

COMMITTEE STUDIES CHANGES IN LEAGUE

Scandinavian Amendments to Blockade Postponed.

MANY PROBLEMS FACED

Report on Arbitration Court and Status of Small States to Be Made Next Month.

GENEVA, April 7.—Examination of amendments to the league of nations covenant has been begun by the committee of the league. The committee yesterday discussed amendments offered concerning the permanent court of arbitration, extension of arbitration under the league, relaxation of the unanimity rule in the assembly and the council, action to be taken as to a member state failing to pay its contribution to the league, the method of the selection of the non-permanent members of the council, and attachment to the league of states too small to be full members.

These questions were left to a subcommittee which is to report in May. The committee decided to postpone consideration of the Scandinavian amendments as to the economic blockade. It also decided to ask Argentina to submit, if it desires, a statement explanatory of its amendment providing all sovereign states be admitted to the league on their request.

The committee requested the Chinese member to explain the Chinese amendment by which the Monroe doctrine alone would be mentioned in this article, which now refers to "treaties of arbitration or regional understandings like the Monroe doctrine."

The discussion of the Canadian amendment for the elimination of article 19 was postponed until after the return of Rene Viviani from America.

TAB IS KEPT ON CHARLES

SWISS PROHIBIT EX-EMPEROR FROM GIVING INTERVIEWS.

Another Condition of Refuge Is Promise to Take No Part in Intrigues or Propaganda.

Lucerne, Switzerland, April 7.—Ex-Emperor Charles, domiciled here after his unsuccessful trip to Hungary in an effort to reclaim the throne, is occupying with ex-Empress Zita the same hotel suite in which King Constantine and Queen Sophie of Greece lived while in exile. It is known as "the king's and queen's refuge."

The Swiss government permitted the ex-ruler to return only on condition that he take part in no intrigues or propaganda measures. He is prohibited from receiving visitors or from leaving the canton of Lucerne within which a villa will be chosen for the family.

Charles desires to remain in Switzerland as does the ex-empress. The ex-emperor and ex-empress looked well but tired. Charles seems to have recovered from bronchitis.

BUDAPEST, April 6.—A strong protest against action taken by Czechoslovakia and Jugoslavia in threatening military action to prevent restoration of ex-Emperor Charles to the Hungarian throne was made in the national assembly today by Foreign Minister Graf.

RAIL RATE RISE STANDS

INTERSTATE COMMERCE BODY REFUSES EASTBOUND CUTS.

Order Eliminates Applications for Reduction on Lumber and Fruit of Pacific.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7.—The interstate commerce commission issued an order today suspending certain rates on the east bound tariff on the Great Northern and Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroads. The suspended schedules provide for the elimination of the application of rates on lumber and fruit products from California and Oregon to points in Minnesota on the two roads named, leaving combination rates applicable instead, resulting in increases varying from 1/2 to 9 cents the 100 pounds.

Proposed increases in switching charges on the Great Northern railroad from South Tacoma, Wash., to points in Washington, Idaho, Dakota and Minnesota, not reached by the Northern Pacific, were ordered canceled by the commission.

TOBACCO "CURE" IS FATAL

"Medicine" Brings Indigestion, Meningitis and Death.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., April 7.—(Special.)—Clyde A. Clippinger, aged 27, died here this afternoon after a long illness which resulted from taking a tobacco cure. He tried to cure himself of the habit and the medicine he used brought on acute indigestion and developed into meningitis. Clippinger was foreman of the Grant-Lowe farm near Umapine. His widow and a daughter survive.

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REVAL, Esthonia, April 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—The "decaying civilization of soviet Russia," was depicted as the worst tyranny in the world by Dr. Morris Zucker, known here as a leader and organizer of the communist party in the United States, and whose home is in Brooklyn, N. Y., on his arrival here today from Moscow after nearly five months in Russia.

"Conditions steadily are becoming worse," he declared. "What little foreign trade Russia is able to get is of no help to the people who everywhere are the victims of tyranny and go about in a hopeless attitude because of the great and constant terror."

Zucker, who arrived here today from Moscow, was pardoned by President Wilson after having been sentenced to 15 years imprisonment on being found guilty of sedition. He left the United States in September and arrived in Russia in November.

Three days after his arrival in Moscow he was imprisoned and passed most of the time he was in Russia in confinement.

Inside the prison walls, Dr. Zucker said he met victims of bolshevik tyranny, most of whom were because they had opposed being ruled by the small bolshevik minority. These included ex-governors and workmen, whose common ground, according to Dr. Zucker, was their opposition to "absolute tyranny."

Dr. Zucker, who arrived here with a group of Germans on the way home from Russia, where they were prisoners, said he hoped to return to the United States to relate the facts regarding Russian "tyranny" to those who think there is anything like freedom under the soviets.

In prison in Moscow, he said, there are still a number of Americans, some of whom he saw. These included Roy C. Keely, an electrical mechanical expert who had been in prison eight months; William Pick of Brooklyn, and Dr. Estes, who went to Russia last September to take moving pictures; Mrs. Margaret E. Harrison, an American newspaper correspondent; Henry J. La Mare of New York, who long had been a resident of Russia and remained there to care for his property; Demetrius Kallimatis, an American of Greek parentage, who had been two and one-half years in prison; and Captain Emmett Kilpatrick of the American Red Cross, who is in a concentration camp.

These prisoners, like Zucker himself, were very poorly fed, he asserted, most of them being threatened constantly with the "third degree" to exact confessions of guilt for things they never had done. He said Mrs. Harrison, under threat of death and through much ill treatment, had in some way been inveigled into signing a false confession.

Mr. Keely, Dr. Zucker declared, had been invited to Russia and was feted and traveled on special cars while there. He was given a banquet by Nikolai Lenine, the bolshevik premier, the night he left Moscow for the Ethiopian frontier on his return home, said Dr. Zucker, only to be arrested at the border and returned to a Moscow prison when the bolsheviks learned his report on Russia would be unfavorable.

"That's the way they do with everybody," he continued. "Their opponents are imprisoned immediately. With the exception of finding peace more dangerous than war. The concession of free trade to the peasants is unsatisfactory and meaningless, as what good can come from each individual spending days on trains carrying 50 pounds of grain to the cities? Restoration of some sort of middleman would enable them to ship on freight cars in quantities."

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OWN DEPORTATION IS ASKED

Convicted Seditionist Is Pardoned From 60-Year Sentence.

NEW YORK, April 7.—Dr. Morris Zucker, who arrived at Reval today after several months imprisonment in soviet Russia, was convicted in federal court here in 1919 on four counts charging seditious utterances.

The counts were based on an address he delivered here Thanksgiving day, 1918. He was sentenced to 60 years in prison, 15 years for each count. Zucker's request, however, he was deported.

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The letter was written with reference to a request that the board send an engineer appraiser to examine the dam of Ochoco irrigation project, in central Oregon, with a view of passing on loan applications of settlers under the project which long have been pending. Explaining, however, the difficulties of meeting all of the demands upon the Spokane bank, the letter says:

"The farm loan board expects to offer a bond issue about April 15, at which time it is hoped to sell a substantial amount. The demand for money is very heavy, both in the country and in Wall street, and even if the farm loan board is fortunate enough to sell a substantial amount of bonds in April, and more in July, that will mean not more than \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000, for the Spokane bank, which embraces the states of Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon."

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
