the bootblack game for life yesterday after Federal Judge Wolverton applied a \$250 fine as punishment for selling liquor illicitly. He said he played a losing game in trying to pry up the prohibition lid and was through.

C. V. DUDNEY IS SUBJ.—C. V. Dudney, of Dudley Aircraft company, was sued for \$521.13 in an action filed in the circuit court yesterday by V. U. Ayres, aviation pilot, employed between August and November, 1920. The money was due, it is alleged, on salary, commissions and expenses during the period.

PORTLAND FUGITIVE JAILED—R. E. Anderson, wanted in Portland on a charge of passing checks totalling more than \$100 without funds in the bank with which they were cashed, was arrested in Astoria yesterday, according to word reaching Sheriff Hurlburt.

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PROPOSED BILL PRAISED

WOMEN'S JURY MEASURE HAS DEVELOPED INTEREST.

Presidents' Club Indorses Move and Prominent Washington Men Favor Enactment.

Widespread interest in the women's jury bill, submitted by the last legislature to the people of Oregon, to be voted upon June 7, has been shown by both men and women throughout the state. In response to numerous requests for information regarding the operating of the law in other states, a questionnaire was sent out by the legislative council, representing several state-wide organizations. Replies that are fast coming in speak in high favor of women's service on juries.

The law to be presented to the Oregon voters is practically the same as that operating successfully in Washington since 1911. Similar laws are in force in California, Idaho and other states. Women serve on juries in New York, Kansas, Michigan and Utah, besides in the Pacific coast states.

Yesterday the Presidents' club, representing many of the city organizations, adopted a resolution indorsing the women's jury bill and pledged itself to work for and vote for the measure.

Malcolm Douglas of Seattle, prosecuting attorney of King county, Washington, has written to the legislative council answering the questionnaire and wishing the measure success in Oregon.

A. H. Imus, state senator and an attorney in Washington, said of the jury bill: "It is the consensus of opinion of the bench and bar of Washington that women jurors show by their verdicts a higher sense of justice and a clearer conception of the points in issue at the trials than the average man juror."

Attorney W. H. Abel of Montebello says: "My experience has been that women make just as good jurors as men, pay as close attention to the evidence and if anything take their obligation more seriously."

Victor Liege, owner of the pistol, met Reed on the street and took him to the police station to explain matters. He confessed freely his part in the matter. The police found Hughes in a lodging house at First and Taylor streets early yesterday. Both boys were booked on a vagrancy charge.

AUTOS HURT 118 IN MARCH—Municipal Court Fines Amount to \$4568 for Traffic Offenses.

Traffic accidents caused injury to 118 persons in March, but no one was killed, according to the monthly report of the police department. As long as the accidents occurred in the month and 857 arrests for traffic violations were made. Fines amounting to \$4568.50 were collected in municipal court for traffic offenses.

Carelessness contributed to 663 of the total number of accidents and failure to give right of way to 148 more. Collisions between automobiles caused 683 accidents, while collisions with street cars resulted in 108. Sixty-six pedestrians, 29 bicycles and 19 motorcycles were struck by automobiles during the month. One hand cart and one tricycle were wrecked.

A total of 3913 motor-traffic violations were handled by the complaint department during the month. Bail amounting to \$1200.30 was forfeited by persons accused of various violations of the parking ordinance.

Fire Hydrant Bids Opened.—EUGENE, Ore., April 5.—(Special).—Bids on 30 new fire hydrants to be installed in the city upon recommendation of the state fire marshal's office were opened by the city council last night. Two local foundries submitted bids from \$10 to \$40 lower than those of outside manufacturers. The council will decide at its next meeting which of the local bids will be accepted.

SEWER HEARING IS TODAY—City Engineer May Be Requested to Outline New Plans for Draining District.

The hearing on the proposed construction of a Foster-road sewer system, which ended last week in a wordy battle between Mayor Baker and City Commissioner Barbur, following the "arrest" of the latter, will be resumed at 2 P. M. today.

City Attorney Grant will file his opinion on the city's right to empty storm water of the Foster road district into Johnson's creek, and also on the question of the right of the city to assess the district for sewer which will have for its purpose the drainage of this district and which will not be used for sanitary sewage for a number of years.

Mr. Grant announced yesterday that he would have these opinions completed by today, but did not intimate what his opinion would be. It is expected that some members of the city council will request City Engineer Laugaard to work out a new plan to drain the Foster-road district, a plan which will not cost the district as much as the proposed sewer.

Although City Engineer Laugaard would not discuss the situation, saying that he was following the instructions of the city council, it was known that he had plans completed which called for a drainage scheme
