

U. S. WARNING GIVEN TO BUSINESS CROOKS

Daugherty Says Law Violation Will Be Punished.

EYES DECLARED OPEN

Intent of Department to Harass Industry Is Denied, but Trusts Are Told to Beware.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7.—A general warning to business that the department of justice will countenance no violations of the law was sounded today by Attorney-General Daugherty.

The country, Mr. Daugherty said, should take notice of a new day and a new way, and that those who had been guilty of illegal practices should not "close their eyes."

His statement, he added, "was a modest, but emphatic warning to those for whom it was intended and could be regarded as an opportunity for any of those who should mend their ways to do so."

Intent to Harass Denied.

The attorney-general said the department of justice did not intend to harass business in any way, but that it did intend to enforce the law. He pointed out that while the profiteering sections of the Lever act had been declared unconstitutional, the department still continued under the Sherman anti-trust law.

Mr. Daugherty was discussing specifically the situation in the building materials industry, which he declared reports to the department showed to be "intolerable." He said the department of justice would ask for more aid from the cities and that it had received heretofore and that lawyers representing firms should regard themselves as agents of the department of justice in upholding the law.

More Inquiries Promised.

The attorney-general announced that it was the purpose of investigating conditions in the building material trades wherever they were warranted. Indictments already have been returned in New York and Chicago, he said, and complaints have come from Pittsburgh, St. Louis, Cleveland and other cities.

Secretary Hoover announced that the department of commerce had begun gradual organization of a committee to work out a standardization of building materials and a unified building code for the entire country. Conflicts in building codes of different localities, Mr. Hoover explained, cause losses of from 10 to 20 per cent in construction values in a year which could be avoided by a single code.

Efforts are being made, he said, to get the fire marshals of cities and the architects on the one side and the building trade on the other to agree upon a single code.

SEATTLE CHURCH BURNED

GANG OF BOYS SUSPECTED OF INCENDIARISM.

Green Lake Baptist Structure Is Total Loss Following Series of Thefts From Building.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 7.—(Special.)—Fire at 12 o'clock last night destroyed the Green Lake Baptist church with a loss of approximately \$15,000, and today city detectives began an investigation of the theory advanced by residents of the district that the blaze was the work of a gang of boy incendiaries.

The church, a large frame structure at Fifth avenue and Second street, was totally destroyed and a small frame building at the rear used for Sunday school purposes was damaged. Salvage of the latter may provide housing room temporarily for the church services.

For several weeks a series of thefts from the church troubled its members. Window blinds and curtains, coat hooks, bolts from the doors and windows and even brooms have been stolen from the church and only a few days ago the baptismal suit of the pastor, Rev. James Banton, was taken. This and depredations of various kinds, the latter known to have been committed by a gang of boys, have led to the belief that they may have been responsible for the fire.

Battalion Chief Kinney of the city fire department said he believed the fire was caused by a defective fuse, but some members of the church who were present at their practice last night and who left the building at 9 o'clock, about two hours before the fire was discovered, do not concur in this theory.

HOME DESTROYED BY FIRE

Hillside Family Lose Everything but Their Night Clothes.

FOREST GROVE, Or., April 7.—(Special.)—The home of J. E. Levett, who lives about five miles northwest of here, in the Hillside neighborhood, was destroyed by fire Tuesday night, together with the contents.

Awakened from a sound sleep near midnight the son, Edward, felt the heat of the fire upon his cheeks and he scarcely had time to arouse the family and get them out of the house before the whole structure was in flames. All the family's clothing, not a garment being saved from the flames.

WORKERS OPPOSE WAGE CUT

Refusal to Accept Reduction Will Hold Up Decrease of Pay.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 7.—The representatives of the unskilled workers in the maintenance of way department of the Southern Pacific company today in an appeal to the railroad labor board that it adjust existing wage differences, the company announced. They indicated, however, that they would take no action until the board had decided.

Several thousand workers were affected by the decision today. The company has scheduled other conferences with the unskilled workers' representatives in motor transport and other divisions. The total number of unskilled workers in the company's system approximates 10,000.

The refusal of the workers to accept a decrease operates to suspend the company's ruling that such decrease shall go into effect on April 17, according to the provisions of the transportation act.

SENATE BIT HEADY, SULLIVAN ASSERTS

Upper House Held Eager to Exercise Power.

RECENT RUMORS SCOUTED

Harding Foreign Policy Forecast Premature; Programme as Yet Far From Completed.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7.—(Special.)—The public must be under much confusion as to just what is happening in Washington this week in the field of foreign relations. So far as the recent rumors of a "break" in the relations between the United States and Germany are concerned, the following was the order of events:

Exactly a week ago M. Viviani went to see President Harding. That conference was brief and more or less formal. From it the general impression is, nothing developed. On the same day M. Viviani had his meeting with Secretary Hughes. That meeting was longer. Whether it was more or less conclusive than the talk with President Harding no one knows.

On Friday M. Viviani met Senator Lodge, chairman of the senate foreign relations committee and now one of the two or three chiefs of the irreconcilables. On Saturday Senator Knox came from his home in Pennsylvania to have a three-hour conference with President Harding.

Treaty Reported Scrapped.

On Monday Washington became aware that M. Lausanne, who is a member of the Viviani mission and has participated in his conferences, had called his people in Paris that the league of nations and the treaty of Versailles have been totally scrapped by America and that the Knox resolution of a separate peace with Germany would shortly be adopted.

Tuesday most of the newspapers of the country printed dispatches, to which high importance was naturally ascribed, to the effect that the administration's foreign policies had been determined and that those policies included the complete barring of the league and treaty and a separate peace with Germany through the Knox resolution. On that day the news reached what may be called its highest peak in the direction of foreign policy of the moment.

Adoption of the Knox resolution. The bulk of this news came directly or indirectly from irreconcilable leaders in the senate.

Reports Not Verified.

Immediately after the publication of this "news" we all became aware that it went rather farther than an accurate statement of the administration's attitude and its foreign programme. We learned that the administration, as distinct from the irreconcilable leaders in the senate, has by no means formulated its foreign programme as a whole; that for the present it has no policy more definite than that of waiting to handle each matter as it comes up with prudence and caution; that the administration is paying primary attention to domestic affairs; that the coming message to congress will deal more with domestic than with foreign affairs.

The explanation of all this seems to be that the irreconcilable leaders in the senate are more eager and have gone farther than the administration in the initiation of the foreign policies and to have a larger dominance in the management of them than heretofore.

Senate Bit Ambitious.

The traditional and constitutional role of the senate in foreign affairs is to provide advice and consent on matters in which the executive has the exclusive power of initiative. The senate cannot make a treaty, nor can it negotiate for a treaty, nor have any opportunity to act upon or express itself about a treaty until after the executive has completed the negotiations of the treaty and formally turns it over to the senate for advice and consent. But in the fight which the senate has just had with the executive department under Wilson the senate has acquired, through its victory, a degree of self-confidence and probably also a degree of public support which cause it today to take an attitude toward foreign affairs stronger than the senate has ever before taken in its history.

In the present situation the senate has one of the very few opportunities that ever come to it to take the initiative in a matter within the field of foreign affairs. Wars ordinarily are ended by treaties negotiated by the executive. That is the way the present war was ended. But the senate, having refused to ratify the treaty ending the recent war, is now in a position to substitute for this treaty a different kind of ending of the war. The senate has proposed to end the war by a joint resolution of congress, which does not need to come from the executive and which senators can initiate themselves and which they can adopt themselves by any ordinary majority vote, without the two-thirds majority necessary in a treaty.

Wilson Act Recalled.

Without doubt, if Mr. Wilson were president and if M. Viviani was a spokesman of France he held the kind of a row. Last summer Mr. Harding, who was then a member of the foreign relations committee of the senate, said he had been "approached by a spokesman of France."

Mr. Wilson promptly wrote him a letter to the effect that if this were true "grave consequences" would follow. Legally Mr. Wilson was so much in the technical right that Mr. Harding felt forced to explain.

AIR COMMITTEE NAMED

U. S. Control of Plane Navigation to Be Studied.

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SHIP BOARD TO LIVE, VIEW

INSTITUTION HELD AS PERMANENT AS MERCHANT MARINE.

America Faced With One of Its Greatest Trade Problems in History, Declares Benson.

PHILADELPHIA, April 7.—The shipping board is a permanent institution and will live as long as the merchant marine, Rear-Admiral Benson, chairman of the board, declared today in an address before the Poor Richard club.

"The question of placing our ships on the seven seas is a world-wide proposition, affecting every phase of industry," he said. "It is of international importance, and if the American people can be convinced of that importance, there need be little fear that the board will cease to function."

"Four years ago yesterday we entered the war. Ships were needed; we built them. Today these ships, built for war emergency, are still being used. They have been allotted by the board to reputable steamship companies," Admiral Benson continued.

"We built many ships that were undesirable, to be sure, but they were only like the ships that are on the battle fields and never hit anything. It was inevitable some ships of this character should be turned out, but in the main the fleet was good."

He emphasized the importance of keeping the merchant marine to as high a standard as possible.

"America is faced with one of the greatest trade problems in its history," he said. "Foreign competitors are waiting anxiously for the signs of American traders losing money, that they may jump in and run away with our foreign trade."

"Even if we are losing money we must play the game, and we must stand that loss for the present, for, if we don't, foreign competitors will raise their freight rates. It is much better and cheaper for the American public to pay a slightly increased freight rate than to let the difference on goods of the consumer shipped at rates of foreign competitors."

BUTTE WOMAN IS SOUGHT

Extradition Papers Issued Despite Release in Salt Lake.

BUTTE, Mont., April 7.—Despite reports that Lena Ciccarelli has been released by Salt Lake City authorities, Under-Sheriff Robinson of the local force today issued extradition papers to return her to this city. She is charged with taking \$2400 from her husband, Sheriff Duggan, said tonight that he had telegraphed the Salt Lake City officers several days ago asking that the woman be held, but received no answer. County Attorney Boardman said today that if the court at Salt Lake City had released her it would be held responsible. Local officers are of the opinion, however, that Mrs. Ciccarelli can be located by Robinson at Salt Lake City.

'ACE'S' BODY TO BE MOVED

Raoul Lufbery to Be Buried at Wallingford, Conn.

WALLINGFORD, Conn., April 7.—The body of Major Raoul Lufbery, famous American "ace" pilot, who died with bringing down 19 German planes, will be brought here for final interment, relatives were informed today.

Major Lufbery was killed May 18, 1918, in combat with a German machine in the Toul sector. He was 32 years old.

WAGES NOT TO BE CUT

Despite Less Revenue, Box Workers to Get Same Pay.

CHICAGO, April 7.—Wages of workers in the box manufacturing industry will not be reduced, despite the loss to manufacturers in the prices of lumber and materials.

So said B. F. Masters, chairman of the national association of box manufacturers, at the annual convention today.
