

MR. KELLY GROOMED FOR GOVERNORSHIP

Member of Portland Port Commission May Run.

FRIENDS URGE CANDIDACY

Strength Shown in All Parts of State by War Veteran Who Is Business Man.

George H. Kelly, lieutenant-colonel in the world war, may become a candidate for the republican nomination for governor. While nothing definite has been determined, Mr. Kelly has the matter under serious consideration and probably will arrive at a decision within a short time.

For the last year there have been rumors that Mr. Kelly, who is a member of the Port of Portland commission, and also a member of the state game commission, might become an aspirant for the gubernatorial chair, but these rumors never were set at rest even when Mr. Kelly said that he was not interested in political matters. The Kelly boom, however, began taking on a new impetus during the last ten days and has assumed formidable proportions.

Candidacy Being Urged.

In the last fortnight there have been many prominent men in Portland from all parts of the state who have called on Mr. Kelly and urged him to run as a candidate. They have drifted in from eastern Oregon, central Oregon, southern Oregon, the Willamette valley and the coast country. A number of these citizens gravitated together and discovered that they were here on the same mission. These became the nucleus of what will be an aggressive organization for Mr. Kelly if he finally decides to plunge into the race.

It is known that a number of well-known republicans have been casting eyes at the governor's chair, but thus far all have been hanging back, waiting for someone else to make the first move.

Situation Still in Incubator.

The supporters of Mr. Kelly are urging him to make the break and start the ball rolling. The gubernatorial situation is yet in a nebulous state and it will be many months before a definite lineup is known. However, Mr. Kelly's supporters know that if he announces himself he will be the early bird and will have ample time to build up an organization for the primary fight. There is at least one prospective candidate who is holding back until Mr. Kelly makes a decision. If Mr. Kelly concludes not to be a candidate the other man will be.

Entrance of Mr. Kelly would have a marked effect upon George I. Baker, if the latter became a candidate. Some of Mayor Baker's most ardent supporters in previous campaigns, and upon whom he would largely depend if he comes out for governor, are pledged to Mr. Kelly, if the latter decides to be an applicant for the office of chief executive of the state.

Would Run as Business Man.

If Mr. Kelly offers himself it will be as a business man and with a platform assuring a business administration. Born in Oregon, of pioneer parents, Mr. Kelly has been identified with the development of the state and has been engaged in large business enterprises all his life. He was a member of the first fish and game commission, from which he later resigned, and when the new commission was created at the recent session of the legislature he was appointed by Governor Olcott.

As a member of the Port of Portland, Mr. Kelly has served a number of years, a break coming in the continuity of his service when he volunteered during the war, went to France and was put in charge of the job of turning the forests of France

15 DIRECTORS RE-ELECTED

Annual Meeting Held by Southern Pacific Stockholders.

ANCHORAGE, Ky., April 6.—All 15 directors of the Southern Pacific company, including Robert Goetz, J. Kruttschnitt, L. F. Loree, Ogden Mills and Samuel Rea, were re-elected at the annual stockholders' meeting here today. A statement issued after the meeting said a resolution was adopted empowering the directors to "take such action as they saw fit with reference to federal control of railroads."

Thirty-three thousand stockholders, more than 74 per cent of the total number, holding approximately 2,500,000 shares, were represented by proxies, which were voted by eight persons, including A. K. Vandeventer, treasurer.

HOOD RIVER, Or., April 6.—(Special.)—The temperature dropped to 26 degrees above zero here last night, no damage, according to Leroy Childs, superintendent of the Hood River experiment station, was caused pears and cherries, the buds of which are just opening. Peaches and apricots in bloom on lower levels, may have suffered, but this fruit is not grown here in commercial quantities. Water around the exterior of buds was frozen.

DIVORCEE LOSES SUIT AGAINST EX-HUSBAND

Attempt to Collect Pay for Board Defeated.

ALLEGED LOANS DISPUTED

Jury Awards Judgment of \$1 Upon Counter-Claim of Defendant, Who Charges Spitework.

The attempt of Nellie M. Covert to collect from her ex-husband, Frank K. Covert, for board covering eight months preceding marriage and many months after marriage, and also money she said she had spent on her husband during their wedded life, collapsed when a jury, the court of Circuit Judge Morrow brought in a verdict awarding damages of \$1 to Covert on a counter claim. The jury returned a sealed verdict shortly before 6 o'clock Tuesday night, and it was opened yesterday. The deliberations lasted 23 minutes.

Claims of Mrs. Covert totaled \$4975, more than half of which were ruled out by Judge Morrow before the case went to the jury. Counter claims of the husband were in the sum of \$239. E. A. Libel proceedings to authorize the seizure of 350 cases of adulterated mustard and 193 cases of adulterated shrimp were instituted in federal court yesterday by Assistant United States Attorney Fiegel.

The shrimp, alleged to have been adulterated and putrid, were shipped from Seattle on August 2, 1919, by Ariss, Campbell & Galt to Mason, Ehrman & Co. of Portland. They were in four-ounce cans branded as packed for Mason, Ehrman & Co.

The mustard was shipped by the Bayle Food Products company of Luther, Mo. It is alleged to contain hulls.

Logging Camp Opens.
